Five-Point Road Map of the State Administration Council


- 1. The Union Election Commission will be reconstituted and its mandated tasks, including the scrutiny of voter lists, shall be implemented in accordance with the law.
- 2. Effective measures will be taken with added momentum to prevent and manage the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 3. Actions will be taken to ensure the speedy recovery of businesses from the impact of COVID-19.
- 4. Emphasis will be placed on achieving enduring peace for the entire nation in line with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.
- 5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

Those wishing to enter the legal fold can contact respective townships' Red Cross Society, Myanmar Maternal and Child Welfare Association, Myanmar Women's Affairs Federation, Social Welfare Office and social welfare organizations authorized by the Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement in addition to reception centres in border areas, Tatmadaw units and police stations

THE Information Team of the State Administration Council has released statements inviting CDM staff, students and youths, who are in border areas and ethnic armed groups, they can contact the nearest reception centres in border areas, Tatmadaw units and police stations if they want to enter the legal fold and the government will guarantee their lives following the rules and regulations.

In order to prevent the unnecessary loss of human resources, the State Administration Council has publicly invited the basic education staff who are absent from duty to resume their duties and those who take part in armed resistance under various names of groups, including PDFs. Meanwhile, 3,156 education workers, who were absent from their duties, another 1,009 people, who want to withdraw the cases that were opened against them, and 231 PDF members have contacted and returned to the legal fold. Then, they were given back to their parents systematically and the numbers of people who enter the legal fold and those who wish to are rising. Therefore, the government is making efforts to accept more numbers of those people.

The government opens reception centres in bor-

der areas for those who would like to return to the legal fold. Moreover, those wishing to return home can contact respective townships' Red Cross Society, Myanmar Maternal and Child Welfare Association, Myanmar Women's Affairs Federation, Social Welfare Office and social welfare organizations authorized by the Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement. It is guaranteed that they will be able to lead their daily lives peacefully.

223 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 7 September, total figure rises to 616,023

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to 616,023 after 223 new cases — 14 imported and 209 local transmission — were reported on 7 September 2022 according to the Ministry of Health. Among these confirmed cases, 593,983 have been discharged from hospitals. Death toll still stands at 19,442 without more casualties.

COVID-19 vaccine is being injected to those of priority groups in regions and states for prevention and control of the disease. Up to 6-9-2022, a total of 30,412,443 people above 18 and a total of 6,464,093 people under 18 have been vaccinated. —MNA

Small countries become victims of dollars manipulated by big countries: Senior General

Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing yesterday afternoon participated in the Plenary Session of the 7th Eastern Economic Forum-2022 held on the campus of Far Eastern Federal University (FEFU) in Vladivostok of the Russian Federation.

The plenary session was attended by President of the Russian Federation Mr Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin, Prime Minister of Armenia Mr Nikol Pashinyan, Mongolian Prime Minister Mr Luvsannamsrain Oyun-Erdene, Chairman of the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress of the People's Republic of China Mr Li Zhanshu and delegation members, Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing together with Council Joint-Secretary Lt-Gen Ye Win Oo, Union Ministers U Win Shein, Dr Kan Zaw, U Hla Moe, U Khin Maung Yi, U Thaung Han, Dr Myo Thein Kyaw and Dr Thet Khine Win and Governor of the Central Bank of Myanmar Daw Than Than Swe, Ambassador of Myanmar to Russian Federation U Lwin Oo and business delegates from more than 90 countries.

At the plenary session, President Mr Vladimir Putin discussed the current development of Russia's eastern region,



the situation to support the improvement of competitiveness in investment, the establishment of special economic zones for attracting cooperation of investors from Asia and the Pacific Region, efforts for the emergence of a port with the improvement of communication technologies to admit docking of cargo ships, and a plan underway to emerge a northern sea route which will link Asia with Europe.

In his discussions under the title "The important role of Myanmar in the food security sector and good opportunities in investment", the Senior General said that as the energy necessary for the daily life of a human is obtained from foods, food security is the most crucial and most important for all human beings across the world. Food security was defined for many decades

as the sufficient supply of food to all living beings residing in a country. But the definition has changed this era as every country produces foodstuffs in compliance with the developing trade measures. Especially, global countries import foodstuffs from the international market due to a lack of capability to produce them at home, so financial security gradually influences food security.

In trading inputs such as fuel and fertilizers necessary for agriculture which plays a key role in food security, some countries utilize dollars as a tool because of the status of dollars in connection with financial security. As such, small countries become victims of dollars manipulated by big countries. It can be seen that those small countries are unable to defy the political and

economic sectors against the big countries. Myanmar can use currencies such as rouble, yuan and rupee in the placement of dollar. Moreover, the dollar can be substituted with a barter system. If so, small countries can overcome the difficulties of monetary bullying. Hence, the Senior General requested the powerful friendly countries to give a helping hand to them.

A country needs to have availability of adequate food volume, foods at fair prices and healthy foods in implementing food security. If healthy foods can be sufficiently purchased at fair prices in a country, such a country can be identified as a food sufficient country. The main challenges related to the food security of a country are growing population, rising the food demand, changes in food prices,

shortages or disappearance of crop varieties, climate change, scarcity of water and lands for agriculture and livestock farming, food waste and extinction and wasting of foods for various reasons.

As the global population rose in past years with increasing life expectancy, the number of the world's population will reach 8 billion in coming November 2022. Researchers and experts estimate that the world's population will reach 8.5 billion in 2030, 9.73 billion in 2050 and 10.4 billion in 2100. Food supply is crucial for the daily requirement of every person, not clothing and accommodation. So, it is necessary to emphasize solving the food problem. Food demand will be higher together with the growing number of population, and especially, basic staple foods such as rice and wheat, oil and oil crops, meat and meat products, and milk and dairy products as well as crops will face remarkably high demand.

Myanmar is located in Southeast Asia as a strategic area geographically bridging two large oceans, playing an important role in the Indo-Pacific region. Likewise, ASEAN member states are playing a significant role in restoring regional peace and stability, standing as the countries with many opportunities for economic development.

The ASEAN comprising 10 member states is home to more than 660 million population. It produced more than 191 million metric tonnes of rice, more than 45 million MT of maize, more than 144 million MT of sugarcane



and more than 79 million MT of tapioca in 2020. ASEAN countries are able to produce a large volume of basic foodstuff with exportation to foreign countries, taking a leading role in the world food security measure. In the trade sector, ASEAN countries possessed a trade value worth some US\$2.6 trillion in 2020 in trading with the countries outside the ASEAN arena but scored some US\$550 billion of trading among

them. Hence, ASEAN outside

trading remarkably exceeded

rather than inter-ASEAN trad-

ASEAN region allots more than 139 million hectares of net cultivable lands, more than 23 million hectares of which are placed under paddy farms in Myanmar, Thailand and Vietnam. Hence, all need to undertake the cultivation of paddy in all farmlands in all seasons.

Myanmar is endowed with good resources for agriculture and livestock farming such as cultivable lands, natural forests, natural rivers and creeks, lakes and coastal lines. There are more than 13 million hectares of cultivable lands in the country that exports rice, bean and maize. As there are plentiful water sources, Myanmar mostly grows paddy, pulses and beans, maize, sesame and cotton crops. In order to produce food for food security, it needs to have quality strains of crops, fertilizers, agricultural water and techniques, and primarily, the country needs fertilizers and diesel to be used in operating the farming work. If the friendly countries fulfil the needs of Myanmar, it can double agricultural production, contributing much to food security. As Myanmar has been possessing the local sufficiency of foods for successive eras and exporting surplus agricultural and livestock products to neighbouring countries and global countries. Taking an opportunity, the Senior General disclosed that Myanmar possesses a good tradition of producing basic foodstuffs with the plan to sustain the traditions.

Regarding the oil and natural gas sector, Myanmar has 51 off-shore blocks and, at present,

natural gas is being explored from eight blocks and sold to the markets at home and abroad. Moreover, a natural gas deposit of two trillion cubic feet has been found in the Bay of Bengal and natural gas will soon be produced commercially. There is also potential to explore a bigger natural gas deposit soon. Therefore, natural gas-based industries will develop more in Myanmar in the coming three years and those who would like to make investments in Myanmar were invited. In addition, Myanmar has many oil and natural gas deposits still unexplored and production industries that can export copper, iron and tin to the global markets.

Myanmar is exporting agricultural produce and fishery products to Russia and, at the same time, arrangements are being made to import fertilizers, fuel oil and other petrochemical products from Russia. If we increase cooperation in these sectors, our mutual interests will also be enhanced. We would like to invite the businessmen attending this forum to invest in Myanmar's economic sectors such as oil and natural gas, mining, farming, value-added foodstuffs production, energy, tourism, infrastructure development, rubber-based industrial production, renewable energy, science and technology, information and communication, finance and banking. We can offer opportunities for external trade.

Cooperation programmes like this Eastern Economic Forum-2022 can improve relations between partners in Eurasia and, in this way, we can resist the western influence over the east in the field of international relations. International North-South Transport Corridor-INSTC will materialize by establishing close and strong relations among countries in Asia. From there on, better trade and investment will develop and strengthen the geopolitical stability of the Asia-Pacific region. We believe that the establishment of a strong relationship between China, India, ASEAN and BIMSTEC nations and Russia will encourage the development of countries in Asia,



including Myanmar.

In the present day, the Asia-Pacific region is continuously developing and so it is a region suitable for making investments. As the ASEAN lies at the strategic point of the Asia-Pacific region, it is in a position to lead regional diplomatic relations and economic forums. Moreover, the ASEAN centrality is obvious as it is between rivalries of the world powers, plays a major role in political, military and economic fields and world trade routes have to cross the Southeast Asian region.

We notice that the shortest land route between the ASEAN region and the middle part of Russia and the road between the ASEAN region and Russia across South Asia, the Gulf, and central Asia. It can be implemented in combination with China's Belt and Road Initiative. Myanmar, an ASEAN member nation, is situated at the geographically strategic point for trading with the countries in Southeast Asia and South Asia and establishing inter-relations with the countries in Western Europe and East Asia. Myanmar has enacted the laws necessary for the convenience of foreign investors. Therefore, if foreign investors come to invest in Myanmar, they will be able to export their products to global markets easily and quickly and, in this way, they will enjoy considerable benefits. Therefore, we would like to invite foreign investors as they can also contribute to world food security.

Next, the Prime Minister replied to the questions raised by the master of ceremonies regarding his speech and Russian Federation President Mr Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin gave complementary remarks.

Prime Minister of Armenia Mr Nikol Pashinyan, Prime Minister of Mongolia Mr Luvsannamsrain Oyun-Erdene, Chairman of the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress of the People's Republic of China Mr Li Zhanshu had discussions on respective topics, development of the Eastern region and cooperation between countries in the Asia-Pacific region. Myanmar joins "International Conference on Cultural Property Protection: The Prevention of the Illicit Trafficking of Cultural Properties: An ASEAN Perspective"

THE Myanmar delegation led by Union Minister for Religious Affairs and Culture U Ko Ko joined the "International Conference on Cultural Property Protection: The Prevention of the Illicit Trafficking of Cultural Properties: An ASEAN Perspective" hosted by the Ministry of Culture and Fine Arts of Cambodia via videoconferencing.

During the first session, the International Meeting and Superior Officials' Meeting were held and attended by Superior Officials, cultural heritage conservation experts of ASEAN countries and experts of NGOs.

During the meeting, the officials exchanged views on challenges to promote the protection of cultural property and combat illicit trade.

They also discussed the

brief statement (draft) to be issued at the Meeting of the ASEAN Minister Responsible for Culture and Arts and the Media Statement to be released by Cambodia.

During the second session, the ASEAN Level Ministers' Meeting was held and the leaders discussed the completions, ongoing processes and further work plans to combat the illicit trafficking of cultural properties, challenges and difficulties and advantages of cooperation with international organization.

Air pollution causes 7 mln premature deaths every year

ACCORDING to the report of WHO released in September 2021, air pollution was estimated to cause seven million premature deaths per year and half of them were in developing countries. The deaths were caused by the effects of air pollution, mainly from chronic conditions such as asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, and heart disease, said Deputy Minister for Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation U Tun Ohn during the ceremony of the 2022 International Day of Clean Air for Blue Skies yesterday.

Speaking at the event, the

Deputy Minister said this year's theme of "the air we share" focuses on the transboundary nature of air pollution, stressing the need for collective accountability and action.

The country conducts air quality measurements in Union Territory/Region/State monthly and announces in state-run newspapers starting May 2022.

He continued that it should use renewable energy in industry, and the transport sector, proper technologies that are conformity with the environment, conserve the quality of the environment and also should draft the national lev-

el air quality standards, air pollution prevention strategy and plans to help reduce air pollution.

Then, the documentary video of the 2022 International Day of Clean Air for Blue Skies was presented.

He noted that in the first half of 2022, military products were exported according to shipping schedules and agreements with foreign partners. In total, the products were delivered to more than 30 states, the head of FSMTC

The Su-57 advanced multirole fighter jet is designed to conduct missions against air, ground and surface targets day and night using modern and advanced guided and unguided weapons. The aircraft is equipped with the latest avionics, armament and self-defence systems.

In the category of aircraft armament, the absolute novelty



Another Russian product that received a lot of positive feedback and was exhibited at Army 2022 is the T-14 tank based on the Armata universal combat platform.

"The vehicle has incorporated unprecedented design solutions, in particular, the T-14 has an uninhabited turret, and the crew is in an armoured capsule separated from the ammunition. The tank is equipped with an active protection system and explosive reactive armour, a remotely-controlled weapon station (RCWS)

with a powerful gun and an automatic loader. Electro-optical surveillance, sighting and target acquisition sensors are installed along the perimeter of the turret and the hull," the press service of the developer of the T-14 tank, Uralvagonzavod Corporation,

Almost the entire line of United Aircraft Corporation's (UAC) military aircraft Su-34, Su-35, Su-57, Su-30SM, Yak-130, Il-78MK-90A, Il-76MD-90A, MiG-35, MiG-29K, Be-200, etc was showcased.

The Su-30SM super-manoeuvrable multirole fighter was demonstrated. The aircraft is able to effectively penetrate air defence and has great fighting capabilities owing to the large weight of the delivered weapons load and super-manoeuvrability that gives it an edge over the air enemy in close air combat.

Russian experts also note the following key advantages of this and other Sukhoi fighter jets: lethal guided missiles and unguided rockets plus a 30-mm autocannon; autonomous basing and in-flight refuelling capability; open architecture of the avionics and weapons systems.

In the segment of military transport aircraft, a new Rus-

sian Il-76MD-90A military transport aircraft was on display. It is based on the Il-76MD production aircraft, which is widely used around the world, and is designed to further improve this type of aircraft and expand its transport capabilities by upgrading its wing and installing more powerful, fuel-efficient and low-noise engines PS-90A-76 instead of D-30KP-2

The Ka-52 scout/attack helicopter was shown at Army 2022 in the Ka-52K Katran shipborne version. It can be deployed on ships and on land and is fitted with an ejection & shock absorbing

Another exhibit item of the forum was the Mi-28NE combat helicopter, equipped with the latest guided missile systems and equipment to communicate with unmanned aerial vehicles, which enhances its capabilities to engage enemy targets covered by air defences.

The Mi-28NE's "neighbour" in the exhibit located in Patriot Park was the Mi-35P transport/ attack helicopter based on the Mi-24P helicopter. The Mi-35P inherited the advantages from its predecessor, including its excellent speed, transport/combat capabilities and combat survivability features. The Mi-35P can be

equipped with guided weapons, as well as the President-S airborne defensive aid suite. A feature of the Mi-35P is its capability to operate in the highlands, in hot and humid climates.

First unveiled at the Army exhibition, the Orlan-30 UAV is capable of conducting various missions depending on its payload version - patrolling, surveillance, the guidance of precision weapons, target illumination, post-attack analysis, etc. The vehicle can be transported in a special

Visually, the Army Forum is often associated with tanks - indeed, it is rare to see such a variety of armoured vehicles in such a limited area at the exhibition.

Uralvagonzavod presented its most advanced armoured vehicles at Army 2022: the T-14 MBT on the Armata platform, T-90MS MBT and the BMPT-72 tank support fighting vehicle.

"The T-90MS is the newest vehicle in the T-90 family and another example of the great growth potential of armoured vehicles manufactured in Tagil. The modernization was so multilevel that the T-90MS can rightfully be considered a new combat vehicle.

Tamarind, jaggery prices increase in early September

THE price of tamarind, which stayed flat over H1, started rising in early September, Ko Hla Han, an owner of the tamarind from the Bayintnaung Wholesale Market, told the Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM).

Only the seedless tamarind is priced higher at K2,800-4,200 per viss (a viss equals 1.6 kilogrammes) depending on quality in the wholesale market in Yangon, whereas the price of tamarind with seeds has remained unchanged at K2,100-2,200 per viss for eight months.

Between January and August 2022, the prices of tamarind hit the highest of K3,500-3,600 per viss only.

In 2022, although kitchen grocery food items inflated, tamarind prices were stable. There is a saying that tamarind prices stay low when the prices of other commodities climb up. However, tamarind price goes up when

other price indices are constant, Ko Min Ko, a tamarind vendor on Kayay Street, told the GNLM.

On 14 January, fresh tamarind entered the Yangon market with the wholesale price of K2,000 per viss. The price slid to K1,850 per viss on 24 January. The seeded tamarind prices have stayed at K2,100-2,200 per

viss since then. Meanwhile, the prices of seedless tamarind gradually increased from K2,950 per viss. In the first week of September, it peaked at K4,200 per viss.


In the corresponding period 2021, the prices of seeded tamarind were K1,400-1,500 per viss and the seedless tamarind were priced at K1,900-2,400 per viss. During the same period of 2020, the prices stood at K2,100-2,200 per viss of seeded tamarinds and K2,800-3,500 per viss of seedless tamarinds. The seedless tamarind prices were estimated at K2,800 per viss in late 2021 and K3,900-4,000 per viss in December 2020, the market data indicated.

Traders from regions outside Yangon speculated about the good price of tamarind in the harvest season in early 2022, while traders involved in Bayintnaung Wholesale Market predicted the different opinions from it

The wholesale prices of jaggery started to inch higher this month. On 7 September 2022, the jaggery prices moved in the range of K2,600 and K3,400 depending on the qualities and jaggery producing area. The prices indicated a sharp increase of K250-300 per viss compared to the previous week (the last week of August), Ko Kyin from a jaggery warehouse located on Nguwah Street.

The jaggery prices stood at K1,425-2,000 per viss on 7 September 2020 and K1,900-2,400 per viss in the year-ago period (2021) respectively.

Thus, the jaggery price hit a three-year high in early September 2022. The inflation of commodity prices is seen in the kitchen grocery market in Yangon, said a trader who delivers the goods to the regions and states. — TWA/GNLM

55 cargo ships of 14 international shipping lines scheduled to arrive at Yangon Port

IN September 2022, 55 cargo ships carrying many containers, operated by 14 international shipping lines, were scheduled to enter terminals in Yangon Port, according to a notification of the Myanma Port Authority.

The number of cargo ships entering Yangon Port stands at 49 of 13 lines in January, 48 of 13 lines in February, 50 in March, 52 of 14 lines in April, 54 of 12 lines in May, 53 of 15 lines in June, 49 of 15 lines in July and 55 ships in August respectively.

Earlier, the larger ships had draft problems preventing their sailing on the Yangon River. The draft extension is up to 10 metres with the new navigation channel accessing the inner Yangon River. Yangon inner terminals and the outer

Myanmar aquaculture products export generates over \$260 mln as of 26 August

THE value of Myanmar's seafood exports as of 26 August in the current financial year 2022-2023

was estimated at over US\$260 million since 1 April, the Ministry of Commerce's data indicated.

The figures showed a small decrease of \$1.65 million in nearly six months as Myanmar's fisheries export bagged \$261.733 million in the corresponding period of the 2021-2022 mini-budget period.

Myanmar exports raw aquaculture products from farms and is caught by onshore and offshore fishing businesses to the external markets. Additionally, aquaculture products are also exported after being processed at cold storage facilities. The Department of Fisheries and Myanmar Fisheries Federation are working together for

fishery export promotion and local consumption.

Myanmar annually shipped fisheries products to 45 foreign countries. In the livestock sector, only live cattle are exported to neighbouring countries through cross-border trade channels. Myanmar has been importing shrimp larvae from a neighbouring country to execute the commercial shrimp culture. The public-private partnership is, therefore, required to conduct induced breeding of shrimp, according to the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation. - TWA/GNLM


Oil bowser overturned on PyinOoLwin-Lashio Road

Sesame prices skyrocketing due to low yield, Kyat depreciation

THE prices of sesame seeds are edging up in the domestic market on account of the low yield and Kyat depreciation against foreign currencies in the local forex market, the traders said.

The price of black sesame seeds hit over K200,000 per 45viss bag in early 2022, while it was priced at approximately K255,000-K320,000 per bag on 7 September. The prices were K315,000-320,000 per bag of white sesame, K350,000-360,000 per bag of Japanese sesame and K240,000-250,000 per bag of brown sesame.

Those sesame seeds which pass the acid test level are primarily traded. It is hard to maintain sesame quality in the monsoon season, the growers from Sagaing Region said.

Additionally, after Myanmar's export ban on oil crops reversed, the prices of peanut and sesame prices inflated. The local millers are also increasingly purchasing them, scaling the stocks down, according to the commodity depots.

Myanmar's sesame was earlier exported to China, South Korea, Japan, Singapore and China Taipei (Taiwan). However, it is now relying solely on China and the shipments to other foreign countries have certain difficulties.

Sesame is cultivated in the country throughout the year. Magway Region, which has gained a reputation as the oil pot of Myanmar, is the main producer of sesame seeds. The seeds are also grown in Mandalay and Sagaing regions.

Of the cooking oil crops grown in Myanmar, the acreage under sesame seed is the highest, accounting for 51.3 per cent of the overall oil crop plantation. Approximately 600,000-800,000 tonnes of sesame seeds are produced yearly. — KK/

RAW gold metal is unlikely to be imported from foreign countries in the current rainy season, said Chairman U Myo Myint of the Yangon Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association (YGEA).

Nonetheless, global gold prices surged to US\$1,800 per ounce in May and June. Although the prices have stayed below \$1,800 per ounce since early August, Kyat's depreciation against the US dollar forced the importers to suspend the

"The import plan is yet to come. The association is still discussing with the officials concerned about dollar transactions. Only when we can buy dollars from the government can raw gold metal be imported. We are still seeking approval from the Central Bank of Myanmar," said U Myo Myint.

At present, raw metals from some gold mines of the regions and states other than Yangon and the resales of imperfect items and scrap metals are circulating on the market. Although raw gold metal import is improbable for now, there is a sufficient stock of raw metal in the domestic market, he continued.

Additionally, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation declared the sales of gold coins weighing one tical, 0.5 tical and 0.25 tical through state-run media on 2 September. The gold coins can be available every day except for the office holiday.

The floor price set by YGEA was below K2 million per tical (0.578 ounce or 0.016 kilogramme) yet the gold price peaked at K3.1 million per tical in the markets.

Additionally, the CBM's reference exchange rate against a US dollar is set at K2.100, while a dollar is valued at K3,600 in the unofficial market. — NN/GNLM

Directors, shareholders in absence of AR disallowed to set up new companies

of those companies which failed to file annual returns (AR) are not allowed to set up new companies, according to the Business and Finance Consulting Team of Myanmar Enterprise Solutions.

In recent days, the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration responded to those businesses seeking a business permit to resubmit only after they have tackled failing AR cases in line with the Myanmar Companies Law, companies received that remark.

"The directors and share-

SHAREHOLDERS and directors holders of those suspended companies which failed to submit AR are no longer granted to set up a new one. It is a kind of warning. The authorities want the companies to deal with the old ones first," Myanmar Enterprise Solutions posted on its Facebook

However, there is no certainty whether directors and shareholders of the companies that have been struck off the register are blacklisted or not.

This action aims to avoid unnecessary bloated business operations, according to Myanmar Enterprise Solutions.

As a result of this, directors and shareholders of the companies are required to strictly adhere to the laws than before. They should not have stayed as the company struck off, and should have followed a systematic dissolution process.

Therefore, companies are encouraged to check their status via https://www.myco.dica. gov.mm/corp/search.aspx by entering their company name or registration number in the search box if they are found to be suspended, they need to deal

with this as soon as possible.

At present, there are thousands of companies that fail to file AR before the due date and over 400 are declared suspended every month for the absence of

As per DICA's report, newly established companies are required to submit ARs within two months of incorporation or face a fine of K100,000 for filing late

The DICA has notified that any company which fails to submit its AR within 13 months will be notified of its

suspension (I-9A). If it fails to submit the AR within 28 days of receiving that notice, the system will show the company's status as suspended. Companies can restore their status only after shelling out a fine of K50,000 for the AR fee, K100,000 for restoration of the company on the Register, and K100,000 for late filing of documents, totalling K250,000.

If a company fails to restore its status within six months of suspension, the registrar will strike its name off the register, according to the DICA notice. -NN/GNLM

Real life, right now — photo app claims to capture authenticity

IT'S not all sunsets and selfie smiles — people are flocking to a new social network app that calls on users to share true glimpses of their lives rather than cherry-picked moments.

Once a day, BeReal simultaneously prompts users to take photos of what they are doing, giving them two minutes. The app uses front and rear facing cameras on phones, putting shared "selfies" into context.

The app shuns software filters that add glossy special effects or touch-up effects.

The approach is a sharp contrast to the carefully cultivated images common on Instagram and Facebook that often focus on parties, holidays,

fancy food and perfect weather. "The ideal of Be-Real is you are just in a moment—where are you and what are you doing right now," said Jennifer Stromer-Galley, a professor at Syracuse University school of information studies in the United States.

"Our lived lives, not

our lived lives, not our best lives — maybe you are walking the dog or in your pajamas eating cereal." Launched two years ago by French entrepreneurs, BeReal has seen its popularity surge in recent months.

It was the most downloaded app in the United States at start of September, and ranked among the top three in Britain and France, according to figures provided by market tracker Data.ai.—AFP

Nissan, Honda to boost battery procurement amid electric vehicle push

TWO Japanese automakers on Wednesday unveiled measures to boost their capacity to procure batteries, with Nissan Motor Co saying it will acquire one of its key suppliers, as the producers look to accelerate the development of electric vehicles. While Nissan has announced its acquisition of lithium-ion battery maker Vehicle Energy Japan Inc, Honda Motor Co said its Chinese unit will set up a joint venture later this month with local automakers to jointly procure EV batteries.

The announcements come as automakers worldwide expand their efforts to roll out less-polluting, electrified cars amid stricter environmental

regulations.

Nissan said it will acquire Vehicle Energy for an undisclosed sum to secure a stable supply of batteries and facilitate the development of next-generation batteries. The au-

tomaker said it will buy the 47 per cent stake in Vehicle Energy held by the state-backed fund INCJ Ltd., and purchase more shares to be issued by the battery maker.

Vehicle Energy-

which is based in Hitachinaka, Ibaraki Prefecture — is currently providing lithium-ion batteries to Nissan vehicles such as its flagship compact car. With the deal, Vehicle Energy will become a consolidated subsidiary of Nissan, and its existing shareholders Maxell Ltd., another battery manufacturer, and Hitachi Astemo Ltd., an auto parts maker, will continue to hold their stakes, according to Nissan.

Juul agrees to pay \$438 mln in US over marketing vapes to youth

JUUL Labs will pay \$438.5 million to settle a probe by 34 US states that found the vaping company marketed to underage smokers, state officials announced Tuesday.

Under the agreement, which is still being finalized, Juul would provide payments over the next 6-10 years to individual US states and pledge to not

employ cartoons in ads or otherwise market to younger consumers.

The probe was led two years ago by state officials in Connecticut, Oregon and Texas and joined by other states.

The investigation "revealed that Juul wilfully engaged in an advertising campaign that appealed to youth, even though its

e-cigarettes are both illegal for them to purchase and unhealthy for children," according to a press release from the Oregon Department of Justice.

Juul "relentlessly marketed to underage users with launch parties, advertisements using young and trendy-looking models, social media posts and free samples," the press release said, adding that the company used age verification techniques "that it knew were ineffective."

"The conduct that led to this settlement was reprehensible and demonstrates pure corporate greed at its most damaging," said Oregon Attorney General Ellen Rosenblum.—AFP

El Salvador marks 1st year of Bitcoin use as confidence wanes

A year ago, El Salvador began accepting Bitcoin as legal tender following a controversial and much criticized decision by President Nayib Bukele.

All seemed rosy for the first few months as citizens enthusiastically embraced the new opportunity, but Bitcoin's value has plummeted since and some experts say the move has been a failure.

Maria Aguirre, 52, a shopkeeper in the El Zonte seaside resort that has been a major centre for Bitcoin use, says things were going well last year as Bitcoin's value rose from \$52,660 at opening on 7 September 2021, to briefly over \$68,000 a couple of months later.

"But over the last

five months it's been only falling," said Aguirre, who continues to accept Bitcoin transactions.

Bitcoin has dipped under \$20,000 for most of this September.

In El Zonte, around 60 kilometers southwest of capital San Salvador, Bitcoin was already being used before Bukele's move, which was designed to encourage a population where only 35 per cent of people owned an account at a financial institution in 2021, according to the World Bank.

El Salvador became the first country to accept Bitcoin as legal tender, alongside the US dollar that has been the official currency for two decades.—AFP

New Israel strikes put Aleppo airport out of service: Syria state media

ISRAELI strikes hit Syria's Aleppo airport on Tuesday evening, damaging the runway and putting the facility out of service, the official SANA news agency said.

It is the second reported Israeli strike on the airport in northern Syria in less than a week.

"At around 8:16 pm (1716 GMT), the Israeli enemy fired missiles from the Mediterranean Sea... targeting Aleppo International Airport, damaging the runway and rendering it out of service," it said.

SANA said earlier that Syrian air defences had intercepted some missiles, and reported material damage.

Syria's private airline Cham Wings announced that all flights to and from Aleppo would be routed to the capital Damascus due to the strikes.

The Syrian Observatory for

Human Rights, a Britain-based war monitor, said several explosions were heard near Aleppo airport, "resulting from Israeli strikes on warehouses of Iran-affiliated militias".

The monitor, which has a vast network of sources on the

ground in Syria, said at least two missiles destroyed the depots, causing a fire and "heavy material damage".

On Wednesday last week, SANA said Israeli strikes hit Aleppo airport, causing "some material damage".—AFP

Australia, East Timor sign defence agreement amid regional tensions

AUSTRALIA and East Timor on Wednesday signed a defence cooperation agreement that will allow greater military cooperation between the neighboring countries amid rising competition in the Indo-Pacific.

The deal, inked on a visit to Australia by East Timor President Jose Ramos-Horta, will facilitate increased defense and security cooperation, particularly in the maritime domain, where the two countries share a border in the resource-rich Timor Sea.

"We have been working towards a (defense cooperation agreement) for over a decade and today's signing is a significant step forward in our partnership," Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said in a statement following the signing. Ramos-Horta and Albanese met in the capital Canberra earlier Wednesday to discuss issues including common security, economic cooperation, labour mobility and skills, and Australia's support for East Timor's bid to join the Association of Southeast Asian Nations, the statement said.

Wednesday's signing follows Australian Foreign Minister Penny Wong's visit to East Timor last week, as Australia looks to strengthen ties with countries in the region amid China's growing presence.

The Southeast Asian nation inked a series of development assistance agreements with China in June, during Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi's tour of eight Pacific island nations.— Kyodo

RUSSIA-UKRAINE CONFLICT

Russia 'regrets' IAEA report did not blame Ukraine: UN envoy

RUSSIA on Tuesday voiced regret that a report by the UN nuclear watchdog warning of risks at Ukraine's Zaporizhzhia plant did not blame Kyiv for shelling the Moscow-occupied site.

"We regret that in your report... the source of the shelling is not directly named," Russian Ambassador Vasily Nebenzya told a Security Council session attended virtually by Rafael Grossi, head of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA).

"We do understand your position as an international regulator, but in the current situation it's very important to call things by their name," he said.

The IAEA in a report released earlier Tuesday called for a demilitarized zone to be set up outside Europe's largest nuclear plant, which was seized by Russian troops during their invasion of Ukraine.

Both sides have blamed

each other for shelling, which took place again Tuesday despite the watchdog's recommendations.

"If the provocations by the Kyiv regime continue, there is no guarantee that there won't be serious consequences, and the responsibility for that lies fully with Kyiv and its Western backers and all other members of Security Council," Nebenzya

Western powers voiced dismay at his remarks, saying that the fundamental issue was Russia's invasion of and occupation of the plant.—AFP

Russia buying huge amounts of N.Korean ammunition for Ukraine: US

RUSSIA is buying potentially millions of artillery shells and rockets from communist North Korea to replenish its stocks depleted by invading Ukraine, the White House said Tuesday.

"Our sense is you could include literally millions of rounds, rockets and artillery shells," National Security Council spokesman John Kirby told reporters. Kirby, citing declassified US intelligence, stressed that the purchases were not yet completed.

"We don't have any indication that the purchase has actually occurred yet, so it's difficult to say what it's actually going to end up looking like," he said, adding that there are "certainly no indications that that materiel, those weapons, are being used inside Ukraine."

According to Kirby, massive purchases of artillery ammunition from the deeply isolated and repressive North Korean government, as well as a deal to purchase military drones from Iran, show the dire straits Russia faces after months of Western economic and technological sanctions aimed at crippling its war machine.—AFP

Divisive campaign clouds party as Brazil turns 200

BRAZIL celebrates the 200th anniversary of its independence Wednesday, with the festivities clouded by a divisive election race and accusations that President Jair Bolsonaro is using the festivities to bolster his campaign.

Trailing in the polls to leftist ex-president Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva ahead of October's elections, Bolsonaro is planning a massive show of strength to mark the occasion, including military parades in Brasilia and Rio de Janeiro and rallies by his supporters in cities across the country.

Last year on Brazil's national day, the far-right president triggered an outcry with a fiery speech saying "only God" could remove him from office and vowing to stop heeding rulings by Supreme Court Justice and top electoral official Alexandre de Moraes, whom Bolsonaro considers an enemy.

That year, Bolsonaro supporters broke through a security cordon in Brasilia on the eve of the festivities and threatened to invade the Supreme Court. The race for the 2 October election has left Brazil deeply divided as it marks the anniversary of the date in 1822 that Dom Pedro I, then the sprawling South American colony's regent, declared its independence from Portugal.

Bolsonaro is trailing Lula in the polls heading into the first-round election, which will be followed by a runoff on 30 October if no candidate wins more than half the valid votes.

But the incumbent looks determined to flex his muscle on Independence Day.—AFP

One century on, cult of Mussolini persists in Italy

ONE hundred years after he took power, the cult of Benito Mussolini persists in the small Italian town of Predappio, where his tomb draws tens of thousands of visitors each year.

Many are just curious but others are driven by nostalgia for a past that weighs heavily on the party tipped for victory in the general election on September 25 — Giorgia Meloni's post-fascist Brothers of Italy.

A white marble bust of "Il Duce" adorns the crypt in the family chapel in the cemetery of this northeastern town, where Mussolini was born, while his sarcophagus is draped with the tricolour Italian flag.

12 dead, 11 injured in Vietnam karaoke bar fire

A fire tore through a karaoke bar in southern Vietnam killing 12 people and leaving 11 injured, a local official said Wednesday. The blaze engulfed the second and third floors of the building on Tuesday night, trapping customers and staff members as dense smoke filled the staircase and blocked the emergency exit, state media reported.

Many crowded onto a balcony to escape the flames, which grew quickly as they caught the wooden interior, and others were forced to jump from the building, the reports added.

Photos showed plumes of smoke billowing out of the bar—located in a crowded residential neighbourhood in Thuan An city, north of commercial hub Ho Chi Minh City — as firefighters on cranes tried to extinguish the fire.

A local official confirmed to AFP that 12 people were dead and 11 injured in the blaze.—

FBI found intel on foreign govt's nuclear readiness at Trump home: report

ONE of the classified documents seized by the FBI at former US president Donald Trump's Florida residence described the nuclear capabilities and military defenses of a foreign power, The Washington Post reported Tuesday.

The newspaper, citing unnamed sources familiar with the case, said that some of the documents found in Trump's Mar-a-Lago residence were so highly classified that only the president and cabinet or near-cabinet level officials would be cleared to authorize other government officials to access them.

It did not name the country whose defense and nuclear capabilities were cited in the document.

According to the Post, such documents require special clearances on a need-to-know basis, rather than a generic top-secret clearance. There were no details as to where in the residence, which also serves as a private members club, the highly sensitive material was found, or under what type of security.

Trump is facing mounting legal pressure, with the Justice Department saying top secret documents were "likely concealed" to obstruct an FBI probe into Trump's potential mishandling of classified materials.—AFP

Chile's president changes ministers after referendum rout

CHILE'S leftist President Gabriel Boric reshuffled his cabinet Tuesday in response to voters resoundingly rejecting a draft text backed by him to replace the country's dictatorship-era constitution.

Two days after the draft was voted down in a referendum, Boric changed his ministers of the interior, health, science, energy and the presidency, opting for individuals closer to the centre of the political left.

The new Interior Minister Carolina Toha, and minister of the presidency Ana Lya Uriarte both occupied top positions under former centre-left president Michelle Bachelet.

On Sunday, a first draft of a new constitution was rejected by nearly 62 per cent of voters in a mandatory referendum that analysts say was also a report card on Boric's performance since taking office in March with promises of installing a "welfare state".

He described the rejection Tuesday as perhaps "one of the most difficult moments politically that I have had to accept".—AFP

KAREN Khachanov set-up a US Open semi-final duel with Casper Ruud on Tuesday when he battled past "devastated" Nick Kyrgios in a big-hitting five-setter, shattering the Australian crowd-pleaser's dreams of a maiden Grand Slam title.

Russian 27th seed Khachanov triumphed 7-5, 4-6, 7-5, 6-7 (3/7), 6-4 over the Wimbledon runner-up to make the last-four at a major for the first time.

Earlier Tuesday, Norwegian fifth seed Ruud defeated Italy's Matteo Berrettini 6-1, 6-4, 7-6 (7/4) to make his second Slam semi-final of 2022 having finished runner-up to Rafael Nadal at the French Open.—AFP

Real Madrid see off Celtic to begin Champions League defence

REAL Madrid shrugged off the loss of Karim Benzema to an early injury as the holders got their defence of the Champions League off to a winning start with a 3-0 victory at Celtic.

The Scottish champions were left to rue not making the most of a bright start as Callum McGregor rattled the post.

However, the Hoops had no response once Vinicius Junior, scorer of the winner in last season's final, broke the deadlock with a calm finish on 56 minutes.

Four minutes later a nonchalant finish from Luka Modric with the outside of his foot doubled Madrid's lead before Eden Hazard struck to continue a 100 per cent start to the season for Carlo Ancelotti's men. -AFP
