- 1. Some student youths, State service personnel and citizens, with worries, have evaded to areas of EAOs and foreign countries due to the incitements and intimidation of NLD members, extremist followers, unlawful associations and terrorist groups such as CRPH and NUG, stimulation of CDM, and persons and organizations at home and abroad not wishing to restore peace and stability of the State since Tatmadaw assumed the State responsibilities on 1 February 2021.

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to 593,958 after 1,819 new cases were reported on 3 March 2022 according to the Ministry of Health. Among these confirmed cases, 541,648 have been discharged from hospitals. Death toll reached 19,379 after 4 died.—MNA

Republic of the Union of Myanmar Central Bank of Myanmar Notification 5/2022

2nd Waxing of Taboung 1383 ME 3 March 2022

- 1. The Central Bank of Myanmar has hereby issued this notification exercising the power conferred under Sections 17 and 22 of the Foreign Exchange Management Law.
- 2. The Baht/Kyat direct payment is allowed on the Thai-Myanmar border to boost bilateral trade between Thailand and Myanmar, to facilitate smooth flow of goods, to make easy access to cross-border payment between the two countries and to promote local currency in line with the objectives of ASEAN Financial Integration.
- 3. The exporters and importers are allowed to open baht accounts at the designated banks for cross-border trade.
- 4. Therefore, the designated banks are required to adhere to the guidelines for the direct use of Baht/Kyat on the Thai-Myanmar border.
- 5. This notice shall take effect from the date of the issuance.

MoC organizes meetings on domestic rice consumption, increasing maize and sesame production, continuous export to foreign markets

THE Ministry of Commerce organized a coordination meeting on domestic rice consumption and continuous export to foreign markets, and a coordination meeting on increasing maize and sesame production and continuous export to foreign markets, on a virtual format yesterday.

At the meeting, Union Minister Dr Pwint San called for sectoral discussions to ensure domestic rice consumption and continuous export to foreign markets. He said that an emphasis is being placed on food sufficiency according to the current situation around the world, and efforts must be made to increase the price of Myanmar rice internationally at reasonable prices and to export more high-grade rice.

He also called for cooperation to ensure that all stakeholders in the rice supply chain, from agriculture to export, receive a fair return, and instead of selling the bran from rice milling as animal feed, advanced milling must be done to produce bran oil in order to meet domestic oil demand.

For domestic food security, policies that are in line with the current global context will be formulated and implemented, and relevant departments and organizations in each sector will work together, he said.

He urged all to openly discuss if there are any challenges, ensuring that relevant ministries will provide necessary assistance. Attendees discussed measures for the development of the rice sector and further activities, and the Union minister coordinated as necessary.

In the afternoon, the coordination meeting on increasing maize and sesame production and continuous export to foreign markets was held. At the meeting, the Union minister said the ministry is providing necessary support for the production and



export of Myanmar products as per the SPS Protocols and regulation requirements of each country.

It is necessary for the private sector to step up its efforts to find new markets, and the

State is focusing on intergovernmental coordination, he added. He stressed the need to increase oilseed plantations and reduce oil imports by meeting the needs of the domestic market.

Afterwards, attendees pre-

sented the production of pulses, sesame seeds and maize, exports of the products, local/international prices, the situation of farmers changing according to market demand and changes in trade patterns.—MNA

In order to produce more edible oil in the Bago Region, by the plan of the chief minister, 2,225 baskets of sunflower seeds have been distributed free of charge to bean farmers since October 2020, and now 5,830 acres of oil-producing sunflowers have been expanded.

Myeik residents receive booster doses, COVID-19 vaccines

THE government conducts COV-ID-19 vaccination programmes in Myeik Township of Taninthayi Region as per the target groups. The officials administered booster doses to the villagers from ten wards/villages and departmental staff yesterday.

More than 300 government employees received booster doses at the General Hospital in Kankaung Ward. Moreover, about 1,000 villagers also received their first and second doses of vaccines at their respective wards and villages.

A total of 852 government employees from education, health and police, and those aged over 50 received booster doses six months after they were fully vaccinated in Myeik Township.

The number of estimated people aged above 18 to get vaccinated against COVID-19 is 195,413 and there are 160,911 people who received the first shots, while 150,158 have been fully vaccinated until yesterday. Therefore, 82 per cent of the estimated population are inoculated and officials will continue the inoculation processes as planned, according to the township COV-**ID-19 Control and Emergency** Response Committee. — Khine Htoo (Myeik IPRD)/GNLM

Police seize illegal timbers, agricultural materials, foodstuffs, vehicles, motorcycles

ANTI-ILLEGAL Trade Steering Committee focuses on strict control of illegal trade under the law.

On 2 and 3 March, the Bago Region Forest Department seized 7.691 tonnes of illegal timbers worth K1,013,870 in the forest reserves of Bago and Toungoo districts and took action under the Forest Law.

Similarly, the Lashio Township Customs Department of Shan State examined the vehicles on the Lashio detour yesterday and seized undocumented K17,695,000 worth of China-made softdrinks and three vehicles worth K60,000,000 which carried these products. The officials took action under the Customs Law.

Moreover, the combined inspection led by Myanmar Police Force conducted inspections team in Monywa Township of Sagaing Region and seized two unregistered motorcycles worth K200,000 and K4,340,000 worth of agricultural materials and foodstuffs and took action under the Export and Import Law. They also seized K3,529,680 worth of illegal teak (weighing 21.576 tonnes) in Bamauk Township and took action under the Forest

Therefore, a total of 13 arrests (estimated value of K86,778,550) were made on 2 and 3 March, according to the committee. — MNA

Stimulant tablets seized across Myanmar

COMBINED teams consisting of members of the Anti-Drug Police Force conducted search operations across the country and seized stimulant tablets in some townships.

On 2 March, Ma Kine Bre-

by the police on the Lonekhin-Sankhar Road near Mazupyang village in Phakant Township, and 10,000 stimulant tablets were found and confiscated from her motorbike.

On the same day, the poin's motorcycle was stopped lice arrested Saw Mai Awar, Ma Aye Thaung and Ma Lwin Mar Hlaing together with 10,000 stimulant tablets from their Honda Fit car on the Hpa-an-Eindu Road near Eindu village in Hpa-an.

In addition, a combined team consisting of members of the Sagaing Region Police Force searched the house of Ma Win Mar in Saobwa ward in Tamu and seized 78,000 stimulant tablets.

On 1 March, Moe Zaw Oo was arrested in Myeik (South) ward in Myeik together with 3,850 stimulant tablets during a search in his motorcycle.

It is reported that action is taken against the arrestees under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law, the Myanmar Police Force stated. — MNA

Mawtinsum Pagoda - one of the religious destinations for pilgrims By Thein Zaw (Shweli Oo)

HEN arriving at Pathein Port, it seems to be hearing the song 'My Dear Ma Ma Pathein Thu'. Remembering the visit of Mawtinsun Pagoda by boat from Pathein over thirty years ago, several large and small ships along the Pathein Port and Pathein River were seen with flags onboard and the rumbling sounds of loudspeakers from these ships were heard. Indeed, there were fun and happiness.

The song My Dear Ma Ma Pathein Thu is repeatedly played along the Pathein River. That is a symbol of the Mawat the Cape of Negrais (Mawtin Point) in the south-westernmost mountain ranges in Ngaputaw Township of Pathein

sides of the winding road. They all looked like colourful paintings. Crossing over the Pathein

appeared temporarily. Plenty of bathing facilities is also built up on the beach.

A long queue of stalls can

Dragon King Zayyathena. The Dragon King took two of the Buddha's hairs and built the pagoda, which is originally a small stupa, at the top of Mawtin mountain and it was called Maha Makutaranthi.

Then King Thiri Dhamma Soka renovated the pagoda. In 236 Sasana Era, by using the power of Ashin Maha Moggaliputtata Tissa and Ashin Uttara, the pagoda was renovated by the king, queen and servants. In 457 Sasana Era, King Alaungsithu saw the radiance emanated from the pagoda at the top of the mountain while he was visiting overseas. So he stopped his royal raft and paid homage to the pagoda. He built one stupa at the place his royal raft was berthing. He named it PhaungtawOo Stupa on the reef of the beach at the foot of the Mawtinsun Pagoda.

After Mawtinsun Pagoda, pilgrims can pay homage to the Ngwetaung Pagoda. Ngwetaung is also a sea beach for Mawtinsun pilgrims to enjoy







tinsun Pagoda festival. It can never be an outmoded scene. Every year, the pagoda festival period is from the first waxing day of Taboung to the full moon day of Taboung. Now, it can be reached not only by waterway but by road.

Mawtinsun Pagoda is located 96 miles off the motorway from Pathein Township District in Ayeyawady Region.

Riding on the motorway, travellers can see the mountainous territory on the eastern side of beautiful western mountain ranges, natural forest areas, pleasing beauty of livelihoods of Ayeyawady Region, farmlands, rubber plantations and croplands and teak forests along both left and right 2 Bridge in downtown Pathein, travellers will get to a crossroad to Chaungtha Beach soon. When reaching the Seintaung crossroad, another crossroad to Ngwesaung can be seen. Then, the road to the southernmost is heading towards glorious Mawtinsun Pagoda with 18 wonders.

Mawtinsun Pagoda is one of the most attractive religious places for Myanmar people. It is a pagoda that is usually visited not only by local pilgrims but also by international tourists. It is a special opportunity for pilgrims who want to experience the added spectacular view of both the Bay of Bengal and the reefs in its vicinity.

The annual pagoda festival is held with crowded people. The festival lasts from the first waxing day of Taboung to the full moon day of Taboung. Series of traditional makeshift guest huts, which are built of bamboo, wood and thatch, are be seen and vendors are selling various kinds of local-made shell beads, shell necklaces, shell curtains, shell hats and shell vases in addition to local foods. Visitors can enjoy sea baths at Ngwetaung not far from Mawtinsun. They can wear palm-leaf hats and have coconut sap as well.

There are also some fun sports. When looking at the Mawtinsun Pagoda from the beachside the Mawtin Point can be seen obviously reaching to the sea as it is located at the cape of the southwest tip of the Myanmar map.

The tip is called Mawtinsun or Negrais Mountain or Tharaka Mountain or Niraban Mountain. In 103 Maha Era, two merchant brothers namely Tapussa and Bhalika of Okkalapa received the eight Buddha's hairs during the Buddha era. While returning to their home by sea route they passed the Negrais Cape belonging to

sea bathing. The beach where Mawtinsun Pagoda is located and the pagoda festival is held is submerged all year round. The beach appears during the festival period when stalls and stages can be built. Visitors and their cars can travel on the beach as well. The beach would be submerged again once the festival winds up after the 1st waning day of Taboung.

The Mawtinsun Pagoda festival is held now. Visitors can experience and enjoy various pleasant scenery to explore the environment. Pilgrims can go there by waterway from Yangon to Pathein and thereby to Mawtinsun-Khamaukmaw. They can use the motorway from Yangon to Pathein. They can choose any route - waterway or motorway - to the Mawtinsun Pagoda. When arriving in Pathein, the capital of Ayeyawady Region, from all over Myanmar, travellers can pay homage to the Shwemokht-

aw Pagoda, YegyiOo Pagoda, Tagaung Pagoda, Footprints Pagoda and other pagodas.

In addition, they can see and learn a three series of lakes, pleasant Pathein Port and Pathein No. 2 Bridge. Apart from the Mawtinsun Pagoda, pilgrims can visit Chaungtha, Ngwesaung, Ngwesaung Elephant Camp, and then proceed to the Goyangyi Island that is situated at Ngayokekaung (South) Village along the Mawtin Road.

From the Mawtinsun Pagoda Road, visitors can go to Hainggyikyun town through Kanchaing and Khamaukmaw villages by crossing the Hainggyi Island Bridge. There are many interesting sightseeing places on Hainggyi Island where they can see the exe-

cution site of foreign invaders during the reign of King Alaungphaya. Travellers can go to the Tortoise Island which can be seen very small from far in the sea. They can tour the Kyauk Klap (rock club). When travelling by boat, they can see the fleet of dolphins happy in the water near the confluence.

Visitors can explore the beauty and nature of coastal villages as well as their different types of works. The author wrote this article to welcome the Mawtinsun Pagoda festival that will be held from 2 March to 16 March for 15 days and would like to invite all to pay homage to the Mawtinsun Pagoda and enjoy the pagoda festival.

Vehicles consuming less fuel selling well in Yangon automobile market

WITH the prices of fuel oil skyrocketing, the most fuel-efficient gas-only cars (660 CC and 1000 CC) that consume less fuel are selling well in the Yangon automobile market.

The most fuel-efficient 660 CC cars (Suzuki Alto, Daihatsu Mira, Pino) and the 1000 CC cars (Toyota Passo/Boom, Belta) valued at below K10 million and over K11 million are in strong demand. Those bi-fuel cars (Toyota Corolla and Toyota Caldina) are worth approximately K15 million, according to the Yangon taxi

dealers' market.

"The fuel oil prices are bullish for now. Only the most fuel-efficient cars are demanded. The market of cars above 1500 CC, 1800 CC are quite sluggish. However, the market of CNG cars is raising its head again in recent days. The market of those brand-new cars at showrooms is inactive. Only the second-hand automobile market sees strong demand for the most fuel-efficient cars," said a dealer.

The fuel oil price hit a record high of above K2,000 per litre.

The oil prices per litre stood at K2,015 for 92 Octane, 2,155 for 95 Octane, K2,020 for diesel and K2,045 for premium diesel on 3 March 2022. The prevailing prices are about two times the previous rates recorded in the same corresponding period last year.

"In 2020 and 2021, the oil price was less than K100,000 per barrel. Now, it tremendously soared to over K300,000 per barrel. The prices jumped to an all-time high," an oil distributor was quoted as saying. — Pwint Thitsar/GNLM

Two years into the pander

WO years after the official start of the pandemic, some countries are now trying to "live with Covid", however scientists warn that potential new variants and unequal vaccination rates threaten any long-awaited return to normality.

When US global health researcher Christopher Murray wrote "Covid-19 will continue but the end of the pandemic is near", in The Lancet medical journal in late January, he summed up the hopes of many national health authorities around the world.

In the weeks leading up to the two-year anniversary of the World Health Organization declaring a pandemic in March 2020, countries such as Britain and Denmark lifted all legal Covid restrictions. Many US states also relaxed mask and other rules.

British Prime Minister Boris Johnson said the change marked the beginning of learning "to live with Covid", as the global death toll falls after the more transmissible though less severe Omicron variant swept the world.

The WHO has said that the "acute phase" of the pandemic could end by the middle of this year -- if around 70 per cent of the world is vaccinated.

From pandemic to endemic?

Spain has been among the nations calling for approaching

Covid as having transitioned to an "endemic" phase, meaning it has milder seasonal outbreaks that humanity can live with, such as the flu.

However some scientists worry governments could use the somewhat vague term to justify lifting life-saving measures.

University of Oxford evolutionary virologist Aris Katzourakis said "the word 'endemic' has become one of the most misused of the pandemic."

"A disease can be endemic and both widespread and deadly," he wrote in the journal Nature last week, pointing out that malaria killed more than 600,000 people in 2020, while 1.5 million died of tuberculosis.

There are also other options than just pandemic or endemic. The British government's scientific advisory body SAGE has laid out four potential scenarios for the years to come.

Under the "reasonable best-case" scenario, there will be smaller regional or seasonal outbreaks, as the higher Covid numbers lead to fewer flu cases.

Under the worst-case scenario, new unpredictable variants build into repeated damaging virus waves, requiring the return of harsh restrictions.

The different outcomes hinge on two key uncertainties: the possible emergence of new variants, and the ability of vaccines to protect against the disease in the long term.

The new variant threat

When it comes to vaccines, Omicron has served as both a warning and a test.

Many epidemiologists say that simply letting Covid spread unchecked gives it a greater chance of mutating into new strains.

And there is no guarantee that such new variants will be less deadly.

"There is a widespread, rosy misconception that viruses evolve over time to become more benign," Katzourakis said.

"This is not the case: there is no predestined evolutionary outcome for a virus to become more benign," he said, pointing out that the Delta variant was deadlier than the first strain that emerged in Wuhan, China.

Omicron also partly evades protection from the currently available vaccines.

But they are very effective in preventing severe disease and death -- particularly third booster shots which have been rolled out across the world.

Vaccines to the rescue?

Countries such as Israel and Sweden have started administering fourth doses, but experts fear that an endless number of booster shots is a short-sighted strategy. An Israeli trial in January also found that a fourth dose was less effective against Omicron.

Russia-Ukraine conflict could incre COVID-19 disease: WHO

THE World Health Organization (WHO) warned on Wednesday that the ongoing Russia-Ukraine conflict is likely to drive COV-ID-19 transmission ever higher and in turn increase the risk of large numbers of people developing severe disease.

"WHO is deeply concerned about the unfolding humanitarian emergency in Ukraine," said WHO Director General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesu at a press briefing.

Low rates of testing

"Prior to the conflict, Ukraine had experienced a re-

Pharma giants have raced to develop a vaccine that specifically targets Omicron, but none seem close to becoming available.

Several recent preliminary results of tests carried out on animals and not peer reviewed have suggested the targeted vaccines are no more effective against Omicron than their predecessors.

But there could be another way: broadening rather than narrowing the scope of the vac-

Three researchers including Anthony Fauci -- US President Joe Biden's chief medical adviser -- have called for a "universal coronavirus vaccine" that would protect not just against Covid but also against future coronaviruses that could spread from animals and trigger another pandemic.

"We must now prioritize development of broadly protective vaccines," the researchers wrote in the New England Journal of Medicine over the weekend.

However such a vaccine faces major hurdles and the first efforts have only just begun trials on humans.

In the meantime, the WHO emphasises that the best way to end the acute phase of the pandemic is for rich countries to share their doses rather than boost their populations again.

Only 13 per cent of Africans had been fully vaccinated as of late last month, according to the WHO -- far below the 70 per cent target needed by mid-year.

Essential medical supplies

WHO is delivering essential medical supplies from the hub in Dubai. The first shipment will arrive in Poland on Thursday, including 36 metric ton s of supplies for trauma care and emergency surgery to meet the needs of 1,000 patients, and other health supplies to meet the needs of 150,000 people. However, it urges to establish a corridor to ensure humanitarian workers and supplies have safe and continuous access to reach people in need.

Efforts underway to grow 2 crops per year in Naga Self-Administered Zone

EFFORTS are being made to grow two crops a year in the Naga Self-Administered Zone, only one crop is grown each year, said U Thein Tun Tin, the Agriculture Department head in the Naga Self-Administered Zone.

"Naga region mostly grow only one crop per year. This year, they are making efforts to engage double cropping per year. We are also providing the awareness to the local farmers to grow more crops to ensure sufficient domestic consumption," he was quoted as saying.

The local farmers from the Naga area are urged to cultivate terrace cultivation instead of shifting cultivation.

"Upland paddy and vegetables are mainly grown during

monsoon in Naga area. The farmers are mainly engaging in shifting cultivation. The shifting cultivation is a waste of soil and impact on the environment. Besides, forest fires also affect biological processes. Therefore, we are urged them to cultivate a model cultivation system," he elaborated.

"The stair cultivation is used mostly in Leshi and Htanparkhwe townships. The local farmers from Leshi, Htanparkhwe and Pansawng areas are focusing on the farming system and it makes sufficient of the domestic consumption. There are many shifting cultivation areas in Donhee and Nanyun and it will need to be sufficient of the domestic consumption," he added. "Now, they are cultivating orange, avocado and pineapple. There is a shortage of perennial corps in Lahe township. So, we urged them to cultivate perennial crops. But we need to distribute the seeds of crops. Leshi township is one of the developed townships in the Naga area. The terrace farming are developed a lot in the area which can make sufficient of the domestic consumption," explained the Agriculture Department head. — Lu Lay/GNLM

Butter bean prices rise almost three times in Pwintbyu Township

GROWERS of butter beans are making handsome profits in Pwintbyu Township, Magway Region as the butter bean fetches higher prices at the beginning of the harvest season.

"The harvest season started. The butter beans cultivated with the irrigation network of the Maezali diversion weir and underground water are highly yielded. The butter bean price rises almost three times to K42,000 per basket at the beginning of the harvest season, whereas it was priced at only K16,000 per basket in the year-ago period. Growers are harvesting butter beans to grow summer sesame seeds. The workers are also happy with daily income," said U Kyaw San, a grower from Nyaungpinsauk village of Pwintbyu Township.

Growers from Pwintbyu Township are relying on irrigation water and underground water. Last winter, they primarily grew butter beans, chickpeas and green peas and some were engaged in intercropping. The farmers reaped success from the access to irrigation water and favourable weather conditions.

The exports of butter beans exceeded 3,466 tonnes in the nearly past four months of the current mini-budget period (October 2021-March 2022), generating a revenue of US\$2 million, as per the Ministry of Commerce's data.

The exports of butter beans to China, Japan and European markets have been falling. Now, it is relying only on the domestic market, said a trader from the Mandalay market.

Normally, Myanmar exports about 75 per cent of butter bean production to foreign markets – Japan, China, Denmark, Singapore, the Republic of Korea, Malaysia, Taiwan (China Taipei) and Viet Nam, with an export volume of 15,000-30,000 tonnes per year.

There are over 160,000 acres of butter bean plantations both in winter and monsoon crop seasons. The butter beans are grown in June and July for the monsoon growing season and harvested in October and November. The winter season is in October/November and harvest time is from January to March.

The butter beans are primarily cultivated in Sagaing, Bago, Magway, Mandalay and Ayeyawady regions and Mon and northern Shan states. Magway Region produces good-quality butter beans and Japan buyers prefer them. — Ye Win Naing, KK/GNLM

Companies registered on MyCO exceeds 2,100 in two months: DICA

THE number of companies registered on the online registry system, MyCO, totalled 2,102 in the past two months (January-February) 2022, the statistics released by the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA) indicated.

The registration and re-registration of companies on the MyCO website commenced on 1 August 2018 under the Myanmar Companies Law 2017.

The figures of registered companies stood at 8,011 in 2021, 15,080 in 2020, 17,380 in 2019 and 8,506 in 2018. The number of registered companies has reached 46,377 till 31 January 2019 since its establishment on 1 August 2018 as per statistics of the DICA.

In addition, all registered companies need to file annual returns (AR) on the MyCO registry system within two months of incorporation, and at least once every year (not later than one month after the anniversary of the incorporation) under Section 97 of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017.

Under Section 266 (A) of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017, public companies must submit annual returns and financial statements (G-5) simultaneously.

All overseas corporations must submit ARs in the prescribed format on MyCO within 28 days of the financial year ending under Section 53 (A-1) of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017.

As per DICA's report, about 16,000 companies were suspended so far for failing to submit AR forms within the due date.

Newly established companies are required to submit ARs within two months of incorporation or face a fine of K100,000 for filing late returns.

The DICA has notified that any company which fails to submit its AR within 13 months will be notified of its suspension (I-9A). If it fails to submit the AR within 28 days of receiving the notice, the system will show the company's status as suspended. Companies can restore their status only after shelling out a fine of K50,000 for AR fee, K100,000 for restoration of the company on the Register, and K100,000 for late filing of documents.

If a company fails to restore its status within six months of suspension, the registrar will strike its name off the register, according to the DICA notice. — NN/GNLM

US colleges lose 1 mln students since pandemic: media

This number is about one third of the number over the last 10 years, according to the report, citing data of the US National Student Clearinghouse Research Centre. "This is an unacknowledged crisis on many levels. It means lower lifetime earning potential for workers, less economic and so $cial\,mobility, and\,a\,less\,educated$ citizenry among a host of other undesirable outcomes," said the report.-AFP■

Indonesia reports 40.920 new COVID-19 cases, 376 more deaths

INDONESIA on Wednesday confirmed 40,920 new COV-ID-19 cases, bringing the total tally to 5,630,096, said the Ministry of Health.

According to the ministry, the death toll from COVID-19 in the country rose by 376 to 149,036, while 42,935 more people recovered from the disease, bringing the total number of recoveries to 4,944,237.

The Indonesian government is accelerating its national vaccination programmes to curb the spread of the virus, and more than 190.97 million people in the Southeast Asian country have received their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine, while over 144.50 million have taken their second dose.—Xinhua ■

China conditionally approves recombinant protein COVID-19 vaccine

CHINA conditionally approved the registration application of a self-developed recombinant protein subunit vaccine against COVID-19, the National Medical Products Administration said Wednesday. The vaccine, developed by Anhui Zhifei Longcom Biopharmaceutical Co., Ltd., was allowed to enter the market on a conditional basis, said the administration.-Xinhua

Chinatown eateries in Indonesian capital adapt to life under COVID-19

AMID the spread of the Omicron variant in Indonesia, more eateries in "Glodok", the largest Chinatown in capital city Jakarta, have begun selling Chinese style herbal and medicinal foods. In a rented space in front of a storey house in Glodok on Monday morning, Cindy Tan was busy selling Chinese style chicken herbal soup, popularly known in Chinese-Indonesian communities as Cia Po Tim Ayam, to her customers.

"Cia Po Tim Ayam can be consumed by anyone. It's to build or boost one's stamina. This is good for a woman who just gave birth," the 32-year-old woman told Xinhua recently.

Cia Po Tim Ayam basically comes in the form of chicken

stock that is infused with herbs such as goji berries, ginger and other herbal ingredients.

Of Chinese descent, Tan has been on cloud nine for the past few months as she has been gaining a small fortune from her modest food business.

The COVID-19 pandemic has increased the habit of consuming healthy foods as a method of building immunity. Noticing that, Tan decided to start her business last September: "I want to sell foods that can boost the human immune system. In my family, my mother often cooks herbal soups when her kids feel unwell or unhealthy," Tan said, adding that she learned how to make herbal soup from her mother.—Xinhua ■

Vietnam's daily COVID-19 cases surpass 110,000

THE daily COVID-19 tally in Vietnam surged to 110,301 on Wednesday, up 11,539 from Tuesday, according to the Ministry of Health. The new infections, logged in 63 localities nationwide. included 110,280 domestically transmitted and 21 imported.

The Vietnamese capital Hanoi remained the epidemic hotspot with 15,114 cases on Wednesday, also its new daily record, followed by the northern Bac Ninh province with 4,698 cases, and the central Nghe An province with 4,329 cases.

On the same day, health authorities also documented 41,551 COVID-19 cases detected earlier in the northern provinces of Nam Dinh, Bac Giang, and Thai

The infections brought the total tally to 3,709,481 with 40,452 deaths. Nationwide, as many as 2,516,785 COVID-19 patients, or 68 per cent of the infections, have so far recovered.

Over 195.3 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines have been administered in the country, including 178.5 million shots on people aged 18 and above, said the ministry. Vietnam has by far gone through four coronavirus waves of increasing scale, complication, and infectivity. As of Wednesday, it has registered over 3.7 million locally transmitted COVID-19 cases since the start of the current wave in April 2021, said the ministry.—Xinhua

China's Congress to focus on boosting slowing economy

A property downturn, slowing economy and war in Ukraine loom large over this week's annual convening of China's legislature, with policymakers expected to focus on shoring up faltering growth.

The rubber-stamp parliament starting Saturday in Beijing gathers some 3,000 members of the National People's Congress (NPC) for highly choreographed meetings over bills, budgets and personnel changes.

The ruling Communist Party uses the opportunity to tout its achievements while also setting the country's economic blueprint and GDP target for the year ahead. Much of the NPC's agenda is unknown until during — or even after — the multi-day meeting, with many sessions taking place behind closed doors.

But this year, concerns are

bound to centre on the country's sluggish economic growth, partly

down to a crunch in the crucial property sector — which makes up as much as a quarter of national output. Stringent "zero-Covid" measures including harsh lockdowns and closed borders have also been a major blow to manufacturing hubs, tourist centres and port cities.

Meanwhile, the Russian invasion of Ukraine has raised the prospect of spiking food and oil prices, with fears over supplies of crucial commodities from the region being affected.

Commerce Minister Wang Wentao admitted to journalists this week that China's economy faces "huge" pressure this year.

GDP and stability

Beijing traditionally announces its new economic growth target at Premier Li Keqiang's annual "state of the nation" speech at the NPC, followed by his rare — but heavily stage-managed — press conference.

Germany begins slow move away from Russian gas after Ukraine invasion

THE invasion of Ukraine has thrown Germany's problematic dependence on Russian gas into stark relief, forcing Europe's largest economy to urgently reshape its energy mix.

In a previously unthinkable step for Chancellor Olaf Scholz's young government, the crisis even has politicians considering delaying Germany's planned exit from nuclear energy and coal to keep the lights on.

"We will change course to overcome our import dependence," Scholz said Sunday at an extraordinary session of the Bundestag, or lower house of parliament, on the Ukraine crisis.—AFP ■

IMF urges Sri Lanka to raise taxes, devalue currency

THE International Monetary Fund warned crisis-hit Sri Lanka on Thursday that its foreign debt was "unsustainable", and called for devaluation and higher taxes to revive the almost bankrupt economy.

The pandemic pushed the South Asian island's tourism sector -- a key foreign-exchange earner -- off a cliff, and the government in March 2020 imposed a broad import ban to try to shore up foreign currency.

But more than two years on, Sri Lanka is grappling with food and fuel shortages, which this week saw its public transport crippled as buses ran out of diesel and the state imposed blackouts.—AFP

Ukraine war impact on US economy 'highly uncertain': Fed chief

THE impact of the conflict in Ukraine on the US economy is "highly uncertain" and the central bank will need to move with care to contain rising inflation and ensure the recovery continues, Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell said Wednesday.

With US prices rising at their fastest pace in four decades and oil soaring to nearly \$113 a barrel on Wednesday due to the war and the sanctions imposed on Moscow by Washington and Brussels, the Fed chief repeated that policymakers are ready to raise interest rates to tamp down

However, Powell said the central bank will "proceed carefully," and he favours increasing the benchmark borrowing rate by a modest quarter-point at the Fed's meeting later this month, although more aggressive moves

Turkey inflation woes pit tenants against landlords

KICKED out in the middle of a harsh Turkish winter, 30-yearold Erdem Yilmaz calculated that he spent two and a half months' salary to urgently relocate to a new home in Istanbul.

The father of a two-year-old is not the only Turk in this situation after last year's currency crisis.

Disputes between homeowners and tenants have risen sharply in recent months in Turkey after annual inflation reached nearly 50 per cent in January, the highest since April 2002 and may well reach a new peak on Thursday when new monthly data will be published.

In the same period, rents

have exploded by 85 per cent in Istanbul and by 69 per cent at the national level, according to analysis by Bahcesehir University.

But salaries have not risen at the same pace, with most increasing by between 30 and 50 per cent on average in January.—AFP ■

TOYOTA said Thursday it would suspend operations at its only factory in Russia and stop shipping vehicles to the country, citing "supply chain disruptions" linked to Moscow's assault on

The world's top-selling carmaker said its plant in Saint Petersburg produced around 80,000 vehicles last year, mainly for the Russian market and representing just a fraction of the 10.5 million vehicles made worldwide by the Japanese group.

employs around 2,600 people, a Toyota spokeswoman told AFP, confirming the supply disruption was linked to the conflict.

Toyota has no factories in Ukraine but said sales operations in the country had been suspended since 24 February, when Moscow launched its assault.

Western governments, sporting organizations and big companies have cut Russia off or dealt it punishing sanctions over the internationally condemned attack. And other Japanese firms announced Thursday that they were halting or altering business as a result of the situation.—AFP ■

uct Safety Commission said in a recall notice that it received slightly more than 100 reports of Ionic wearers being burned by the smartwatches.

A handful of those burns were reported to be second-degree or third-degree.

"Consumers should immediately stop using the recalled Ionic smartwatches," the commission urged.

About a million Ionic smartwatches have been sold in the United States and another 693,000 or so outside the country, according to the notice.

Fitbit is offering refunds of \$299 each for the recalled smartwatches, which the company had manufactured in Taiwan but stopped producing in 2020.

Google completed its buy of Fitbit early last year in a deal valued at \$2.1 billion and is expected to soon release a Pixel smartwatch designed to sync with Android-powered smartphones.—AFP ■

Equities rise as Powell soothes rate fears, oil close to \$120

STOCKS rose Thursday after Federal Reserve chief Jerome Powell said the bank would hike interest rates gradually to fight inflation, though oil marched towards \$120 as the Ukraine conflict continues to roil energy markets.

With the Russian invasion of its neighbour hammering all assets across the board as uncertainty reigns supreme, traders were given a much-needed shaft of light on Wednesday when the Fed boss eased concerns over its plans for tightening policy.

Powell told lawmakers he

was in favour of a moderate pace of rate increases, with a 25-basis-point lift this month, as he tries to nurture the economic recovery while keeping a lid on prices, which are rising at their fastest pace in 40 years.

He warned that the "nearterm effects on the US economy of the invasion of Ukraine, the ongoing war, the sanctions, and of events to come, remain highly uncertain".

The comments soothed concerns that officials could announce an aggressive 50-basis-point lift. The issue of Fed tightening has cast a pall over markets for months, bringing a near two-year rally to an abrupt end, and that has now been compounded by the Ukraine

Powell did, however, say the bank would remain "nimble" to events and would act more aggressively if needed down the line.

Meanwhile, St. Louis Fed chief James Bullard said he was for a "rapid withdrawal of policy accommodation", as Chicago president Charles Evans added that policy was currently "wrong-footed" and should be tightened.—AFP ■

Auctioneer Sotheby's sees double benefit to crypto wave

SOTHEBY'S auction house is almost three centuries old but its top brass want to embrace the cutting edge of technology and all of its buzzwords -- metaverse, NFT and crypto among them.

"The reason Sotheby's has existed for 277 years is because we have a history of embracing innovation and so NFTs is no different," Charles Stewart, the firm's American chief executive,

tells AFP in an interview.

He is talking about non-fungible tokens, the ubiquitous digital objects that are linked to pieces of art or other items, some of which the ancient auction house has sold for millions of dollars over the past year. And even better for Stewart's business, he says there is plenty of cross-pollination between the old and new art worlds.—AFP ■

Ukraine side playing for time at behest of US: Russian Foreign Minister

RUSSIAN Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov has said that Moscow is preparing for the second round of talks with Kyiv but the Ukrainian side is dragging its feet at the behest of Washington.

"We are ready for the second round of the negotiations, but the Ukrainian side is playing for time on the US' orders", Lavrov told Al Jazeera.

Amid Russia's military action in Ukraine, the second round of talks between the Russia and Ukraine delegation is scheduled to be held on Wednesday in Bela-

rus. Earlier, Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said that the Russian delegation will wait for the Ukrainian negotiators at the site of the talks late in the evening on Wednesday, Sputnik reported.

Peskov had confirmed that presidential aide Vladimir Medinsky remains the main Russian negotiator in Russia's talks with Ukraine. The first round of talks between the two sides was held in the Gomel region of Belarus on Monday. The talks are aimed at finding a way to end the Ukraine conflict

Vladimir Medinsky told reporters that during the negotiations, the sides managed to find "some common points on which we predict common positions can be found". Following the talks, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy's office said Russia and Ukraine identified some priority topics on which they have outlined certain decisions.

His office had said earlier that the key "issue of the negotiations is an immediate ceasefire and the withdrawal of troops from the territory of Ukraine".—ANI

Japan to accept people displaced by Russian invasion of Ukraine

JAPAN is planning to accept people fleeing Russia's invasion of Ukraine at an early date, Prime Minister Fumio Kishida said Wednesday as Tokyo ramps up its humanitarian support.

The government will first allow in people who have fled Ukraine and have relatives or acquaintances in Japan. But the door will also open to those who do not, given the severe humanitarian situation, Kishida said.

"Japan will allow in people who have fled Ukraine to third countries as we wish to show our solidarity with the people of Ukraine when the world is at a critical juncture," Kishida told reporters after speaking by phone with German and Polish leaders. "The Ukrainian situation is tense, and refugees are growing in large numbers. We will make preparations to cope with this situation as soon as possible," he said.—Kyodo

US expels Russian national working for UN

THE United States is expelling a Russian national who is working with the UN Secretariat, said a UN spokesman on Tuesday.

"I can confirm that the US Mission to the United Nations informed the Secretariat on 28 February (of) its decision to take action under Section 13b of the UN-US Headquarters Agreement with respect to a staff member in the Secretariat," said Stephane Dujarric, spokesman for UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres. "We regret that we find ourselves in this situation, but are engaging with the host country under Section 13b of the agreement," he said.—Xinhua

Athens evacuates Greeks from Ukraine as Russia advances

ATHENS on Wednesday launched an operation to evacuate Greek diplomats, journalists and other citizens from the Ukrainian city of Mariupol as Russian forces push further into the country. A convoy of 21 cars with over 80 people had set out, accompanied by the ambassador to Ukraine, Greek public television ERT reported.

A Greek foreign ministry source said the convoy would head west under Russian assurances of safety, picking up people from other cities including Dnipro and Zaporizhzhia.

"Mariupol today is under fire from the north and south, it is a surrounded city," junior foreign minister Miltiadis Varvitsiotis told ERT, warning the journey of 1,100 kilometres (685 miles) will be "difficult, even in terms of obtaining fuel".—AFP ■

Russian advances in the south

Russian forces take the Black Sea city of Kherson in southern Ukraine, a significant victory for Moscow after a string of military setbacks.

Russian forces also reportedly surround Mariupol, a strategic port on the Sea of Azov that sits between Russian-controlled Crimea and breakaway Donbas republics.

Kharkiv bombarded

Ukraine's second city Kharkiv continues to come under severe Russian shelling, with police and university buildings among the latest struck.

The Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe says a member of its Ukraine observer mission died in the shelling

Kyiv column 'stalled'

A senior US defence official says the massive column of Russian military vehicles amassed north of Kyiv has "stalled" due to fuel and food shortages, and Ukrainian resistance.

One million flee

More than one million people have fled Ukraine since the Russian invasion, the UN's refugee agency says, with the number rising rapidly.

First Russian toll

Russia says 498 of its troops have been killed in Ukraine, its first declared death toll since President Vladimir Putin launched his invasion a week ago.

The true number of casualties on each side is not known. The UN has recorded 227 civilian deaths.

War crimes probe

The International Criminal Court's chief prosecutor says an active probe into possible war crimes in Ukraine "will immediately proceed" after his office received the backing of 39 countries.

Ceasefire talks

Russia moots the possibility of discussing a ceasefire in talks with Ukraine scheduled for Thursday on the Belarus-Poland border.

Humanitarian corridors

Russia's Defence Ministry announces so-called humanitarian corridors for civilians to leave the most exposed Ukrainian cities including Kyiv, Kharkiv and Mariupol.

UN demands Russia's withdrawal

The UN General Assembly overwhelmingly adopts a resolution demanding Russia "immediately" withdraw from Ukraine. Moscow wins support from only four other nations — Belarus, North Korea, Eritrea and Syria. Its allies China and Cuba abstain. Russian jets over Swedish airspace

The Swedish Armed Forces say that four Russian fighter jets entered Sweden's air space to the east of the island of Gotland in the Baltic Sea.

Oligarchs targeted

The US launches "Klepto-Capture" tasked with the aim of seizing the yachts, private jets and luxury homes of Russian oligarchs.

Chelsea Russian owner Roman Abramovich confirms he will sell the Premier League club, saying it is in its "best interest".

Appeal to Russian mothers

Ukraine's defence ministry invites the mothers of Russian troops captured on the battle-field to come and collect their sons, in an apparent attempt to embarrass Moscow.

Navalny tells Russians to protest

Jailed Kremlin critic Alexei Navalny urges Russians to protest daily against the invasion of Ukraine, saying they should not be a "nation of frightened cowards".

Belarus punished

The United States follows the EU in targeting Russian ally Belarus with sanctions, choking off its import of technological goods. Washington also hits Russia's defence industry.—AFP

Georgia to apply 'immediately' for EU membership

GEORGIA will "immediately" apply for EU membership, the Black Sea nation's ruling party said Wednesday, a day after the European Parliament backed war-torn Ukraine's bid to apply for EU membership. The ruling Georgian Dream party chairman, Irakli Kobakhidze, announced the party's "decision today to immediately apply for the EU membership".

Georgia calls on the EU "to review our application in an urgent manner and to make the decision to grant Georgia the status of an EU membership candidate", he told journalists.

The decision was made "based on the overall political context and the new reality", he added.

Georgia's EU integration would put the country "on a path

which will lead our country to a qualitative increase in our population's wellbeing, security, and to de-occupation," he added.

Georgia's decision followed a similar move by Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelensky, who won backing from MEPs in a non-binding resolution recommending EU bodies grant Ukraine the status of candidate country.— AFP

Russia seizes key southern Ukraine city after week of war

RUSSIAN troops have seized Kherson, the first major Ukrain-

ian city to fall in a devastating week-old war that has already created one million refugees.

The capture of the Black Sea city of 290,000 people, which just last year hosted NATO-supported war games, appeared a significant boost for Moscow as it readied for potential ceasefire talks on Thursday.

Russian "occupiers" were in "all parts" of Kherson, Ukrainian regional official Gennady Lakhuta conceded late on Wednesday. After a three-day siege that left Kherson short of food and medicine, and struggling to collect and bury its dead, the town's mayor also announced he was in talks with "armed guests".—AFP

US delays ICBM test to avoid raising nuclear tensions with Russia

THE US Defence Department said Wednesday it will postpone an intercontinental ballistic missile test in an effort to avoid any actions that could further heighten tensions with Russia amid its ongoing invasion of Ukraine.

"We have no intention in engaging in any actions that can be misunderstood or misconstrued," Pentagon spokesman John Kirby said as he announced the delay of the Minuteman III ICBM test launch scheduled for this week, after Russian President Vladimir Putin said he was putting his country's nuclear forces on high alert.

Kirby criticized Russia for its "provocative rhetoric", and emphasized the United States has "not taken any similar steps," while insisting its ability to defend its homeland, as well as its allies and partners, remains "fully intact and ready".

The decision to postpone the ICBM test has not been taken lightly, but is intended to demonstrate that the United States is "a responsible nuclear power", Kirby told a press conference.

Russia's invasion of the former Soviet republic has been underway for about a week, although the Pentagon views the Russian troops' advance towards the capital Kyiv as having stalled in the face of resistance by Ukrainians.—Kyodo

EU lays out plan for Ukrainian refugees to stay 2 years

THE European Commission on Wednesday set out its proposal for EU member states to let Ukrainians fleeing Russia's invasion stay and work in the bloc for an initial two years.

The urgent plan is being rolled out as over 650,000 people have already fled across the border into eastern EU states Poland, Slovakia, Hungary and Romania that neighbour Ukraine.

Many more are expected as the Kremlin's forces unleash ferocious bombardments against major cities.

The United Nation's refugee agency, UNHCR, said on Tuesday an estimated one million people were displaced inside Ukraine by the Russian invasion.

"Europe stands by those in need of protection. All those fleeing Putin's bombs are welcome in Europe," European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen said in a statement.

"We will provide protection to those seeking shelter and we will help those looking for a safe way home."

The proposal by the EU's executive would give refugees from Ukraine and family members a residence permit and the right to access work and education for an initial two years.

Hundreds of Ukrainian Jews to arrive in Israel on Sunday

HUNDREDS of Ukrainians are set to arrive in Israel over the weekend, the body in charge of processing immigration for Jews abroad said on Wednesday, following Russia's invasion of its neighbour.

According to the Jewish Agency, over 300 "Ukrainian Jewish refugees will arrive on three separate flights from Warsaw, Moldova and Romania" on Sunday.

The Romanian flight will carry 100 orphans, it added in a statement.

Blinken to visit Poland, Baltics, Moldova in support of Ukraine

US top diplomat Antony Blinken will travel in the coming days to Belgium, Poland, the Baltic states and Moldova to reaffirm Washington's support for Ukraine, the State Department announced Wednesday. The trip, from 3 to 8 March "continues extensive consultations and coordination with our NATO Allies and European partners about the Russian Federation's continued premeditated, unprovoked, and unjustified war against Ukraine," State Department spokesman Ned Price said in a statement.

Abramovich to sell Chelsea with net proceeds going to Ukraine war victims

CHELSEA'S Russian owner Roman Abramovich said on Wednesday he had made the "incredibly difficult" decision to sell the Premier League club, pledging that proceeds would go to victims of the war in Ukraine.

The billionaire believes it is in the "best interest" of the Champions League holders if he parts ways with the club he has transformed since he bought it in 2003.

The dramatic development comes days after Abramovich said he was handing over control of Chelsea to trustees of its charitable foundation following

Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

"I have always taken decisions with the club's best interest at heart," Abramovich said in a statement. "In the current situation, I have therefore taken the decision to sell the club, as I believe this is in the best interest of the club, the fans, the employees, as well as the club's sponsors and partners."

It is a seismic moment for English football after nearly two decades during which Abramovich's team have consistently challenged for the sport's top honours.

Chelsea have won 19 major trophies in the Abramovich era, including their first two Champions League crowns and five Premier League titles.

But the 55-year-old's reign will come to an end in the fallout from Russia's invasion of its neighbour. —AFP ■

Juve seize late control of cup semi on Vlahovic's return to Fiorentina

JUVENTUS took control of their Italian Cup semi-final on Wednesday after Lorenzo Venuti's late own goal gave the visitors a 1-0 first-leg win on Dusan Vlahovic's return to Florence.

Venuti left the field in tears after he deflected Juan Cuadrado's cross into his own net in the first minute of stoppage time to hand Juve the win and a potentially crucial away goal.

Serbia forward Vlahovic was back at the Stadio Artemio

Franchi for the first time since moving to Turin in January but had little joy for depleted Juve in a tense match which lacked quality.

"It was a difficult match because we were missing so many players, but we managed to keep order and we're improving," said Juve coach Massimiliano Allegri to Mediaset.

"We're doing well physically and psychologically, now we need to put this match to once side and look to the weekend."

The tie will be decided at the Alianz Stadium next month, with the winners taking on either AC Milan or Inter Milan — who drew 0-0 on Tuesday — in May's final in Rome.

"I don't know what more I could have asked, we had 22 shots and hardly conceded anything at the back," said Fiorentina coach Vincenzo Italiano.

"We've still got the second leg and we'll go to Turin to play our own game." —AFP ■
