Inflow of large amounts of twenty-thousand currency notes to monetary market absolutely impossible

MAJ-GEN Zaw Min Tun replies to queries raised by a reporter on the distribution of twenty-thousand-kyat new Myanmar currency note as follows: —

Q: Mingalaba! I would like to raise a question related to the printing and distribution of Myanmar currency notes of twenty thousand kyats on 23 July 2023. People are worried about hiking prices of foreign exchange rates and gold prices

because of the printing and distribution of twenty thousand currency notes. So, how do you clarify current situations to the government and the people?

A: We enquired about the root causes of such an event. First, we found it as rumours. I would like to firstly explain the spreading of rumours. The Central Bank of Myanmar announced 8 am

IN a significant boost to Myanmar's economy, the Myanmar Investment Commission (MIC) has greenlit to ten new investment projects, with a major focus on the power sector, during its meeting on 24 July 2023. The approved projects, which also span industries like electricity, hospitality, tourism, livestock and fishery, are set to attract a total investment of US\$446.58 million and K254,951.442 million.

Research on costumes, genetics of Pyu people to be carried out

U Aung Aung Kyaw, Director of the Department of Archaeology and National Museum, said that research on the Pyu period costumes, the genetics and life-span calculation of the Pyu people will be carried out.

To do such research, the Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture has currently established the Pyu generation research supervision team and the Pyu generation field research team.

“Regarding Pyu, our department is verifying literary evidence, field research reports, excavation findings, and stone inscriptions with a team of research officers led by the Deputy Director-General.

And the evidence is being extracted. Later, in addition to

the expert staff, the Myanmar Historical Commission is planning to gather Pyu-related experts and hold workshops. We will proceed after coordination and verification,” U Aung Aung Kyaw said.

Throughout the history of Myanmar, the genetics of the Pyu people who have passed through the history from the Stone Age, the Iron Age, and the Bronze Age to the Pyu period will be compared with the genetics of today’s people.

Pyu generation research will also be conducted in the field at Pyu ancient cities and Iron and Bronze Age sites.

As the research work is done at the national level, it will be documented in the whole process. — ASH/KZL

We never legalize official currencies: SAC Information Team Leader

yesterday concerning the circulation of a new currency twenty-thousand note. In mid-day, two rumours came out. The first rumour was the circulation of twenty-thousand-kyat notes; more currency notes may come out; higher valued currency notes may emerge; Myanmar currency value will decline; and it may cause a high inflation rate. One more item of rumour came out a few hours later. Such a rumour was intentionally spread that existing currency notes may be revoked. As that day was Sunday, the forex rate of the US dollar gradually increased and the gold price rose as well. As it was an office holiday, the US dollar exchange rate was slightly high due to the lack of exchanging currencies practically. The gold price was also sharply high. This morning, the Central Bank of Myanmar issued a press release on the Q&A session for public observation. Such a Q&A session showed comprehensive facts and data. After the CBM issued it at about 9 am, one more rumour came out between 10:30 am and 11 am. Such a rumour was based on some parts of the Q&A session of the CBM. It showed that everybody can take three twenty thousand currency notes each. Moreover, it mentioned that a large number of such currency notes based on the Myanmar population have been printed and published. At the same time, some exile media mentioned the fabricated stories presented by a Myanmar economic observer. The rumour carried that it was not good in the economic situation as the government published new currency notes. Consequently, the US dollar

exchange rate and prices of gold were high. Later, prices of other commodities were also raised. As a main reason to cause such an event, the CBM issued an announcement on 23 July 2023, regarding the export and import measures. Once, an announcement was mentioned that 65 per cent of earnings from export must be exchanged with Myanmar currency. The Chairman of the State Administration Council always talked about 65 per cent

from foreign exchange were higher in the market. The US dollar forex rate was more stable. At present, as twenty thousand currency notes were published, we accept that rumours were spread to cause instability in situations. Importantly, I would like to inform such an issue and guarantee them the stability of the situation. The Q&A session of the CBM issued at about 9 am today was comprehensive.



of exchanging the currency whenever he met with MSME businesspersons or other businesspersons. He told businesspersons or industrial entrepreneurs that the exchange rate with Myanmar currency must be amended and reduced at an appropriate time. On 13 July, the CBM issued a press release that 50 per cent of earnings from export must be exchanged with Myanmar currency instead of 65 per cent. After that, everybody may notice that the trade process of the nation speeded up. Moreover, incomes

However, it includes the technical terms and the public may understand it. What I want to say regarding this case is that... No 1, the K20,000-note is not issued in a large sum but it is just a commemorative note. Other countries had issued currency notes as a gesture of commemorative events. But, we have never made that before. We minted gold coins marking the 75th Diamond Jubilee Independence Day. At that time, although people can buy at fixed prices, they cannot purchase a lot. The current case is

like that. Another fact is that it includes in the statement of the Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM). The new K 20,000 note is just a commemorative note and it will be granted if the people pay the equal value of note at the bank. There is also a limitation. If the people exchange their damaged notes with new K 20,000 notes worth K10 million at the bank, they will not be granted K10 million. One person can get only three K20,000 notes. These three notes will not be issued for free. As the saying goes, if one gives rice, he can get oil. The banknotes are aimed at exchanging damaged banknotes. The CBM will destroy all the damaged notes. Therefore, I am sure that it is completely impossible for new K20,000 notes to enter the financial market massively. I also guarantee that it will not happen. So, there will be no inflation. It spreads rumours to occur instability. The next fact is that the government also guarantees businesses in Section 36 of the Constitution. The government abides by the 2008 Constitution. It also assures with Section 36 (d) shall not nationalize economic enterprises and Section 36(f) shall not demonetize the currency legally in circulation. Therefore, we will not legalize the officially issued currency as an illegal denomination. I also reaffirm that. The last one is that some are preparing to spread rumours in time regarding the current situation. The government can control these circumstances in business sectors. Therefore, what I want to inform the people is that they can operate for their socioeconomic development, and I guarantee it. Thank you. — MNA/TTA, KTZH

27 mln fingerlings to be added into lakes in Yangon Region

THE Department of Fisheries estimates to add 27 million fingerlings into the lakes of Yangon Region this monsoon and it has already freed 7.903 million fingerlings, according to the regional department.

The department released 26.1 million fingerlings last year. It conducted the 22nd fish-adding ceremony at 20 lakes in districts and townships in the third week of July accounting for to 29.27 per cent of this year's target.

"The Head of State instructed all those concerned all to add fingerlings on priority as the people can catch them as food in the natural lakes directly. Therefore, we release two-inch-sized fingerlings into the main natural waters or lakes in the regions. If we free 100 fish, 80 may be alive. We add the fish species with the objectives such as ensuring the sustainable development of fishery together with fish resources conservation, to prevent extinc-

tion of fish species, ensuring the sustainable development of fish species in natural lakes, developing the fish production and socioeconomic status of locals with food security," said U Myint Shwe, Director of the

region department.

The Yangon Region Department of Fisheries added a total of 7.903 million fingerlings — three million in April and 4.75 million during the third week in July. If the fish recourses are

decreasing in the river, creeks and lakes due to natural causes or human beings, the fish-adding programme can make the situation normal. Therefore, the fingerlings are freed into the natural freshwater lakes

in states and regions yearly to increase fish resources.

The Yangon Region has 100,000 acres of fish farms and produces freshwater fish. It has adequate food and exports to regions and states including Nay Pyi Taw. The freshwater fish and prawns from Ayeyawady and Bago regions are packed at 79 cold storage facilities to export and the country directly exports Rohu to Bangladesh via Sittway. Increasing the production of marine products that have large export volumes and providing techniques and agrochemicals to promote production rates per acre can ensure foreign incomes for the farmers.

The department launched the diploma course in fisheries and aquaculture at Fisheries Institute (Twantay) last year. It is estimated to add over 100 million fingerlings across the nation in 2023-2024FY and 27 million fish in Yangon Region. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/KTZH

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Kachin State receives 885 foreign tourists in H1 of 2023

DIRECTOR U Khine Win of the Directorate of Hotels and Tourism (Kachin State) said that a total of 885 foreign tourists visited destinations in Kachin State from January to June 2023. The number of tourists has increased by 429 compared to the same period last year.

The number of homegrown and foreign tourists is increasing year by year as 71,771 tourists visited Kachin State in 2021, 184,111 in 2022, and 70,788 from January to April 2023. The incomes for those years were K1,353.9 million and US\$16,635, K3,249.1 million and \$47,535, and K1,333 million and \$10,785, respectively, he added.

The Kachin State Government is making efforts to develop new destinations in the region and implementing the upgrade of the Myitsoe region (the confluence of the Maykha and Malikha rivers) as a tour-

ism icon of Kachin State. They are also coordinating with residents and PutaO District tourism management organizations to make the PutaO region a capital of domestic and foreign tourism since it has many natural beauties, including snow-capped mountains.

For the development of tourism activities in Kachin State, new licences were granted to 167 tourist guides, 61 tourism businesses, and 69 hotels and guesthouses in the financial years 2021-2022 and 2022-2023. — ASH/CT

Myanmar eases COVID-19 restrictions for international travellers

THE Ministry of Health has relaxed the COVID-19 restrictions for international travellers entering Myanmar by air and by sea, Dr Htay Lwin, head of Yan-

gon Region's Public Health and Medical Services Departments. Health Declaration Form is mandatory to fill in for all international travellers who arrive in

Myanmar by air and by sea. The form needs to be submitted to health officials, according to the ministry's notification for public health guidelines released in

early July. Legal action will be taken against those who fail to do so under the existing laws.

"Earlier, foreign travellers need to show proof of COVID-19 vaccination certificate. If they cannot provide them, RT-PCR testing within 48 hours was mandatory for all travellers.

If not, they must be quarantined for a week. Now, the neighbouring countries eased all the COVID-19 rules including vaccination certificates and health declaration forms.

For Myanmar, a health declaration form is mandatory for entry into Myanmar. If a passenger is found to have a symptom of the disease, they will be examined. If the person tests positive, they will be transferred to Yangon General Hospital and Webagi Specialty Hospital for quarantine," Dr Htay Lwin elaborated.

Additionally, they need to

show Coronavirus travel medical insurance at the checkpoints. If foreign travellers can provide international health insurance and relevant health insurance from the respective government, they do not need to buy health insurance from Myanmar Insurance. If they do not have one, they need to buy coronavirus health insurance from Myanmar Insurance.

Travellers need to inform the related health department if they find any symptoms of COVID-19 during their stay in Myanmar. They can also take Covid tests at the laboratories recognized by the Ministry of Health if it is required for their next destination.

Travellers must receive treatment at the relevant treatment centres or hospitals or hotels for quarantine if they test positive. They must incur healthcare costs. — ASH/EM

Eight new cases of COVID-19 reported on 24 July, total figure registers 640,985

MYANMAR'S COVID-19-positive cases rose to 640,985 after eight new cases were reported on 24 July 2023 according to the Ministry of Health. Therefore, a total of 10,994,246 laboratory samples were examined to date and the confirmed COVID-19 cases reached 640,985. The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached 619,773 including one new recovery. The death toll from COVID-19 in the country registered 19,494 on 24-7-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic. YCDC decides to produce quality humus from waste for crop plantations in Yangon Region

THE Yangon City Development Committee recently stated that it will distribute quality humus produced from waste from landfills in the Yangon Region to crop plantations.

EM Bokashi is being produced from the waste at Thiri Mingala Market in Hline Township and humus is being produced at landfills in Yangon Region to use it in greening tasks of the Yangon City.

Spoiled and damaged vegetables discarded at Thiri Mingala market in Hline Township are used in producing five tonnes of humus per day. Businesspersons from Nyaungnabin agricultural and livestock special zone in Hlegu Township purchase humus, according to the markets department of YCDC.

Humus is also used at monsoon paddy plantations and vegetable patches of YCDC. The committee decided to pro-

duce quality humus from waste to sell to farmers for vegetable plantations in the regions.

A total of 33 townships in the municipal area of YCDC dispose of some 2,500 tonnes of waste daily. These are piled at landfills in Hteinbin of Hline Township, Daweigyoung of Dagon Myothit (North) Township, Kyuchaung of Dala Township, Hlawga and Seikkyi-Khanaungto for the production of humus.

The wastes are piled in relevant districts of the Yangon Region. Waste from the west and north districts of the Yangon Region is disposed of at the Hteinbin landfill in Hline Township, that of east and south districts at Daweigyoung landfill in Dagon Myothit (North) Township, that of Dala Township to Dala landfill and that of Seikkyi-Khanaungto to the landfill of the township daily. — ASH/TTA

Illegal trade eradication teams make significant seizures worth millions

A combined team managed by the Bago Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force conducted inspections near Shwethanlwin Tollgate on 21 July. They intercepted a Man tractor head and a trailer (estimated value of K70 million) travelling from Myawady to Yangon, carrying five kinds of goods worth K31,614,152, including 300 sets of Owl offline UPS that were not declared in the Import Declaration (ID). The action was carried out following Customs procedures.

Likewise, a combined team

supervised by the Mandalay Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force intercepted a Nissan

Diesel tractor head, a Tongya semitrailer, a Dongfeng tractor head, and a Yuchang semitrail-



er (approximate value of K114 million) heading to Mandalay from Muse, at the 23/6 Milepost on Mandalay-Lashio Road on 22 July. The vehicles were carrying 21 kinds of smuggled goods worth K114,309,720, including 2,700 kilogrammes of Lion Head food colour and 1,330 kilogrammes of castor oil, which exceeded the quantity mentioned in the Import Declaration (ID). The action was taken under Customs procedures.

The combined on-duty team conducted inspections at the

Yepu permanent checkpoint and seized illegal goods worth K29.85 million, including 180 jade beads in various sizes, from a Toyota Mark II (estimated value of K25 million) on 23 July. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

As a result, a total of 10 arrests were made over three consecutive days from 21 to 23 July, with an estimated value of K384,773,872, according to the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee's report. — MNA/MKKS

Palm oil wholesale reference price for Yangon Region set K130 higher this week ending 30 July

THE wholesale reference rate of palm oil for the Yangon market has increased by K130 per viss this week ending 30 July, according to the Supervisory Committee on edible oil import and distribution.

The reference price was set at K4,100 per viss from 17 to 23 July. For the week ending 30 July, the price was set higher at K4,230 per viss. The figures showed an increase of K130 per viss compared to that of the previous week.

The Supervisory Committee on edible oil import and distribution under the Ministry of Commerce has been closely observing the FOB prices in Malaysia and Indonesia including transportation cost, tariff and banking service, and issuing the wholesale market reference rate for edible oil every week.

Yet, the palm oil market

price is exorbitantly high compared to the reference price.

If those edible oil retailers and wholesalers are found overcharging, storing inventory intentionally and attempting unscrupulous action to manipulate the market, they will face legal action under the Essential Supplies and Service Act, MoC released a statement.

The Ministry of Commerce is striving for consumers not to worry over the supply of edible oil. The ministry is also trying to secure edible oil sufficiency, supervise the market to offer reasonable prices to consumers and maintain price stability.

At present, mobile market trucks operated by oil importing companies, in coordination with Myanmar Edible Oil Dealers' Association, were back to business in some townships on 17 July 2022 to offer palm oil at a

subsidized rate. They offer palm oil at a fairer price to the consumers directly depending on the reference price. However, there are limited sources of supply although they directly sell

the palm oil at reference rate depending on the volume quota.

The domestic consumption of edible oil is estimated at 1 million tonnes per year. The local cooking oil production is just

about 400,000 tonnes. To meet the oil sufficiency in the domestic market, about 700,000 tonnes of cooking oil are yearly imported through Malaysia and Indonesia. — NN/EM

MGEA temporarily suspends gold trading to curb market manipulation amid new currency issuance

IN response to concerns about potential market manipulation arising from the issuance of the new K20,000 notes by the Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM), the Mandalay Gold Entrepreneurs Association (MGEA) has taken the proactive step of temporarily halting gold trading, according to a statement from an association official.

The CBM's announcement on 23 July regarding the issuance of the new currency notes, commencing from 31 July 2023, has led to a limited exchange of torn, dirty, and damaged notes for the new ones, while the currency already in circulation remains valid as official tender.

However, the news of the new currency has had an impact on the prices of gold and the dollar exchange rate, both of which have been on the rise. As of 24 July, pure gold was priced at K3.58 million per tical, and the exchange rate for a US dollar stood at K3,420.

MGEA's decision to suspend gold trading aims to prevent any potential price manipulation during this period. CBM, in its notification about the new K20,000 notes featuring an albino elephant, has made it clear that it will collaborate with law enforcement authorities to investigate and take necessary actions against any unscrupulous individuals attempting to artificially hike commodity prices and foreign exchange rates to the detriment of the public interest.

Additionally, the Yangon Gold Entrepreneurs Association called on traders on 24 July to avoid spreading malicious rumours that could cause commodity price volatility, urging cooperation among members and gold shop owners to ensure price stability.

Earlier, to stabilize the gold price, MGEA had sold over seven visses of pure gold at a special price within two weeks starting from 19 June.

Myanmar's gold price is closely tied to the spot gold price and the US dollar exchange rate. The recent surge in the dollar, exchanging at over K4,500, had pushed the gold price to a record-high of K3.7 million per tical in late August 2022.

In a bid to alleviate the gold price surge, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation had sold gold ingots through a competitive bidding system in Yangon, Mandalay, and Nay Pyi Taw. Furthermore, both the YGEA and Mandalay Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association had sold gold bullion supplied by their executive members as part of their strategy to reduce the gold price. In light of these developments, stakeholders in Myanmar's gold market are closely monitoring the situation, and with the temporary suspension of gold trading by MGEA, efforts to maintain market stability remain a top priority. — NN/EM

Issue of new currency note cannot impact on forex market, says CBM

THE Central Bank of Myanmar emphasized on 23 July in its press release that the issue of the new K20,000 note will not negatively affect the daily forex market trading.

Responding to the public concerns over the issue of the new banknote, CBM focuses on monetary policies and framework to calculate and hold the specified Reserve Requirement Ratio in the financial system to reduce and curb inflation and contribute to the country's Gross Domestic Product growth target.

The authorized banks raise and reduce the reserve requirement ratio in the financial system rather than interest rate hikes to stimulate businesses. CBM is taking a close look at the money supply to increase and decrease the ratio.

This new note can be con-

sidered a celebration and it will be distributed in a limited number. So, the inflation fear is unlikely. CBM is closely observing the foreign currency flow daily to handle inflation and stabilize the forex market.

CBM is also enhancing liquidity swap operations. Those banks with foreign currency reserves are injecting money into the businesses in need.

The foreign exchange rate is quite stable, according to the exchange rate transacted on the official online trading platform for interbank transactions among authorized dealers. As the banks are selling and exchanging the US dollars, there does not impede importing businesses.

Thus, there will be no impact on the daily forex trading with the issue of the new K20,000 note. — TWA/EM

The Burma Circle of the Geological Survey of India and their Contributions to the Geology of Myanmar

V P Sondhi came from a respectable family of Jallundhur and was born on 10 March 1903. He had his early education in Jallundhur but joined the Prince of Wales College, Jammu for higher education. In 1925, he obtained his MSc degree from that College, then affiliated with Punjab University, and one of the earliest to start teaching geology in the country.

He joined the Geological Survey of India on November 3, 1926, as Assistant Superintendent, being the first Indian to be selected in the country as Class I, Officer. He had earlier spent a field season with AM Heron in Rajasthan and had given an excellent account of his knowledge and abilities, both theoretical and practical, and demonstrated a keen interest in fieldwork, so essential for a geologist. His recruitment in the Geological Survey of India was a consequence of this excellent report by Heron, so difficult to obtain from an Englishman who was then resentful of Indians entering in Class I, service.

In the Geological Survey of India, he started his career as a member of the Burma Party and carried out geological investigations in the Chindwin and Shwebo districts of Upper Burma. Work in this area, with immense mineral potential, is required also in sillimanite, barytes, stibnite, coal, lignite, salt and even building stones, besides groundwater investigations. In order to work out the regional geology of this vast but important area, Coggin Brown and Sondhi carried out joint traverses from Loilem to Maukmai, a distance of over 250 miles (400 kilometres), and from Taunggyi to Salween. Later on, Sondhi resurveyed a portion of the area and successfully identified two geological formations on lithological and palaeontological bases. Also, Sondhi traced the lead-silver ore belt northward and reported many other mineral deposits, whereas along with Clegg

he reported on the Gyophyu and Nyaunglebin Lakes scheme for gravity water supply to Rangoon. Most of this work, however, remained in manuscript reports.

Sondhi discovered many coal outcrops between the Loian Coalfield and the Minapalaung District and a good lignite deposit in the Tertiary lacustrine deposits in the Kengtung Valley.

During 1936-37 Sondhi accompanied the Sino-Burma Boundary Commission on the northeast frontier of Burma. Basically, his job was to carry out reconnaissance work to ensure that as far as possible no worthwhile mineral deposit was lost to China in the process of demarcating the boundary. However, he was in charge of topographic surveys, transport, etc. In addition, in recognition of the excellent job he did, he was honoured by MBE (Member of the British Empire), a relatively well-respected title for civilians, by the Government of the time. Sondhi was transferred back to Calcutta in 1937, but went abroad on study leave in 1937-38.

Geological Reconnaissance in the Southern Shan States

J Coggin Brown and V P Sondhi conducted Geological Reconnaissance in the Southern Shan States and reported in 1933. Due to limited space, only the significant points could be extracted as follows:-

Taunggyi to Hopong

The area covers map sheet 93/H1. For ten miles east of Taunggyi, as measured along the main road, Plateau Limestones continue. They build the precipitous crags and the ridge that faces a Lower Palaeozoic inlier on the west and overshadows Taunggyi on the east, in consequence of which the road has to make a detour of some miles to the south before continuing in its normal direction. These crags have a general easterly dip with a few minor undulations down to the Hopong bases. Also, Sondhi traced the lead-silver ore belt northward and reported many other mineral deposits, whereas along with Clegg

The rocks seen are all typical representatives of the lower di-

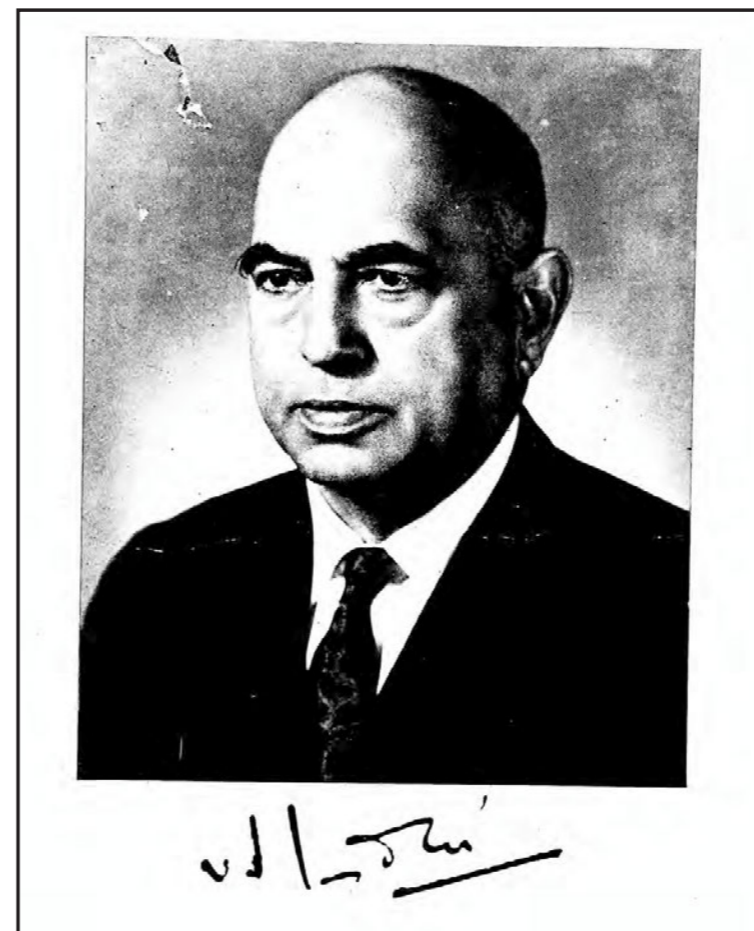
vision of the Plateau Limestone, sometimes grey brecciated dolomites friable enough to kicked to powder; often, harder, greyish white, recemented material with a deceptive sandy appearance and occasionally handed with pink. Travertine and secondary limestones are of common occurrence over the flat ground between the first and second steep descents, i.e., between miles 5 and 8.

Along their junction with the older rocks the Plateau Limestones are fossiliferous, showing sections of crinoidal stems, brachiopods, and corals. A cap of similar limestone rests unconformably upon the older rocks about four miles NNW of Hopong. The latter rocks that build up the greater portion of the ridge here, dip steeply to the east, and the Plateau Limestone, shows gentle dips to the northeast, forming the crest of the ridge with peaks of over 5,000 feet in height.

Traversal South of Hopong

The area covers map sheets 93 H1 and H2. Hopong lies at an elevation of 3,600 feet at the head of the narrow plain of the Nam Tamhpak, a stream that flows to the south through the small Shan States of Namhkok, Nawngwawn, Wa yin and Hsantung, for 86 miles before it turns east to enter the Nam Prawn.

A traverse was made down this valley from Hopong to Namhkok, a distance of 13 miles. Around Hopong the character of the country, although it is underlain by Lower Palaeozoic rocks, recalls the downs of Tamakan, between Kalaw and Taunggyi, in its rounded grassy outlines, bamboo groves, lines of giant aloes and occasional banyan trees, but the valley is hemmed into the north-east and west by limestone hills. For the greater part of the distance traversed, the road lies on the alluvium of the plain or on the lower flanks of the eastern foot-hills. Although exposures are few and far between, there is little doubt that for five- or six-miles Plateau Limestone forms both walls of the valley; thus, at the sixth mile tabular, westerly dip-

ping bands can be seen as steep scarps. The isolated hill of Loi Tang, which rises from the plain to the west of the eighth mile has a thick capping of Plateau Limestone, probably of the younger division, and may be entirely built of this rock.

Hopong to Htamsang

The higher ground east of Hopong, where the road crosses it, has no well-marked direction nor individuality for it consists, at any rate in this latitude, of a series of valleys of enclosed drainage, the winding rims of which give rise to a confused topography. Further south the development of a single ridge with peaks of over 8,000 feet in altitude, forming the boundary between the Hopong and Namhkok States on the west and Mong Prawn on the east, seems to betoken a change in lithological composition. Near mile 22-3 there is a cauldron valley with limestone peaks around it and craggy outcrops continue at intervals to the crest at 22-7. Here there is a change and limestones are replaced by brown-grey and

white, sandy shales.

Fossiliferous Upper Plateau Limestone

Beyond these shaly outcrops at mile 23-2 occurs the first of the fossiliferous localities of the upper division of the Plateau Limestone, the organic remains from which enabled Diener to prove its Permo-Carboniferous age. Middlemiss was the first to obtain fossils in this neighbourhood and though it is not possible exactly to determine the different localities he mentions, his descriptions of the rocks themselves cannot be improved upon and for this reason are summarized below. The conversion of the rough cart track which he traversed in 1898 into a modern motor road has destroyed the utility of his distance points as a means of identification.

As measured along the road, the places in which the best exposures of the bryozoan limestones occur at miles 23-7 and 24-1 on the roadside. From representative collections made at these localities, Dr F R C Reed has identified the fossils listed in his paper on

the Anthracolythic fauna of Southern Shan States. Htamsang Rest House is situated at miles 25-4 and around it and the village further west there are abundant rocky outcrops of the Lower Plateau protruding through the soil cap in all directions.

Htamsang to Mong Prawn

The area covers map sheet no. 93 H/5. After leaving the crest of the ridge with its richly fossiliferous, tabular Permo-Carboniferous limestones at miles 28-3, the road commences its winding descent to the Mong Prawn plain at mile 73-2, and about mile 36-5 again encounters fossiliferous Permo-Carboniferous strata which here border the plain. Between these two exposures, there is a series of rocks consisting in the main of greenish-grey shales, sandy shales, and purple mudstones with less frequent sandstones and a solitary band of limestone. From these rocks, C S Middlemiss in 1898 obtained an impression of part of a trilobite, a gastropod, and an ill-preserved cast of a portion of a Nautilus and some indistinct vermiform markings, but they failed to yield any fossils as a result of Dr Coggin Brown's earlier examination. He pointed out then that the evidence, scanty as it is, points to the series being older than the Plateau Limestones, while lithologically, especially in the presence of fine-grained sandstones, it appeared to have affinities with the Namhsim (Silurian) beds of the Northern States. Short notes of the remaining trips are:-

Mong Prawn to Loi-Samhpu Pass

The area covers map sheet no. 93 H/5 and H/9.

An unfossiliferous sandy series builds the western flanks of the Loi-Samhpu.

Loi-Samhpu Pass to Loilem

The area covers map sheet no. 93 H/9. Unfossiliferous limestones form the higher eastern flank of the Loi-Samhpu. The Panghkawkaeo graptolite bed was found to the west of Loilem. Silu-

rian limestone exposures near Loilem itself.

Loilem to Wan Pong

The area covers map sheet no. 93/H9. New fossil localities in Silurian rocks near Loilem. Types of Silurian limestone. The Panghkawkaeo graptolite bed. Upper Naungkangyi purple beds. Details of the more important exposures. A remarkable morphological change takes place at mile 65. A predominantly sandy series between mile 67 and Wan Pong. Possible Silurian correlation of the sandy series.

Mr Sandhi's Traverse from Loilem

The area covers map sheet no. 93 H/9. A series of interbedded limestones and mudstones. Loi Lang is built of Nyaungkangyi mudstones capped by limestone bands.

Traverse to the north of Loilem

The area covers map sheet no. 93 H/9 and G/12. Remains of Pleistocene lacustrine deposits. Mudstone at the 11th mile. Slags of former Iron smelting operations. Silurian horizons probably occur about miles 12 and 13.

Wan Pong to Hsaimong

The area covers map sheet no. 93 H/9 and H/13; 93 G/16;93 K/4 and K/7. The limestone plateau between Wan Pong and Nam Teng. Upper Plateau Limestone on the left bank of the Nam Teng. A Red Bed series overlies the Plateau Limestones. The Plateau Limestones appear again and continue to Hsaimong. Sandy sediments of a slight extent and unknown age near miles 118-5. Character of the limestone topography.

Hsaimong to Kunhing

The area covers map sheet no. 93 K/7 and 129.6 miles from Taunggyi. A steep descent down the Hwe Leng to the Nam Pang. Brecciated Plateau Limestone at Hsaimong. A fossiliferous series between the Plateau Limestone and Red Beds. The shaly

sequence. Occurrence of bands of limestone conglomerate. Limestones overlie the shales. A coarse basal conglomerate is followed by a Red Bed formation. Outcrops of the Red Beds between Wan Laikam and Kunhing. Correlation of Mesozoic rocks.

Kunhing to the Salween

The area covers map sheet no. 93 K/7, K/11 and K/12. Red Bed sandstone between 150-6 and 151-7. Chaung Magyi series forms the western bank of the Salween. Nyaungkangyis faulted into the Chaung Magyis.

Wan Pong to Mongnai

The area covers map sheet no. 93 H/9, H/13 and H/14. The southern extension of the Plateau Limestone. Outcrops of the brecciated limestone. Fossiliferous limestone. Alterations of both varieties of limestone. Mesozoic rocks of the south of Hai-pak. A limestone ridge borders the Nam Tawng Valley on the east. Differences between the eastern and western walls of the Nam Tawng Valley in Mong Nai. The Mong Nai Plain.

Mong Nai to Melun (Me-Lawn)

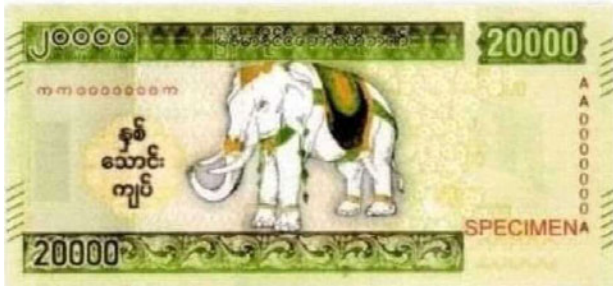
The area covers map sheet no. 93 H/14 and H/15. Older Plateau Limestones around Mong Nai. Thin remnants of Red Beds overlie it to the south. Lower Jurassic preserved by subsidence. The other Plateau Limestone recurs. Acidic igneous rocks not in situ near Melun.

The Old Silver Mines of Mawmai

The area covers map sheet no. 93 H/15. Upper Plateau Limestone between Melun and the old mines. Description of the old lead pits.

CBM to take action against market manipulation

THE Central Bank of Myanmar mentioned in its press release on 23 July that it will investigate and take action against those attempting market manipulation conduct for personal gains for reasons of the issue of the new K20,000 notes.

The newly issued note will not affect the currency in circulation. It will be issued and distributed in returns for defaced and damaged notes. For instance, if a person comes to exchange defective and mutilated notes worth K10 million, only three K20,000

notes are planned to be added to the exchanged amount along with other valid and existing currency notes.

As a result of this, the issue of the new currency note will not affect the value of the currency, the CBM highlighted.

The CBM will join hands with the authorities for law enforcement activities to investigate and take action against those with manipulative behaviour to raise commodity prices and dollar exchange rates as it harms the public interest. — TWA/EM

New passport applications allowed 6 months after lost advertisements

THE passport office announced that the number of people losing or damaging their passports both within the country and abroad is increasing each month.

It is mentioned in the announcement that to apply for a new passport, individuals need to place an advertisement in any state-owned newspaper, along with confirmation letters from the ward or village administrator and the police station. The advertisement should contain their name, father's name, citizenship scrutiny card number, and the lost passport's number.

After six months after the newspaper advertisement, they can apply for a new passport at the passport issuing offices by presenting the original newspaper copy. The applicant must sign a self-declaration stating that the passport was lost in the country and pay a book fee of K35,000, along with the K56,000 lost or damaged fines. — TWA/CT

U San Myint, a film actor known as Maung Min Lukalay, passes away

THAKINGYI (aka) U San Myint, who acted as a British soldier in Myanmar video films and was known as Maung Min Lukalay by movie fans, passed away at 12:20 pm on 24 July.

Thakingyi (aka) San Myint was born in Pyay on 16 March 1931. His father was a British soldier who came to Myanmar during British rule, and his mother was Daw Pan Thee. He had six siblings and his father died when he was six years old. At the age of 12, he studied at an English-Myanmar private school free of charge. He passed Standard 7 after studying there only for four years and could speak not only English but also Hindi.

He joined the Burma Army at the age of 18 after passing Standard 7. He served in an artillery battalion and was sent to Yugoslavia in 1952 for a six-month training in how to operate

the 76-mm artillery. In 1954, he had to study veterinary medicine in Sakoda, Pakistan.

After that, he participated in military operations named Yangyiaung, Bayintnaung, Loi-

toon Camp, and Aungmayga. In 1960, he was entitled to attend the officer training course, but he was not selected due to mixed blood, so he left the army in 1962.

After leaving the army, he lived in Kandawlay ward in Yangon and worked as a veterinary staff member at the Yangon Zoo. He assisted in capturing three wild elephants in the Bago mountain range for timber extraction at the request of the Ministry of Forestry.

While in the artillery bat-

talion in Aungban, he got acquainted with the film industry by renting army horses to be used in movies. Thus, he was recruited by film actor U Tin Nyunt and started to enter the film industry with the movie "Yanthu Ko Bamahte".

Later, he got more opportunities to participate in movies. "Maung Min Lukalay" was a phrase used by a British officer to address a Myanmar man. Director Wah Wah Win Shwe taught him to use that phrase in the movie "Sanayma". Thus, the phrase became popular among the Myanmar movie audience.

Thakingyi (aka) U San Myint, who played the role of the British military officer in Myanmar video revolution episodes and the "Sapalin Hnin Maung" series, died at his daughter's home in Bago. He was 94 years old at the time of his death. — TWA/CT

Türkiye's Cat Town, sanctuary for stray cats

CAT Town, a sanctuary for stray cats in central Türkiye, provides a comfortable living space for the furry animals.

Renowned for its stray cats that appear almost everywhere on the streets, Türkiye traditionally has a lot of cat lovers looking after them by providing shelter and food.

Wandering the streets of a Turkish city, it is common to see small containers by the sides of buildings made as shelters for the stray cats, and pet food doled out by the city's inhabitants for them.

The Kocasinan Municipality in the central province of Kayseri

has gone further and established five months ago a 600-square-meter Cat Town to provide a sanctuary for these animals.

The felines have all they need in the sanctuary: playgrounds, bungalow huts, bridges, tunnels, climbing tracks, and scratching trees.

Stray cats that are brought to the facility are neutered and placed in a separate place to adapt before joining the other inhabitants of the facility.

Mehmet Cingil, a veterinarian, told Xinhua that the sanctuary provides a soothing place for cat lovers who are unable to keep

pets at home and cultivates people's affection for cats.

According to the veterinarian, there are some 25 felines of different breeds in the sanctuary where kindergarten or primary school students visit on a daily basis.

"We want to instill to the youngsters the love for animals, how to show empathy, and how to care for them," said Mehmet Dogan, a municipal official.

"We try to explain to the youngsters that stray or not, cats and animals, in general, are not a nuisance," added Dogan. — Xinhua

MICK Jagger once sang "what a drag it is getting old" but the most senior swinger in town

shows little sign of slowing down as he turns 80 on Wednesday.

The band completed its 14-date "Sixty" tour last year, although had to cancel one date when Jagger caught Covid.

It was the first time the band had performed without drummer Charlie Watts, who died in 2021. — AFP

Alphorn fest brings sound of music to Swiss mountains

HIGH up in the Swiss Alps, a hundred alphorn players assembled on a windswept pasture Sunday to make the mountains ring in gentle harmonies at the 22nd International Alphorn Festival.

The players formed a wide semi-circle at Tracouet above the ski resort of Haute Nendaz in southern Switzerland for the country's annual alphorn competition, which celebrates the musical instrument in its native landscape.

Several hundred spectators made the cable car trip or trekked up the mountainside to sit amongst the wildflowers at 2,200 metres above sea level and hear the country's top players

en masse.

The alphorn is a straight wooden instrument around 3.4 metres long with a cup-shaped mouthpiece. It was first documented in the 16th century and was reputedly used for communication in the mountains, with the clear sound echoing through the valleys.

"It's easy to play it but it's difficult to play it well," explained participant Marcel Henchoz, 85. A team of giant cowbell ringers paraded onto the pasture to start Sunday's festivities. Many of the alphorn players dressed in traditional costume, wearing hats adorned with badges, while flag twirlers performed to the music. — AFP

Library restores Palestinian history one manuscript at a time

A library in Israeli-annexed east Jerusalem offers a rare glimpse into Palestinian history with its treasure trove of manuscripts dating back hundreds of years before the creation of Israel.

At the Khalidi Library in the walled Old City, Rami Salameh expertly inspects a damaged manuscript as part of the effort to restore and digitize historical Palestinian documents.

"The manuscripts range from jurisprudence to astronomy, the Prophet's (Mohammed)

biography and the Koran," says the Italian-trained restorer as he carefully manoeuvres a dry brush over a fragile text on Arabic grammar.

From his small workshop, he lets out a sigh of relief, concluding that it won't be necessary to treat the 200-year-old document for discolouration as a result of oxidation.

Working alone, Salameh has already restored 1,200 pages from over a dozen manuscripts belonging to private Palestinian

libraries over the past two and a half years.

The items date back as far as 300 years, to the Ottoman period.

The majority of the manuscripts come from the Khalidi Library itself, the largest private collection of Arabic and Islamic manuscripts in the Palestinian territories.

Also on its shelves are Persian, German and French books, including an impressive collection of titles by French writer Victor Hugo. — AFP

More Japan tourist hot-spots imposing hotel taxes to fund promotions

THE practice of imposing municipal accommodation taxes on hotel guests has been spreading across Japan as popular tourist areas look to generate funds to use in promoting themselves to travellers in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Tokyo is considering increasing its tax for the first time since it became the first area in the country in 2002 to implement the system.

Currently, hotels in the capital charge 100 yen (\$0.70) per person per night for stays costing between 10,000 yen and 15,000 yen and 200 yen per night for rooms over 15,000 yen. The

collected tax goes toward tourism-related costs, including for maintaining free public Wi-Fi and operating tourism information centres.

Revenue collected has been increasing since 2011, hitting a record high of around 2.7 billion yen in fiscal 2019, but it fell in 2020 and 2021 due to pandemic travel restrictions and a suspension of the system during the Tokyo Olympics and Paralympics, according to the Tokyo government. With the recent return of international tourists, the total is expected to recover in fiscal 2023 to about 1.7 billion yen, it said. But that figure falls well short of

covering the capital's outlay on tourism promotion in the same year, which is forecast to total around 26.4 billion yen.

With cities and prefectures free to independently set the rate they charge, some municipalities have adopted flat fees higher than Tokyo's. The cities of Kanazawa and Kyoto require guests to pay flat fees of 500 yen and 1,000 yen per night, respectively.

"The situation around the accommodation tax has changed over the last 20 years, so we need to consider a review from a fairness perspective as well," a Tokyo metropolitan government representative said. — Kyodo

ECB set to hike again with inflation stubbornly high

ANOTHER interest rate hike appears a near certainty when ECB policymakers meet Thursday as inflation remains high, but the central bank faces increasing discontent among countries scared high interest

rates will hurt growth.

The Frankfurt-based institution has lifted borrowing costs at the fastest rate ever to combat red-hot inflation after Russia's war in Ukraine sent food and energy prices soaring.

Key rates have risen by four percentage points since July last year, with the ECB's deposit rate now sitting at 3.50 per cent — its highest level since 2001.

The sequence of rate hikes does not look like it will stop this week, despite moves by other central banks to slow the tempo of increases.

At its last meeting in June, ECB President Christine Lagarde said it was "very likely" that the bank would raise rates again at its next meeting.

"Virtually everyone is anticipating a 0.25 percentage point increase," the head of the influential German central bank, Joachim Nagel, told the RND media group last week. — AFP

Philips sales jump, bounces back from respirator recall

DUTCH medical tech firm Philips posted a nine per cent jump in second-quarter sales and a return to profit on Monday as it bounces back from a global recall of sleep respirators.

The Amsterdam-based company said sales rose to 4.5 billion euros (\$4.9 billion).

It reported a net profit of 74 million euros following a loss of 20 million euros over the same period last year.

"I am pleased with our improved operational performance across all segments and geographies in the quarter," Philips chief executive Roy Jakobs said.

The medical device maker in 2021 announced a major recall of its DreamStation machines for sleep apnoea, a disorder in which breathing stops and starts during sleep.

Users were said to be at risk of inhaling or swallowing pieces of toxic soundproofing foam that could cause irritation or headaches.

Philips also mentioned a "potential" cancer risk in the long term.

But it announced in May that independent tests showed the sleep respirators at the centre of the massive recall were "unlikely" to harm patients. — AFP

OpenAI CEO's Worldcoin crypto project launches

OPENAI chief executive Sam Altman, along with two co-founders, launched Monday the Worldcoin crypto project, saying they aim to grant users a verified digital identity and access to a financial network.

"The Worldcoin Foundation today announced that Worldcoin, a project co-founded by Sam Altman, Alex Blania and Max Novendstern, is now live," read a statement on Worldcoin's

website.

Worldcoin provides users with a private digital identity — a "World ID" — after they register in person, where an "Orb" imaging device scans their eye's unique iris pattern to verify they are "a real and unique person", Worldcoin said. The founders said verified private digital identities will be crucial to distinguish humans from AI online.

The company also launched



Monday its Worldcoin token, a cryptocurrency now transactable on the blockchain in certain locations, to millions "who participated in the beta", the statement said. — AFP

Made-in-China Tesla vehicles exported to ROK for first time

THE Tesla Shanghai Gigafactory began to export its car model, Model Y (Rear-Wheel Drive), to the Republic of Korea (ROK) recently, marking the first time for the Tesla vehicles made in China to enter the ROK market, said the company.

Previously, Tesla vehicles exported to the ROK were produced in its Fremont factory in the United States.

The Shanghai plant recorded a global delivery volume of 476,500 vehicles in the first half (H1) of this year, which is equivalent to about two-thirds of its total delivery volume last year. Currently, a vehicle can be

rolled off the production line in less than 40 seconds in the plant, and over 95 per cent of the auto parts can be supplied locally. Besides, the Shanghai factory exported vehicles to Thailand for the first time earlier this year. Car models, including Model 3 and Model Y, made in the factory, have been delivered to Thailand since the beginning of this year, according to the company. Data from the China Association of Automobile Manufacturers (CAAM) shows that in the first six months of this year, China exported 534,000 units of new energy vehicles, surging 160 per cent year on year. — Xinhua

Stellantis, Samsung to build second battery plant in US

US-EUROPEAN automaker Stellantis, whose brands include Fiat, Jeep and Peugeot, and a Samsung subsidiary plan to build a second electric car battery factory in the United States, the companies said Monday.

The location of the facility has yet to be announced but Stellantis and South Korea's Samsung SDI said it would start production in 2027, with an initial annual output capacity of 34 gigawatt hours (GWh).

It would be able to produce hundreds of thousands of vehicles made by Stellantis.

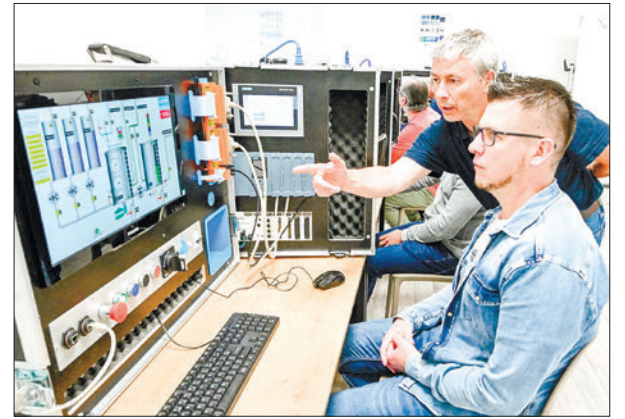
Stellantis, whose US

brands include Chrysler, Dodge, Ram and Jeep, plans to have electric vehicles account for 50 per cent of its sales in the United States by 2030.

"This new facility will contribute to reaching our aggressive target to offer at least 25 new battery electric vehicles for the North American market by the end of the decade," Stellantis chief executive Carlos Tavares said in a statement.

The company is seeking to secure around 400 GWh of battery capacity to achieve its sales target.

Stellantis and Samsung SDI are already building a gigafactory in

Kokomo, Indiana — an investment of between \$2.5 billion and \$3.1 billion — with production slated to begin in 2025 and a 33-GWh capacity. Samsung SDI, which

specializes in the production of electric car batteries, announced in April a joint venture with General Motors to build a \$3 billion factory in the United States. — AFP

Sydney's former HIV epicentre close to ending transmission

THE inner-city area of Sydney, once the epicentre of Australia's HIV epidemic, is very close to becoming the first place in the world to reach the UN's target for ending transmission of the virus, researchers said on Monday.

UNAIDS has set a goal of ending AIDS as a global health threat by 2030, which includes reducing the number of new HIV cases by 90 per cent compared to 2010.

In inner Sydney, new infections among gay men dropped by 88 per cent from 2010 to 2022, researchers announced at the International AIDS Society's

HIV science conference being held in the Australian city of Brisbane.

Andrew Grulich, an epidemiologist at the University of New South Wales who presented the research, told AFP that "we're very nearly there" some eight years ahead of the 2030 target.

Just 11 new HIV cases were recorded in inner Sydney last year, "an extraordinarily small number of infections for what was the heart of the Australian HIV epidemic," Grulich said.

Gay men make up an estimated 20 per cent of the male

population in inner Sydney, and they represent the large majority of the city's HIV cases.

Grulich said that several areas in the UK and Western Europe have also seen rapid drops in new HIV cases.

But "I don't think anywhere has gotten close to 90 per cent," he added.

However Grulich emphasised that this does not mean that HIV is close to being eliminated in the city of more than 5.2 million people. "HIV can only be eliminated if we have a vaccine and a cure," he said. — AFP

UN Command says in 'conversation' with N Korea over US soldier

THE UN Command has started a conversation with Pyongyang over American soldier Travis King, who ran across the border into North Korea last week, its deputy commander said Monday.

"A conversation has commenced with the Korean People's Army through the mechanism of the armistice agreement," Lieutenant General Andrew Harrison said at a press briefing, referring to the deal that ended Korean War hostilities in 1953.

The UN Command is a US-led multinational force that oversees the Korean War truce. The two Koreas remain technically at war because the 1950-53 conflict ended in an armistice and not a peace treaty.

"The primary concern for

us is for Private King's welfare," Harrison said, adding that the incident was "still subject to investigation".

Harrison said that, under the armistice agreement, there was a mechanism allowing the UN Command to communicate with the North's military but declined to give further details due to the "very delicate nature of these negotiations".

He said it was a "difficult and complex situation" and that "someone's welfare is at stake".

The United States does not have any formal diplomatic ties with the North and, since North Korea closed its borders at the start of the pandemic, most embassies with a presence in Pyongyang have withdrawn their foreign diplomats. — AFP

15 dead, all missing passengers found after Indonesia boat sinks

AT least 15 people were killed on Monday after a wooden boat sank off the coast of Indonesia's Sulawesi island, search and rescue officials said, adding that all missing passengers had been accounted for.

The boat sank with 48 people onboard just after midnight (1700 GMT on Sunday), the local office of Indonesia's search and rescue agency said in a statement.

Six people were rescued and taken to hospital for treatment, it added, and the cause of the sinking was being investigated.

Muhamad Arafah, head of the local search and rescue agency in Kendari city in Southeast Sulawesi, said in the statement that the 27 other passengers had been accounted for and all the victims had been

identified.

The agency had said earlier that 19 were missing, but Arafah

said the search operation had now been "declared finished and closed". — AFP

Thousands more evacuated as Greece battles wildfires

AUTHORITIES evacuated nearly 2,500 people from the Greek island of Corfu on Monday as crews fight several wildfires in heat-battered Greece.

Tens of thousands of people have already fled blazes on the island of Rhodes, with many frightened tourists scrambling to get home.

About 2,400 visitors and locals were evacuated from Corfu from Sunday into Monday, a fire service spokesman

said, adding that the departures were a precaution.

Greece has been sweltering under a lengthy spell of extreme heat that has exacerbated wildfire risk and left visitors stranded in peak tourist season.

Kelly Squirrel, a transport administrator from the UK, said police had ordered people from her hotel on Rhodes to evacuate.

"We had to keep walking,"

she told AFP at the international airport. "So we walked for about six hours in the heat."

Rhodes, which counted 2.5 million visitor arrivals in 2022, is one of Greece's leading holiday destinations.

Greek television broadcast images of long lines of people, some in beachwear, lugging suitcases along the island's roads on Saturday, when the evacuations were ordered. — AFP

Putin says Russia will replace Ukrainian grain shipments to Africa

RUSSIA will replace exports of Ukrainian grain to Africa, President Vladimir Putin said on Monday, after Moscow exited a deal allowing their safe shipment.

“Russia will continue its energetic efforts to provide supplies of grain, food products, fertilizers and other goods to Africa,” Putin said in a statement published on the Kremlin’s website.

“I want to give assurances that our country is capable of replacing the Ukrainian grain both on a commercial and free-

of-charge basis.”

Moscow’s military operation blocked Ukraine’s Black Sea ports with warships until a deal brokered by the UN and Türkiye and signed in July 2022 allowed for the passage of critical grain shipments.

Earlier this month Russia exited the deal after complaining that a related agreement on allowing the export of Russian food and fertilizers had not been honoured.

Moscow later said it would

consider cargo ships travelling to Ukraine through the Black Sea potential military targets.

The African Union has expressed “regret” over Moscow’s decision to end the grain export deal.

Later this week Russia will host the second Russia-Africa Summit and Russia-Africa Economic and Humanitarian Forum, according to the Kremlin.

Humanitarian groups say Africa is heavily reliant on grain from Russia and Ukraine. — AFP

Russia thwarts Ukraine’s drone attack on Moscow: defence ministry

A drone attack launched by Ukraine on Moscow was thwarted on Monday, said Russia’s de-

fence ministry.

An attempt by Kiev to carry out “a terrorist attack” using

two unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) on Moscow was thwarted, the ministry said in a statement.

“Two Ukrainian UAVs were suppressed by means of electronic warfare and crashed,” it said, adding that there were no victims.

Moscow Mayor Sergey Sobyanin said on Telegram earlier that at about 4:00 am local time (0100 GMT), drone strikes on two non-residential buildings in the Russian capital were recorded.

According to the mayor, there was no serious damage or casualties. — Xinhua

Paris airports under intense pressure for Olympics

PARIS’ airports face a double challenge during the Olympics next year — already under huge pressure, they will also be the first impression that many foreign visitors get of the Games.

France’s main international airport, Charles de Gaulle (CDG), and the smaller Orly will be two crucial gateways to the Olympics, which open in around a year on 26 July 2024.

The Parisian airports’ authority ADP believes it can cope with the increased traffic in July and August next year in what is already one of the world’s most visited cities.

What is keeping managers

awake at night is the exceptional nature of tens of thousands of the arrivals — and their oversized baggage.

Some 85,000 competitors, coaches and officials will be accredited for the Olympics and the Paralympics, excluding spectators, said Renaud Duplay, the deputy director of CDG.

“In terms of numbers, it’s a drop in the ocean” compared to the approximately 340,000 people who pass through CDG and Orly on peak summer days, he said.

On the other hand, the Olympic arrivals have expectations that are “different from

those for which our infrastructure is designed”.

The canoeists, for example, will bring kayaks, there will be crates and crates of bicycles and unwieldy poles for pole vaulters.

“There will be a volume of oversized luggage that is just not the one we usually have,” Jerome Harnois, the top state official in charge of Paris’ airports, said.

Lost or misplaced equipment could mean competitors missing out on Olympic glory, and trigger a storm of negative publicity for the organizers and France as a whole. — AFP

Nine killed in civilian plane crash in Sudan, as war-hit capital left hungry

NINE people, including four soldiers, were killed Sunday evening when a civilian plane crashed in Sudan due to “technical” reasons, the army said, as the war in the east African country entered its 100th day.

The fighting has left millions trapped in their homes and some without water, particularly in the suburbs of the capital Khartoum where residents were calling for food donations to help them survive.

In a war-devastated district of the city, Abbas Mohammed Babiker says he and his family have only been able to eat once a day. Now even that is in doubt, but on Sunday a citizens’ support group issued an urgent appeal for donations to help people like him.

“We only have enough for two more days,” Babiker said from Khartoum North, where residents said at least

one person, a local musician, has already died from hunger.

In Port Sudan, on the east coast largely spared by the war, the army said a child had survived the crash of an Antonov plane which killed nine others. Port Sudan airport is the only one still working in the country due to the conflict.

Since 15 April, battles between the army led by Abdel Fattah al-Burhan and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF), headed by Mohamed Hamdan Daglo, have killed more than 3,900 people, according to the latest toll from the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project (ACLED).

More than 2.6 million people have been internally displaced, mostly from Khartoum, the International Organization for Migration said. — AFP

Admittedly, Morocco experienced a painful introduction to the tournament on Monday as their debut ended in a 6-0 hammering in Melbourne at the hands of Germany, one of the favourites.

Zambia too suffered a heavy 5-0 loss to former winners Japan, but there has been nothing on the scale of the USA's 13-0 annihilation of Thailand with which they began their triumphant campaign in 2019.

England, another of the favourites, struggled to break down a Haiti side ranked 53rd in the world and making their World Cup debut.

The European champions only secured a 1-0 win thanks to Georgia Stanway's penalty.

The United States were expected to rattle in the goals against 32nd-ranked Viet Nam

Similarly, Spain beat Costa Rica 3-0 but it could easily

"Going into this World Cup the game has just grown and a lot of federations have

grown as well, so I think it is great to see so many countries coming in and making a great impression on the world stage," said United States defender Naomi Girma. — AFP
