Myanmar opens doors with visa-on-arrival for Chinese and Indian tourists

The Ministry of Immigration and Population will implement a one-year trial run of visa-on-arrival service for Chinese and Indian international travellers.

MYANMAR will give Visa on Arrival (VOA) to Chinese and Indian travellers, according to the Ministry of Immigration and Population in Nay Pyi Taw.

Starting from the effective date, the ministry will carry out a one-year trial run of VOA service for Chinese and Indian tourists in line with the COVID-19 rules and regulations.

They can take out VOA applications at International Airports in Myanmar free of charge. They will be charged a visa-on-arrival fee and the application attached with two acceptable photos must be presented. Only a visa on arrival for tourist purposes is permitted so far.

Travellers need to hold a passport with at least six months of validity. They will get deported on the same flight if the passport's validity is below six months.

They need to abide by the existing laws of Myanmar and they are allowed to visit all sites apart from restricted areas for security concerns.

They can depart through any international exit. The effective date of arrival visa for Chinese and Indian tourists will be announced soon. — ASH/EM

Myeik farmers eye investors for unrefined, refined palm oil plants

Kachin State welcomes investment: Two companies set to generate over 1,500 new jobs

ACCORDING to the Kachin State Investment Committee, two companies have received approval to invest in Kachin State, creating more than 1,500 job opportunities.

These two companies, namely Sangyoung Myanmar Investment and Sin Xin Myanmar Myitkyina, commenced their operations at the beginning of August.

Their investment focus includes the cultivation of macadamia, passion fruit, and rubber. They are committing \$0.878 million for the cultivation of macadamia and passion fruit, along with an additional \$0.10 million for rubber cultivation. Notably, Myanmar's macadamia and passion fruit are primarily purchased by China and Thailand, fetching K280,000 per kilogramme, while 75 per cent of the rubber output is also bought by China. — TWA/KZW

THE week-long Yadana Cave pagoda festival and Nat (deity) festival worshipping spirits held in Amarapura Township, Mandalay Region, kicked off on 8 September and this fascinating festival showed arrays of stalls selling food, crafts, souvenirs, religious items and many more captivates pilgrims and those with animistic religious beliefs to worship spirits.

The last day of the festival falls on 14 September and alms will be offered to 150 monks, according to U Khin Maung Soe, secretary and a member of Yadana Cave Pagoda Board of Trustees.

"The pagoda was built in 745 ME by Inwa Mingyi Swar Saw Ke. The pagoda festival is an annual event. Nanmadaw Me Nu incorporated the Nat festival in it as a celebration of celestial beings. This year, the festival takes place as a tradition. What's unique about this year's event was the handover of appointments for the three Thoetaw Saung Queens (spirit mediums)," he elaborated.

Those who follow traditional beliefs come and enjoy the festival every year.

The pagoda and Nat festivals were derived from a welcoming ceremony for the

stopover of the Taungbyone Nat brothers en route to the Poppa Medaw shrine.

The festival is crowded with spirit worshippers and vendors selling Myanmar's traditional snacks, clothes and other goods.

The festival includes the opening ceremony of the pagoda festival, handing over of the certificate of appreciation for donations, a variety of Nat events and Poppa Medaw and other spirit mediums' assemblies on the 7th-9th waning of Wagaung. The closing event will be held at 8 pm on 14 September. — Maung Aye Chan/EM


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
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Low Pressure Area Condition

Palm oil distributed to nationwide retailers at wholesale reference rates

PALM oil is being distributed to sellers across various townships in the country at a wholesale reference rate, allowing them to offer it at a retail reference rate.

During August, there was an increase in palm oil sales to consumers at the retail reference rate in the Yangon oil market. For instance, on 13

September, palm oil was sold at a retail reference price of K4,750 per viss on Mahabandula Road (near Phoneyi Road) in Lanmadaw Township. Daw Aye Myint, a resident of Lanmadaw Township, mentioned that there were long queues of people eager to purchase the oil.

Residents living near the

oil shops reported that people had started lining up to buy oil as early as 5 am in front of some oil shops in Lanmadaw Township. From 11 to 17 September, the palm oil index price stood at K4,524 per viss, representing an increase of K364 compared to the previous week.

According to the latest price calculation notice, the CIF (Cost, Insurance, and Freight) price for one tonne of palm oil at Yangon port is US\$969, with an average exchange rate of K2,513. The base price for one viss is K4,437. In Yangon, reference palm oil was sold at K4,400 per viss last week, but this week it is being sold at K4,750.

It's worth noting that 12,000 tonnes of oil arrived from abroad in the first week of September. U Myint Lwin, an oil trader in the Myingyan district township, informed GNLM that the new reference price in the villages for this week in September was K4,910 per viss.

MoFA recruiting trainees for basic diplomacy course 44/2023

THE Ministry of Foreign Affairs is reportedly recruiting trainees for the Certificate Course in Basic Diplomatic Skills. Trainees are being invited to apply for Course Number 44/2023, which will take place at the MoFA (Nay Pyi Taw and Yangon). The course will last for 12 weeks, from 16 October 2023 to 5 January, 2024 and will be conducted on working days.

The course will be hosted at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (Nay Pyi Taw and Yangon) with 50 trainees in each location. Selection will be based on personal interviews and screenings.

Those interested in at-

tending the course can submit their applications at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (Nay Pyi Taw and Yangon) during office hours from 4 to 15 September, along with the required documents.

The course will cover subjects related to diplomacy, international relations, international law, business, and general knowledge. These subjects will be taught by retired ambassadors, seasoned diplomats, officials from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and various ministries, experts, and university professors, through a combination of academic and practical teaching. — TWA/CT

El Nino may affect export of crops says Union Commerce Minister

THE Union Minister for Commerce said during the coordination meeting on increasing crop production on 12 September that due to the possibility of El Nino weather, it is necessary to prepare the conditions for the self-sufficiency of crops and the ability to export them.

First of all, he stated that this year is likely to be the strongest El Nino, and the world's meteorologists have predicted that southern ASEAN countries will be mainly affected, and Myanmar is also the target.

He pointed out that many other countries are in a position to be able to buy and collect crops, and he wants associations to constantly study the market situation and cooperate for the benefit of all.

The Union minister added

that the farmers are requested to send a report once every two weeks to the relevant departments on the ground conditions

of the production of crops and the ability to export them.

He remarked that entrepreneurs need to know the market

situation and provide support methods and suggestions, not only the desire to make a profit in exporting but also the stability

of the market and trade to maintain international friendship.

UMFCCI President U Aye Win said that it is important to achieve balanced interests through negotiation.

Concerning the El Nino phenomenon occurring in the Pacific Ocean, a strong El Nino condition may be reached in September, and rainfall patterns will be abnormal resulting in high temperatures and storms according to the forecast of the International Meteorological Centre.

Afterwards, U Tun Lwin, chairman of Myanmar Pulses, Beans and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association, presented and discussed the status of the Phytosanitary Certificate applications submitted by the export companies to the Plant Protection Division. — TWA/KZL

Entrepreneurs advocate for fisheries hub establishment in Myeik Taninthayi Region to boost revenue

BUSINESSPERSONS pointed out the need to develop the International Fish Auction Market in Myeik in order to raise revenue.

The Fish Auction Market in Myeik, Taninthayi Region, was opened more than 20 years ago, to create a major fish market in Myanmar. However, it failed to be reconstructed under the previous administrations. Lack of an international fish market might render revenue loss of over US\$30 billion for the State, a businessperson said.

“Taninthayi coastal region is the main seafood supplier to Ranong, Thailand. The seafood is

sent to the Mahachai market, the fisheries hub of Thailand with over 6,000 factories and workplaces and the market runs operations with Myanmar migrant workers and Myanmar’s fisheries. It is a loss of human capital and foreign currency earnings. I would like to request the authorities to consider this project to protect this great opportunity,” MD Daw Htay Htay Win of Myeik Fish Auction Market.

“We like to return the fish market to our home country. Developing the fish auction market is to create a big market, encourage the SMEs engaged in fisher-

ies business, receive the revenue for the State and make a sus-

tainable investment for future generations,” she emphasized.

Myanmar Investment Commission (MIC) gave the green light to bring in capital of US\$70 million in the fish market.

“Our fish auction market covers over 100 acres and there is sufficient land for the construction of cold storage facilities, and jetties. There is already a jetty, fish market, and one-stop-service office complex in Myeik,” she added.

If Intl’ Fish Auction Market is developed rather than many small auctions, it will bring about a positive impact on the country and in various sectors, locals shared opinions. — Myint Oo/EM

Grapevine farming in NyaungU Township thriving

GRAPEVINE farming is prospering in Nyaung U Township, Mandalay Region, with high yield. The growers are expecting a good price at the harvest time, U Aye Ko who farms grape vines on an-acre and a half said.

There is no local origin and over 40 foreign origins are cultivated. They can be grown everywhere with an abundant irrigation supply. The climate-resilient grape varieties are chosen in the regions for a trial run. Ko Min Set Paing from Yamethin elaborated on how he shares know-how of grape vine farming methods regarding lucrative grape varieties.

A farm owner said I contacted him to start cultivating grapes of Italy origin No 3. I bought one grape seedling for K2,000, including delivery fee to the farm. The plant spacing is six feet. Bud-dings occur in ten months. About

five visses of grapes can be harvested per plant for the first time. Three to five-year-old grape vine can produce about 15-20 visses, a farmer who starts grape farming expressed his expectation for a high price.

The grapevines are perennial plants from 20-30 years. It can be harvested every four months. During the budding time, adequate irrigation is required. Grapes should be harvested when it is ripe. There are about 10 farmers who commenced the grapevine farming. The prices vary depending on the producing areas and grape varieties. Black Queen and Italy grape varieties are seen in Latpanchaypaw and Thittaung village-tracts in the township. The yield is pretty good in the first year so growers hope for good price. — Dipalin/EM

Myeik farmers eye investors for unrefined, refined palm oil plants

OIL palm farmers in Myeik Township, Taninthayi Region, are looking for investors to invest in unrefined and refined palm oil plants in the area, as they have to sell palm fruit bunches to factories such South Dagon Crude Palm Oil Mill in Bokpyin Township currently with expensive transport costs.

“If we have unrefined and refined palm oil plants in Myeik district, oil palm farmers will earn more profit as they can send palm fruit bunches to factories that produce crude palm oil with minimum loss and cost. And they can also focus more on boosting the yearly yield of the

fruit,” said an oil palm farmer in Myeik Township.

A total of 39 companies and nearly 40 individuals in the Taninthayi Region have invested in oil palm plantation and most of them sell their produce to crude palm oil plants in Bokpyin and Kawthoung districts with the prices of nearly K330,000 per tonne of palm fruit bunches. The farmers face losses as well as expensive transport costs on their way to sell their produce.

Taninthayi Region naturally provides farmers with a fertile ecosystem for oil palm plantations, attracting local and overseas investors to invest in

the plantation. Oil palm has been grown in the Region for more than 30 years, bringing the current total plantation in the region to some 400,000 acres.

In the Taninthayi Region, six plants produce crude palm oil — one each in Dawei and Myeik districts, and two each in Bokpyin and Kawthoung districts, according to the Department of Agriculture.

Taninthayi Region is proven to be the most fertile region in the country to grow oil palm and the farmers wish to have refinery plants that produce edible palm oil in their region. — Myint Oo (Myeik)/TH

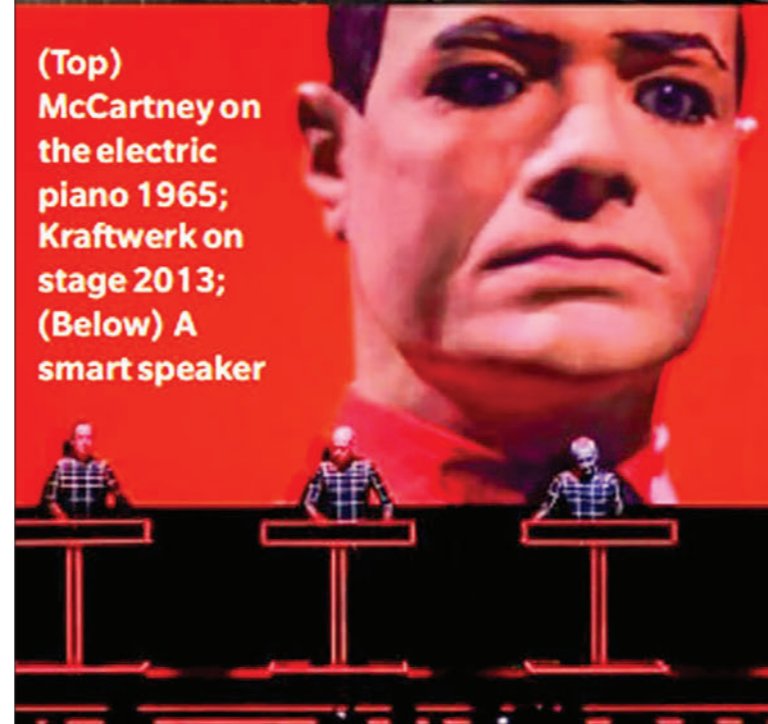

So, in the words of an AI expert, there's nothing to fear just yet. What's more, we need to remember that technology in music is nothing new. In fact, the past has looked kindly at the early innovators.

Born out of Birmingham in 1963, the Mellotron was one of the first mass-produced sampled keyboards. The Beatles adopted the revolutionary sound in no time. A mere four years later, in 1967, the whimsical, dreamy tones were prominent on "Strawberry Fields Forever", a song that helped to spearhead a psychedelic movement.

Talking of The Beatles, music writer Rob Bowman said

Multi-platinum-selling music Producer TommyD is open to AI and believes it's the next step in the ongoing relationship between tech and music. "Electric guitars have been on sale for nearly 100 years, but not everyone is Jimi Hendrix. When the hard disk recording came in, I told all my engineer mates to buy systems or get left behind. Those who did are still in the business, those that didn't are selling insurance. Learn to use the tech or get left behind," he states.

AI to the rescue

Is it high time for musicians to consider the benefits of AI? Above all, the latest tech boom could offer a helping hand for time-consuming tasks. There's so much more than music-making needed to get your name heard. Crafting social media content to keep an online persona is a job in its own right — not forgetting the creation of music videos, artwork, and gig posters thrown onto the to-do list.

When probed on the use of AI in music, Tee cited plagia-

rism as a key area. "ChatGPT is already very good at spotting when two pieces of text are the same or from the same author and it is a short step to do the same in music."

Songwriters are no strangers to lawsuits. Even one of the world's most streamed artists, Taylor Swift, found herself embroiled in a dispute over lyrics at the turn of the year. Writers Sean Hall and Nate Butler brought the case to the court having written the 3LW song "Playas Gon' Play" containing the lyrics "Playas, they gonna hate and haters, they gonna hate." Sound familiar?

Swift denied lifting lyrics for her smash hit "Shake It Off". That could well be the case. It's impossible for a songwriter to know the lyrics of every song ever written. With that in mind, there's a chance of imitating phrases unknowingly when scribbling ideas in the studio. A plagiarism-detecting tool could become a vital part of a songwriter's arsenal. It would make sure new tracks are original, plus prevent legal fees and stress from future lawsuits. If the tool

could alert plagiarized melodies, songwriters would embrace AI.

Overstepping the lines?

Speaking of lyrics, they're resistant to generative AI, right? Well, it turns out not. AI can write lyrics. We prompted ChatGPT to "write me song lyrics about lost love in the style of Leonard Cohen."

Reams of original lyrics rolled down the screen in a matter of seconds. Verses, choruses, an outro, the whole nine yards. Evidently, AI can write lyrics. Moreover, write lyrics in a similar vein to one of the world's favourite songwriters. Here's a sample of the results...

"I met her in the autumn
With leaves of gold and red
Her eyes were like the ocean
Her hair, a crown on her head

I try to fill the void
With cheap whiskey and cigarettes
But nothing can replace
The love I can't forget"

Songwriters use words to release their own emotions. When heartbroken, they'll write about their vulnerabilities and pain.

Once on record or played live, it's an insightful glimpse into their soul. The listener who shares the same sentiments takes solace, and that's one of the many beauties of music. The purity of human connection. But if AI writes the lyrics, then surely that's at risk. Furthermore, as AI becomes wiser, it'll become harder to distinguish words that come from human emotion or not.

It's a concern that resonates with Leon Luis, owner of Altar-Boy Music Publishing. "It's a loss of humanity. Songwriting is spiritual. You put pen to paper and write what the world tells you. You need heartbreak before you can write a song about lost love. You can't substitute human experience with code."

The rise of the deep fake

Artificial lyrics are the tip of the iceberg. In February this year, The (Not So) Real Slim Shady featured on a song with DJ David Guetta in front of thousands of ravers. As punters danced and rejoiced at hearing the new collaboration, most were unaware it wasn't Eminem at all.

Having asked AI to write a verse in the style of Eminem, Guetta then put those lyrics into another generative AI program to recreate the voice. The result was a close likeness, indistinguishable to most. Now, the floodgates are open and AI can rap and sing in the style of your favourite artists.

Later, an AI duet featuring Drake and The Weeknd landed on streaming platforms. It went viral, rattling the music industry at the same time. Drake, the golden goose of the Universal record label, had been cloned. Universal responded by banning the song off Spotify and others. A statement by the label called the song "a breach of our agreements and a violation of copyright law."

It's not only the digitized pop genre that has fallen victim to AI deep fakery. A set of songs by AIs, an AI Oasis, complete with fake Liam Gallagher, took the internet by storm in late April. It poses an enormous question about copyright. Luis, who deals with music law, had this to say: "With AI, we're in completely uncharted territory. We're talking Wild West. Like Arizona in the 1880s during the Gold Rush."

AI has stepped into murky, dangerous waters. It's safe to say, that Universal has nailed its colours to its mast when it comes to AI deep fakes. Their statement continued with defiant wording. "Which side of history [do] all stakeholders in the music ecosystem want to be on? The side of artists, fans, and human creative expression, or on the side of deep fakes, fraud, and denying artists their due compensation?"

The death of the songwriter?

When doomsday merchants warned of an AI influx, we thought the creatives would be the last to fall. But the warning signs are there. The sophisticated nature of modern AI has the potential to take the job of songwriters.

Yet, as it stands, even AI has its limitations. Phil Tee concludes, "For all the hype surrounding ChatGPT and AI, what it is incapable of is novelty. Having the sum total of all knowledge and an excellent pattern repetition algorithm just condemns you to repeat the past. We may have a more efficient production process for music... but making

the next Bob Dylan or predicting the 'Whispering Grass' hit is a long stretch."

With no law to abide by, the next few months will determine the future of AI in music. Questions loom over the intellectual property of AI-written lyrics while, for all intents and purposes, deep fake AI tracks appear to be on the wrong side of the law.

Moves are being made to protect the songwriter. The Human Artistry Campaign is a petition calling for the responsible use of AI in music. It has the support of powerful organizations in music and sets out seven principles where AI and human creativity can live side by side. Because, let's face it, while AI has its place in the music industry, in the wrong hands, it can do damage.

I guess we need to hear from one more "person" in this conversation. Over to you ChatGPT...

"No, AI will not destroy music making. While AI technology has advanced significantly in recent years, it is still not capable of replicating the full range of human creativity."

Maybe it's not quite "hasta la vista" for the songwriter after all.

In brief, the future of music creation in the age of AI is undoubtedly a fascinating and evolving landscape. While AI brings unprecedented tools to assist musicians and streamline certain aspects of the creative process, it also raises complex questions about creativity, authenticity, and the role of the human artist. As we navigate this uncharted territory, it's clear that AI won't spell the end of music making but rather challenge us to define the boundaries between man and machine, reminding us that the heart and soul of music will forever remain uniquely human. So, as we continue to harness the power of AI to unlock new musical possibilities, let's ensure that we do so responsibly, preserving the magic of genuine human expression in every note, lyric, and melody we create. The future may be AI-enhanced, but the heartbeat of music will always belong to us, the creators and dreamers.

Confiscation of illegal teak, crude oil, livestock, jade, foodstuffs, industrial materials, consumer goods

A combined on-duty team made inspections on 11 September and confiscated a Toyota Voxy vehicle (approximately worth K20 million) carrying 170 gallons of crude oil worth about K510.000 without official documents and two Fuso trucks (approximately worth K50 million) carrying 24 illegal oxen worth about 13.25 million near Laypin village in Minbu (Saku) township. The action was taken under the Public Property Protection Law and the Essential Supplies and Services Law.

Two unregistered Honda Fit cars (estimated value of K28 million) were captured near the Letpanhla-Singu combined checkpoint on 11 September and the action was taken under Customs procedures.

The Customs on-duty teams conducted inspections on 11 September and nabbed two kinds of goods worth about K51.96 million, including 8734.56 kilogrammes of Salty soya-bean sauce and 1674.35 kilogrammes of Happy Kid-Lysine that ex-

ceeded the quantity mentioned in the Import Declaration (ID) from seven containers at the Asia World Port Terminal container checkpoint, a Mitsubishi Canter vehicle (estimated value of K25 million), headed to Bago from Mawlamyine, carrying two kinds of goods worth K8.1 million, including 1,200 litres of Crown Head pure milk without official documents, and a vehicle that was made by Myanmar Yangon Industri-

al Zone (approximately worth 30 million), headed to Yangon from Myawady, carrying two kinds of goods worth about K5 million, including 300 sets of OTTO ceramic toilet commode that exceeded the quantity mentioned in the ID, at the Mayanchaung permanent checkpoint and a Cham truck (estimated value of K25 million) that was parked near the Milepost 93/3 on Yangon-Mawlamyine Pyidaungsu road carrying

5,500 kilogrammes of cut pieces of stone (supposed to be jade) worth K110 million. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

Similarly, a combined team impounded two kinds of goods worth K3.6 million, including 60 Kashiwa electric red pans without official documents, from a vehicle travelling from Myawady to Yangon at the Kawkareik (Tadakyoe) combined checkpoint on the same day.

The action was taken under Customs procedures.

A total of 7.1870 tonnes of illegal teak worth K3,703,260 was seized in Bago and Toun-goo districts on 12 September. The action was taken under the Forest Law.

A total of 13 arrests were made on 11 and 12 September, with an estimated value of K374,144,311, as reported by the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. — MNA/MKKS

ACCORDING to the Myanmar Police Force, a total of K99 million worth of stimulant tablets were captured in Insein township.

Nuyuk and Chit Win Ko Ko (aka) Nay Zar with a total of 9 million stimulant tablets worth K900 million on Yangon-Pyay Road in Sawbwayyigon ward in Insein township at 6:30 on 12 September.

After interrogating them, the police also arrested Ma Nan

Sin Lyan, who is the trafficker of seized drugs, at the Ocean shopping mall in Tamway township.

The police have taken legal action against the offenders and an investigation is underway to identify the perpetrators of the crime chain. — MNA/MKKS

Over K470 mln worth of heroin blocks captured in Pinlaung

OVER K470 million worth of 90 heroin blocks weighing 31.5 kilogrammes was captured in Pinlaung township in Shan State, the Myanmar Police Force stated.

Acting on a tip-off, a combined team consisting of members of the Anti-Narcotics Task Force searched a Surf driven by Saw Htay Oo headed to Tatkon from Pinlaung on Pinlaung-Tat-

kon road in Pinlaung township at noon on 30 August.

The offender admitted the seized drugs were to be carried from Shan State to Kayin State.

The police have taken legal action against the offender and an investigation is underway to identify the perpetrators of the crime chain. — MNA/MKKS

Billionaire US collectors to return ancient artefacts to Cambodia

These artefacts, many of which are believed to date back to the Khmer Empire, were looted during years of civil war and the Khmer Rouge rule in Cambodia.

A billionaire family in the United States will return more than 30 looted ancient artefacts to Cambodia after agreeing it “wrongfully possessed” the treasures, the Cambodian government said Wednesday.

Years of civil war followed by the genocidal Khmer Rouge rule saw historical sites looted

with near-impunity in Cambodia, which is famed for its Angkor Wat temple complex.

Many of the pieces are thought to date back to the Khmer Empire, a once-mighty dynasty that sprawled across much of modern-day Cambodia, Thailand, Viet Nam and Laos between the ninth and 15th cen-

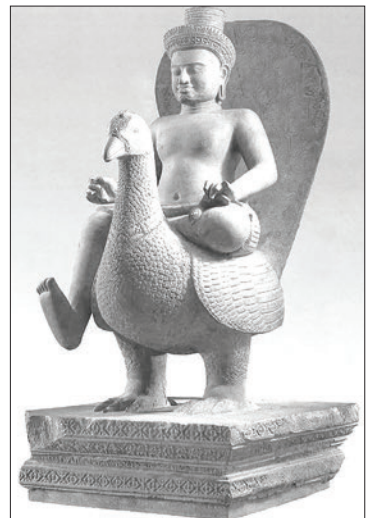
turies.

A trove of stolen artefacts has been sent back to Cambodia in recent years from Western museums and private collectors.

Now, 33 items from the Lindemann private collection will be “voluntarily” returned to Cambodia, its ministry of arts and culture said Wednesday.

The move “sets an excellent and proper example for other museums and private collectors... to follow and return our national treasures,” Minister of Culture and Fine Arts Phoeurng Sackona said.

The government did not say when the items will arrive in Cambodia. — AFP

Venice gives green light to ticket ‘experiment’ for tourists

VENICE officials agreed Tuesday to test a fee on day tourists to the overcrowded historic centre, weeks after UNESCO warned it could list the city as an at-risk world heritage site.

The Venice city council voted in favour of a limited test, to begin next spring, of a long-debated ticketing system that critics say will nevertheless do little to stem the hordes of tourists who descend each year.

Day visitors will face a five euro (\$5.40) charge for entry into the historic centre.

Authorities have debated

for years -- without taking concrete action -- over how best to regulate the millions of visitors to the famous watery city, who come anxious to see sights including St Mark's Square, the Rialto Bridge and its countless picturesque canals.

But the ticketing plan has been repeatedly postponed over concerns it will seriously dent tourist revenue and compromise freedom of movement.

UNESCO, the cultural arm of the United Nations, warned in July that Venice risked “irreversible” dam-

age due to a string of issues ranging from mass tourism to climate change, and recommended it be put on its endangered list.

“It's a first step,” said Mayor Luigi Brugnaro, who engaged in a shouting match with a crowd of a few dozen people in the council chambers ahead of the vote, calling them “violent and fascist”.

His administration -- which he said had shown “courage and practicality” -- agreed last week to what he described as an “experiment”. — AFP

France goes (a bit) veggie for Olympics

WITH France slowly weaning itself off its traditional obsession with meat, the top chefs in charge of feeding the sporting masses at the 2024 Olympic Games are emphasizing a more vegetarian approach.

Michelin-starred chef Akrame Benallal serves plenty of steaks, burgers and other meat in his restaurants, but his flagship dish for the Games will be muesli with quinoa.

“When there are 40,000 meals per day, I don't want anyone to be let down. I want people who eat kosher to eat with me, people who eat halal, the Christians and Buddhists too,” he said.

“It's vegetables that unite everyone,” he added.

He is one of three award-winning chefs overseeing the French food for the 15,000 athletes of the Olympic Village

next summer.

Another is Alexandre Mazzia, a former professional basketball player, who is offering recipes based around chickpeas, peas and smoked beetroot, and smoked fish with chard.

They are working with a big food group, Sodexo Live!, that is running the restaurants and has made it a key objective to reduce the carbon footprint of its menu and use less animal protein.

It claims that a third of the protein across its 500 dishes will come from vegetables, and one of its signature dishes will be a dal of green lentils from the Paris region with skyr (a type of yoghurt), coriander and corn oil.

Saudi, Russian oil cuts to cause big supply shortfall: IEA

The collaboration between Saudi Arabia and Russia is seen as a significant challenge for oil markets, and these supply cuts were extended in an effort to stabilize oil prices that had previously fallen after Ukraine war.

OIL cuts by Saudi Arabia and Russia will cause a “significant” global supply shortfall through the end of the year, raising the risk of further market volatility, the International Energy Agency said Wednesday.

The warning in the IEA’s monthly market report comes a day after oil prices jumped following OPEC’s own update showed that the gap between global supply and demand would be the widest since 2007.

“The Saudi-Russian alliance is proving a formidable challenge for oil markets,” the IEA said.

Oil prices had been slumping in recent months after surging following Ukraine war last year.

In an effort to prop up prices, Saudi Arabia and Russia, its ally in the wider OPEC+ group, announced earlier this month that they would extend voluntary cuts until the end of the year.

“From September onwards,

the loss of OPEC+ production, led by Saudi Arabia, will drive a significant supply shortfall through the fourth quarter,” the

Paris-based IEA said.

“Oil stocks will be at uncomfortably low levels, increasing the risk of another surge in vola-

tility that would be in the interest of neither producers nor consumers, given the fragile economic environment,” it added.

Saudi Arabia has extended an oil production cut of one million barrels per day, which began in July, to the end of the year.

Russia has decided to prolong a reduction in exports of 300,000 bpd over the same period.

Oil prices have been rising in recent days, raising fears that they will push inflation higher and prompt central banks to keep interest rates higher for longer, which could in turn push economies into recession.

‘Substantial’ deficit locked in

Last week, the price of Brent North Sea crude, the international benchmark, rose above \$90 per barrel for the first time since November 2022.

The IEA said world oil demand remains on track to grow by 2.2 million bpd to 101.8 million bpd this year, partly due to resurgent Chinese consumption and jet fuel. — AFP

EU seeks ‘fair and just’ green transition

THE EU aims for a “fair and just transition” to a carbon-neutral future, balancing the climate change fight with the concerns of business and farmers, European Commission president Ursula von der Leyen said Wednesday.

In her annual State of the Union speech to the European Parliament, she said she was “convinced that agriculture and protection of the natural world can go hand in hand — we need both”.

She also railed against “heavily subsidised Chinese competitors” that were squeezing European companies in the clean-energy sector, emphasizing that “fairness in the global economy is so important”.

In a fightback, she said Brussels would ensure a “fast-track” of permits for wind power installations.

And she said it would engage farmers in dialogue on the changes in store. — AFP

High costs push home ownership out of reach of younger Americans

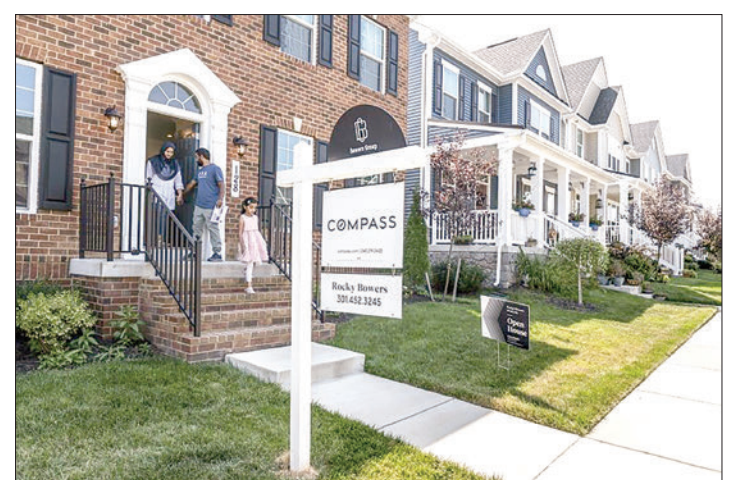
WHEN Jennie Luhmann started searching for her family’s “forever home”, she found herself in a perfect storm — few properties were available, buyers were making all-cash offers and interest rates were climbing.

Outbid by others and pressured by soaring mortgage rates, Luhmann and her husband decided to rent, before temporarily moving into her mother’s house.

The 37-year-old is not alone.

Homeownership feels increasingly out of reach for younger generations of Americans, who are squeezed by student debt and childcare costs in an era of slower economic growth.

The pressures come as President Joe Biden struggles to tackle negative sentiment about his handling of the economy, as he campaigns for

re-election.

The Biden administration has sought to narrow America’s housing shortfall, in part by lowering barriers to building, but it is not a quick solution.

Millennials, born between the early 1980s to late 1990s, formed the biggest share of homebuyers between 2014 and

2022 according to the National Association of Realtors (NAR).

But they lost the position this year to baby boomers, who can fork out cash for their home purchase.

NAR’s Jessica Lautz highlighted that there’s a severe shortage of affordable housing inventory, which is challenging for millennials. — AFP

France orders Apple iPhone 12 sales halted over radiation

FRENCH regulators on Tuesday ordered Apple to halt sales of the iPhone 12 for emitting too much electromagnetic radiation, and to fix existing handsets. The French agency that regulates radio frequencies, the ANFR, said testing found that the model emits more electromagnetic waves susceptible to be absorbed by the body than permitted.

The ANFR said it "ordered Apple to remove the iPhone 12 from the French market from 12 September due to the model exceeding the limit" for electromagnetic ab-

sorption by the body.

It said accredited labs had found absorption of electromagnetic energy by the body at 5.74 watts per kilogramme during tests simulating when the phone was being held in the hand or kept in a pocket.

The European standard is a specific absorption rate of 4.0 watts per kilogramme in such tests. "Concerning phones already sold, Apple must in the briefest of delays take corrective measures to bring the affected phones into compliance," said the ANFR in a statement on its website. — AFP

Zara owner Inditex posts record first-half profit

ZARA owner Inditex reported a record net profit in the first half of 2023 on Wednesday due to strong sales as the world's biggest fashion retailer raised prices. The Spanish group posted a net profit of 2.51 billion euros (\$2.7 billion) in the first six months to 31 July, beating its previous record of 1.79 billion euros in the same period a year earlier.

This result was higher than the 2.42 billion euros predicted by analysts from financial analysts at FactSet. Inditex attributed this momentum to the strong growth in sales, which reached 16.85 billion euros, 13.5 per cent higher than in the same period a year earlier, demonstrating "very

satisfactory development both in stores and online".

Its pre-tax earnings (EBITDA) rose by 15.7 per cent to 4.66 billion euros, the company said.

In a complicated global context, the record first-

half figures reflected the "determined progress" made by the retailer, Inditex chief executive Oscar Garcia Maceiras said in the statement.

Inditex, which owns seven brands including

upmarket Massimo Dutti and teen label Stradivarius, has been hit by the war in Ukraine that forced it to close its 514 shops in Russia, at the time its second-biggest market after Spain. — AFP

Auto Show opens as Detroit weighs possible strike

THE Detroit Auto Show, normally a cheery showcase of latest models from the three legacy US car giants, is taking second fiddle this year to a looming auto workers' strike and its mounting odds.

The showcase kicks off one day before the Thursday night deadline when existing United Auto Workers (UAW) contracts at General Motors, Ford and Stellantis expire.

New UAW president Shawn Fain has for months vowed a tough approach to negotiations, demanding significant pay hikes in light of record profits and saying a strike could potentially extend to all three companies. In recent days, Fain has acknowledged that automakers have begun negotiating in earnest, while criticizing the companies for leaving little time to hash out a deal. — AFP

China seeks dialogue for stable ties as Japan revamps Cabinet

China emphasizes the mutual interest in maintaining healthy bilateral relations and the need to manage conflicts and differences.

CHINA urged Japan on Wednesday to strengthen dialogue and jointly foster a constructive and stable relationship in the wake of Prime Minister Fumio Kishida's reshuffling his Cabinet, which included the appointment of veteran female lawmaker Yoko Kamikawa as the new foreign minister.

Foreign Ministry spokes-

woman Mao Ning said maintaining the healthy and stable development of bilateral relations is "in the common interest of both countries and the region" and stressed the importance of managing conflicts and differences.

Japan's Prime Minister Fumio Kishida named new foreign and defence ministers on Wednesday in a major reshuf-

fle that raised the number of women in the cabinet to five.

The 66-year-old will stand for re-election next year as president of the fractious Liberal Democratic Party, which has dominated politics for decades, and experts said the cabinet reshuffle was an attempt to shore up his approval ratings.

Foreign Minister Yoshimasa Hayashi was replaced by Yoko Kamikawa, one of five women in the new cabinet, chief cabinet secretary and government spokesman Hirokazu Matsuno told reporters.

Kamikawa, 70, is Japan's first woman foreign minister in 19 years.

She was justice minister five years ago when Japan executed the leader and members of the Aum Shinrikyo cult for their role in the deadly 1995 sarin attack on the Tokyo subway.

Minoru Kihara, 54, succeeded Yasukazu Hamada as defence minister. — **Kyodo/AFP**

China says media have exposed iPhone security incidents

CHINA said Wednesday it had noted "many media reports exposing security incidents involving iPhones".

"The Chinese government attaches a great importance to information and cybersecurity, and treats both domestic and foreign-funded enterprises in the same way and on an equal footing," foreign ministry spokesperson Mao Ning told a regular press conference.

Mao denied there was any ban on officials purchasing or using foreign phones, including iPhones.

"China has not issued any laws, regulations, and policy documents prohibiting the purchase and use of foreign brand smartphones, including iPhone," she said. "We always have an open attitude towards foreign-funded enterprises."

Apple shares fell sharply last week following reports of significant Chinese restrictions on iPhones at government offices and state-backed entities. The Wall Street Journal first reported that China had barred the use of Apple smartphones in central government agencies. — **AFP**

Swiss students break world record for electric car acceleration

FROM zero to 100 kilometres per hour in less than a second: a racing car built by students has broken the world record for electric vehicle acceleration, a Swiss university said Tuesday.

Students from the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology Zurich (ETHZ) and the Lucerne University of Applied Sciences designed and built the "Mythen" vehicle that achieved

the feat, ETHZ said in a statement.

"Now, Guinness World Records has confirmed that Mythen broke the previous world acceleration record for electric vehicles," it said.

Covering a distance of 12.3 metres (40.4 feet) at the Switzerland Innovation Park in Duebendorf, opposite the students' workshop, the car was powered from zero to 100 kilometres an hour (zero to 62.15 miles per hour) in 0.956 seconds.

"This beats the previous world record of 1.461 seconds, set in September 2022 by a team from the University of Stuttgart by more than a third," ETHZ said. — **AFP**

Sweden's 'normal' king celebrates 50 years on throne

PORTRAITS of Sweden's King Carl XVI Gustaf, who celebrates his 50th jubilee on Friday, plaster the walls of ardent royalist Kenth Lundqvist's apartment, adorning plates, posters and medallions.

"My interest in royalty began when I was around six years old when the king and queen got married... I sat in front of the telly, I was amazed," recalled the 44-year-old organist, who lives in the small central town of Timra.

Sweden celebrates the golden jubilee from 13 September to 16, feting a monarch who has earned the respect of his subjects over the years.

One of the Royalist Association's several thousand members, Lundqvist expects a large crowd to cheer on a royal cortege through Stockholm's city centre on Saturday, in a country normally known for its reserve.

The king and his wife Queen Silvia will wave to crowds from a horse-drawn carriage, escorted by 3,000 troops from the army, air force and navy.

"He represents continuity, traditions and Christian values," said Lundqvist.

"To be able to be around 500,000 people and celebrate him, it's a huge feeling," he said. — **AFP**

Spain and Italy step up chase of runaway Euro leaders

SPAIN crashed in six in Euro 2024 qualifying on Tuesday while Belgium were also big winners as Italy revived their campaign and Austria and Switzerland stayed on course for qualification.

Substitute Ferran Torres struck twice for Spain, while Gavi, Mikel Merino, Joselu and debutant Alex Baena were also on target as they beat Cyprus 6-0 in Granada.

Spain closed to six points behind runaway Group A leaders Scotland with a game in hand. The two teams meet in the next round in Seville on 12 October.

“Our objective is clear — win the rest of the games,” coach Luis De la Fuente told Spanish broadcasters TVE.

“We want to finish top of the group.” Norway kept alive their faint chance of catching either Scotland or Spain while ending Georgia’s hopes of qualifying with a 2-1 victory in Oslo.

Erling Haaland gave Norway the lead with his seventh goal in five competitive matches this season and his 25th in 26 internationals. Martin Odegaard added a second before Budu Zivizadze responded deep in added time. Davide

Frattesi ensured that Italy got their Euro 2024 qualifying campaign back on track with a brace in an entertaining 2-1 win over Ukraine which moved the Azzurri second in Group C.

Inter Milan midfielder Frattesi rifled in two low finishes in the first half-an-hour at the San Siro to give Luciano Spalletti his first success on his home debut as coach of the European champions.

Italy moved level on seven points with Ukraine, who scored through captain Andriy Yarmolenko four minutes before half-time, and North Macedonia. — AFP

Man Utd announce new shirt deal with US firm Qualcomm

MANCHESTER United have announced a bumper sponsorship deal with US-based Qualcomm Technologies, whose Snapdragon brand will replace the TeamViewer logo on their shirts from next season. The Premier League club, who did not reveal the financial details of the deal, were reportedly targeting an agreement worth £60 million (\$75 million) per year.

It is understood the figure equals or even surpasses the previous biggest shirt deal in football history. Qualcomm has been one of United’s global partners since last year. “Manchester United plc has agreed to an expanded strategic collaboration with Qualcomm Technologies, Inc, that will see the Snapdragon brand displayed on the front of the club’s famous shirt,” the club said in a statement confirming the agreement.

Asian Games will be ‘new beginning’ for biggest-ever South Korea team

THE Asian Games will be a “new beginning” for South Korean sports, a top official said, with badminton world number one An Se-young spearheading the country’s largest-ever team at the competition.

The Games start in the Chinese city of Hangzhou on 23 September and South Korea will take 867 athletes to the Olympic-sized event. South Korea has consistently finished second in the medals table behind China at the Games, but slipped to third in 2018, with China and Japan ahead of them. “This year’s Asian Games will mark

the new beginning for South Korean sports,” Yonhap news agency quoted Lee Kee-heung, president of the Korean Sport And Olympic Committee, as saying on Tuesday in Seoul.

“We have been making progress in many different sports and have seen the emergence of young athletes. “I can’t wait to see our athletes tackle challenges at this year’s Asian Games.”

Chief among South Korea’s hopes for gold is the 21-year-old An, who has enjoyed a breakout year, rising to number one in women’s badminton and winning the world title. — AFP

The friendly match was played in three parts of 30 minutes.

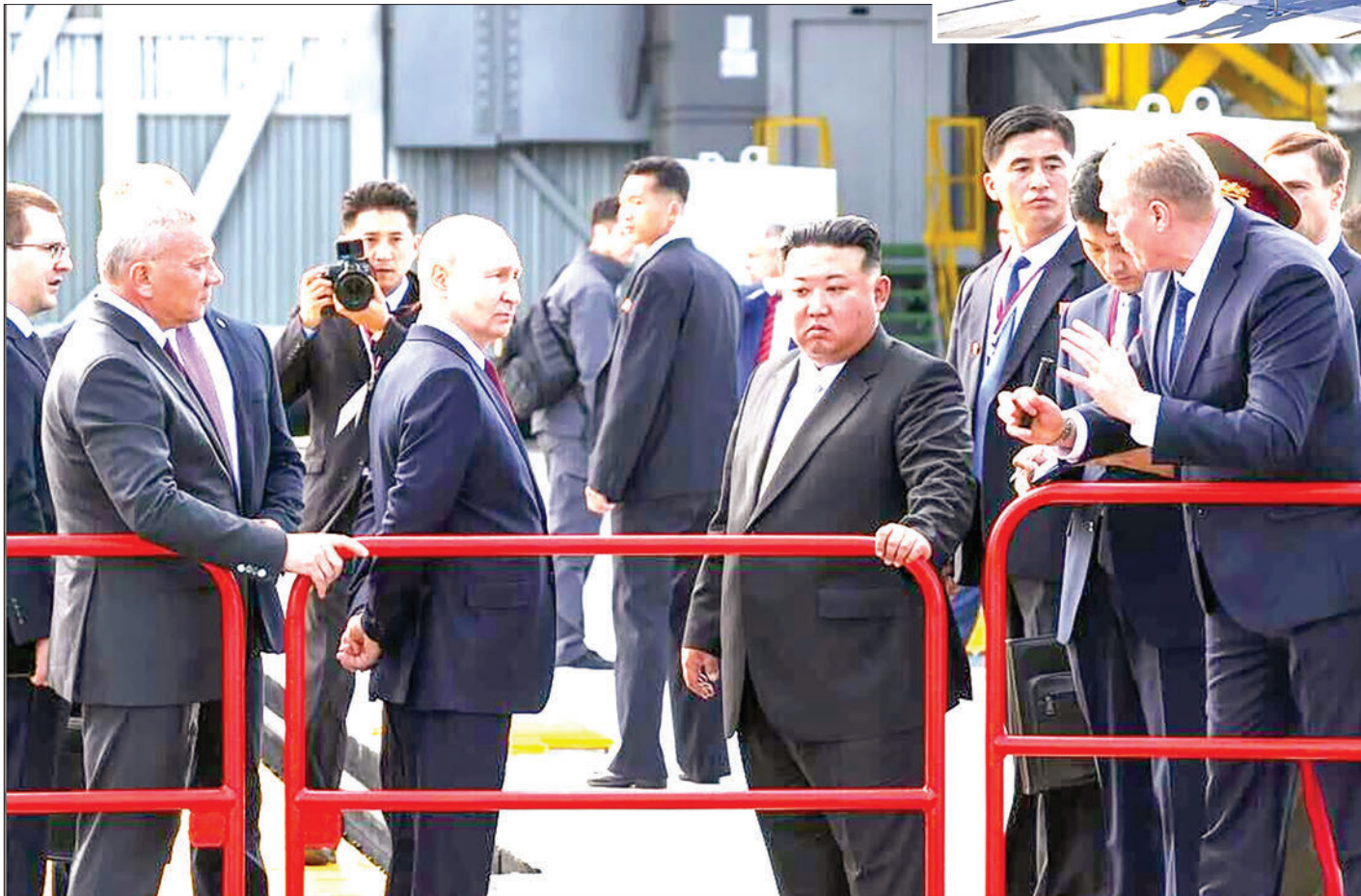
