SAC Chairman PM Senior General Min Aung Hlaing discusses regional development measures in Pa-O Self-Administered Zone

HAIRMAN of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing, accompanied by his wife Daw Kyu Kyu Hla and officials, went to Kyauktalongyi of Pa-O Self-Administered Zone yesterday morning to talk about regional development tasks.

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Application for registration, political party establishment rights ongoing

UNDER Article 3 of the Political Parties Registration Law, Wunthanu Party and Democratic Party, which are desirous of organizing a political party and under Section 25 of the Political Parties Registration Law, Kachin State People's Party (KSPP), which is desirous of continuing to exist as a political party yesterday applied to Union Election Commission for permissions to establish political parties under the law and rules.

To date, six parties have applied under Section 3 of the Political Parties Registration Law, and 11 parties have applied under Section 25 of the Political Parties Registration Law, totalling 17 parties.

Among these 17 parties, five parties will organize the entire union and 12 parties only within a region or state.

Union Election Commission continues to verify the right to establish and register these parties. — MNA/KZL

Using raw materials from agriculture and livestock farms will benefit relevant regions: Senior General

SHAN State must strive for boosting the per-acre yield of crops to improve the economy, said Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing at the meeting with MSME businesspersons at the city hall in Taunggyi yesterday afternoon. Individual reports on MSME processes

Chief Minister of Shan State U Aung Zaw Aye reported on efforts for the development of MSME in Shan State, local and foreign investments, implementation of projects in industrial zones, conducting manufacturing courses, manufacture of value-added products, implementation of one village, one product project, and disbursement of loans for MSME industries.

Local MSME businesspersons reported on the selling of traditional foodstuffs as value-added products, expansion of plots for the cultivation of avocado, the need for capital for extending agricultural tasks, the need for the G-to-G process for exporting avocado to foreign markets, assistance of government for doing research on livestock breeding tasks, requirements for manufacturing roads and power supply, assistance for the development of potato cultivation in Naungtaya region, development of rice mills, and production of bio-fertilizers in Inlay region. The Senior General responded to the reports.

Discussions of Union ministers in relevant sectors

Union ministers and deputy ministers discussed plans of relevant ministries to distribute quality strains of potatoes for local farmers, systematically apply

for loans under the law and regulations, formation of cooperative societies and provide necessary agricultural machinery and capital, techniques and machinery for building gasifier generators, and issuance of FDA certificates to foodstuffs. The Shan State Chief Minister pledged to provide assistance to local businesspersons in connection with relevant ministries.

Instructions for food security

In his speech, the Senior General said that an emphasis must be placed on food security as foreign foodstuffs flow into the country in addition to domestic foodstuffs. Food must be qualified for FDA disciplines and permission. Businesspersons need to accept the inspection of their foodstuffs systematically before distributing them into the market. **Encouraging local manufacturing industries based on**

local products

The Senior General explained that Myanmar had to borrow foreign loans continuously. Now, the country needs to pay back the loans. In its tenure, the government pays back loans as much as possible. The government encourages agricultural and livestock-based manufacturing industries. Manufacturing based on agriculture and live $stock\,farms\,is\,a\,firm\,and\,assured$ business. Using raw materials from agriculture and livestock farms will benefit the relevant regions.

Livestock breeding

Myanmar imports milk and dairy products yearly, and if dairy cow farming is successfully operated at home, the import volume of dairy products and foreign exchange can be reduced. If Shan State successfully operates dairy cow farming tasks, it will be a

state which will produce the largest volume of dairy products.

The Senior General expressed thanks for the Ayethaya industrial zone of Shan State (South) which distributed eggs to the whole country so as to contribute to the food supply of the people. Meat production can lead to the manufacturing of industrial products. Systematic livestock breeding tasks can benefit the region. Currently, the country can reduce a certain amount of trade deficit. So, efforts must be made for earning foreign exchange from the manufacturing industries.

Agriculture

The Senior General pointed out that Shan State must strive for boosting the per-acre yield of crops to improve the economy. Agricultural farms should use bio-fertilizers which come out from the local livestock farms to benefit the region on one hand. The Senior General instructed officials to expand the cultivation of tea and coffee and use paddy strains of good eating quality.

Contribution to the power supply on the one hand

Generating electricity in relevant regions will contribute to the power requirement of manufacturing industries. Encouraging MSME industries aim to enhance the State economy, substitute imported goods and export domestic products to foreign countries. The Senior General stressed the need to strive for supplying inputs to the agriculture and livestock farms. Cooperative system

Exercising the cooperative system can help develop businesses, and all need to exercise the combined cooperative system. The government disburses development loans as capital for businesses through developing and commercial loans. Businesspersons need to borrow loans just enough for their requirements under the disciplines. Encouraging education for turning out qualified human resources

The government is responsible for the development of a region, and the socioeconomic life development of individuals is concerned with those persons only. Only when it encourages education will the human resources of the country improve. It is necessary to arrange systematic measures for private learning institutions.

Development of the tourism industry

Hot-air balloon festival in Taunggyi attracts people at home and abroad. Likewise, the Inlay region is enchanting to local and foreign travellers. Hence, it is necessary to arrange better production of domestic foods to attract travellers and beautify the region. The government has set a plan to implement Kalaw and Aungban regions as healthcare regions. The Senior General viewed round the domestic products, foodstuffs, personal goods, industrial products, traditional products, clothes and others put on display and asked about market sharing of these products. - MNA/TTA

Avoid gender discrimination against women

LL human beings must have a chance to show off their capacity in all arenas. No one has the right to block or ban anyone to show off their capacity. So also, every female and male person has the chance to keep abreast of others in all aspects.

Life and status of global people are different from each other. But it is not defined as their capacity and qualification. So, anyone should assess others based on life positions and statuses but on capacity and qualification. Hence, all females and males should not be discriminated against in all measures including gender.

Indeed, females including women and girls cannot be set aside from all measures in the world. It is because they all are useful in relevant sectors similar to male persons. Female and male persons must stand tall together in the secular world without the absence of anyone to beautify

society.

As a result, every female has the chance to join the learning as well as workplaces similar to males. Those females have the chance to taste technologies and any professions. As such, the International Women's Day organizing committee of the United Nations set a theme: DigitALL: Innovation and technology for gender equality.

The theme of the United Nations recognizes and celebrates the women and girls who are championing the advancement of transformative technology and digital education. The observance will explore the impact of the digital gender gap on widening economic and social inequalities, and it will also spotlight the importance of protecting the rights of women and girls in digital spaces and addressing online and ICT-facilitated gender-based violence.

If women are unable to access the Internet and do not feel safe online, they are unable to develop the necessary digital skills to engage in digital spaces, which dimin-

ishes their opportunities to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) related fields. By 2050, seventy-five per cent of jobs will be related to the science, technology, engineering and mathematics arenas. Yet today, women hold just 22 per cent of positions in artificial intelligence, to name just one.

Social workers experienced depression during pandemic, finds study

ONCERNING rates of depression, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and anxiety among social workers have been uncovered in a new study published in the journal International Social Work.

Stressors related to COVID-19 were the strongest factors associated with negative mental health outcomes. Those who experienced a higher number of pandemic-related stressors such as health concerns, increased caregiving responsibilities, violence in the home, family stress due to confinement, and stress associated with work-life balance — experienced mental health problems at a higher rate compared with those who were not as impacted by pandemic-related hardships.

"Like physicians, nurses and other allied healthcare providers, social workers are feeling the impact of the pandemic and it is showing up in their mental health," says lead author Ramona Alaggia, a professor at the University of Toronto's Factor-Inwentash Faculty of Social Work (FIFSW) and the Margaret and Wallace McCain Chair in Child and Family. "As we celebrate Social Work Week in Ontario 6 - 12 March and National Social Work Month in March, it is important to recognize the stressors that affect social workers and the well-being of those working in this essential field.

An alarming 40 per cent of the sample reported depression — which is four times higher than the general population

The rate of reported depression among social workers is also substantially higher than other healthcare professionals working in COVID-19-related conditions, where the prevalence rate of depression has been found to be 24 per cent. In total, one-fifth of the sample reported PTSD while 15 per cent reported anxiety.

"As personal stressors among social workers have increased so too have the needs of those they serve," says co-author Esme Fuller-Thomson, FIFSW professor and director of the Institute for Life Course and Ageing at the University of Toronto. "With rising rates of domestic violence, child abuse, mental health illnesses and addictions, death rates in long-term care systems, and homelessness, social workers' jobs have become more demanding than ever."

The majority of survey respondents were from Ontario and married or in common law unions. Half of the respondents had children under the age of 18, and 85 per cent were women, which is consistent with the number of women working in the social work field.





Highway bus lines disallowed to increase ticket prices during Thingyan holidays: YRTC

ACCORDING to the Yangon Region Public Transport Committee-YRTC, express bus lines have been instructed not to raise the bus fares during the Thingyan holidays.

The bus lines have been notified not to collect more charges on bus fares and sell tickets to passengers with no Citizenship Scrutiny Card. It is also instructed to ensure that there are enough buses for passengers who will return to their hometowns, and make sure that occupants wear seat belts while the bus was running.

"The bus lines charge more fares on tickets as the holiday approaches. Such things usually happen due to the lack of effective screening measures," Ko Aye Win, a worker from Nyaung-U, told the GNLM.

A total of 660 buses from 212 highway bus lines in Yangon carry 11,840 passengers daily. It is difficult to buy express bus tickets due to the large number of people travelling from Yangon back to their hometowns during the Thingyan holidays. The illegal sale of highway bus tickets annually occurs due to the inconveniences in the pre-purchase process as well.

Passengers are also informed that they can complain to YRTC if there are bus lines that sell tickets with higher prices. — TWA/CT

ME in Tokyo provides assistance in cremation of 2 Myanmar crew killed in shipwreck

MYANMAR Embassy in Tokyo, Japan, said that it helped for the cremation of two Myanmar crew who died in the shipwreck of an HK-flagged vessel.

The Myanmar Embassy coordinated with the shipping agent for the cremation of U Phyo Min Hein and U Zeyya Nyein according to the wishes of their families.

One of them was alive at the time when he was found and died only after reaching Japan, so there was no difficulty in cremating him in Japan. However, the other one had already died when he was found in international waters and Japanese authorities replied to Myanmar authorities that they could not allow him to be cremated in Japan according to Japanese law.

However, the Myanmar Embassy coordinated with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare of Japan to consider and allow the cremation of the two on humanitarian grounds.

According to the statement of the Myanmar Embassy, the permit for the cremation of those Myanmar crew according to the wishes of their families was obtained on 17 February and the bodies of the Myanmar crew were properly cremated at 1 pm on 2 March.

Students receiving medical treatment can contact nearest centre as Yangon Region set 4 hospital exam centres: MoE

THE Ministry of Education has announced that there will be four hospital examination centres in Yangon Region, and students who are receiving medical treatment can contact the nearest centre. The announcement says that it is planned to open four hospital examination centres in Yangon Region for students who are receiving medical treatment during the matriculation examination.

As the Ministry of Health will ensure that the rights of the students who are admitted to the hospital receiving medical treatment during the matriculation exam that will be held from 8 to 18 March 2023 are not hampered, it will be planned to open four hospital exam centres through the coordination of the Depart-

ment of Treatment and the Myanmar Examinations Department.

The four centres are open at Yangon General Hospital, North Okkalapa General Hospital and Teaching Hospital, Central Women's Hospital, and Waibargi Speciality Hospital. In addition, students who are admitted to the hospital and want to take the exam can contact the medical and social relations department of these major hospitals, the announcement stated.

More than 180,000 students from all over Myanmar will take part in this year's matriculation exam, and the Ministry of Education has issued a notification that they should not forget to take their exam cards with them.

Tamarind sellers doing roaring trade

THE price of tamarinds produced in upper Myanmar regions are expected to increase, traders forecast.

Demand for tamarind strengthens this month. There is a high chance for tamarind to fetch a higher price this year.

The yield of tamarind is pretty good. The price will go up when tamarind exports increase, a seller from Bayint Naung Wholesale Center told the Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM).

During the harvest season, tamarind from the Yamethin area was priced at K2,300 per viss in the wholesale market on 14 December 2022. The prices

stayed on the low side at K1,700-1,800 per viss three months later, while the tamarind fresh fetched K2,500-2,900 per viss in the Yangon markets.

In mid-2022, the price hit an unprecedented high in Yangon. Yet, the price did not go up in 2023. The good quality tamarind fresh is worth K3,100 per viss.

Last year, some traders stored them in the hopes of receiving higher prices. However, the price did not rise and there are even tamarinds produced in 2021 stockpiled at the warehouse.

In late 2022, the supplies to the Yangon market increased, said a seller.

Before the 2000s, tamarinds

were utilized in the tobacco businesses. Now, the number of those

businesses has declined. So, the demand softens significantly.

They are still used in the tamarind extract business.

The export volume of tamarind last year drastically fell compared to the previous years. The traders offer K50,000-100,000 per tamarind plant depending on the yield and then harvest them. Tamarind is sharing markets with other sour fruits such as mango and lemon in the domestic markets. This month, the traders continue buying them when the price is low.

Tamarind price usually climbs when the prices of other commodities are stable, Ko Phyo Ko, who is involved in tamarind trading on Kayan Street, told the GNLM. – TWA/EM

Philippines' inflation rate slows to 8.6% in February

YEAR-ON-YEAR inflation in the Philippines slowed to 8.6 per cent in February 2023 from 8.7 per cent in January after rising for five months straight as the price increase of certain food commodities and energy eased, the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) said on Tuesday.

The inflation rate in February 2022 was lower at 3 per cent. The average inflation rate for the first two months of this year stood at 8.6 per cent.

"Among the 13 commodity groups, the transport was the sole driver of the downtrend of the overall inflation during the month, recording a nineper-cent inflation rate in February 2023 from 11.1 per cent inflation in January 2023," PSA head Dennis Mapa told a news conference.

In contrast, he said nine commodity groups showed higher inflation rates, including food and non-alcoholic beverages at 10.8 per cent and alcoholic beverages and tobacco at 11 per cent.

Meanwhile, Mapa said the core inflation, which excludes volatile food and energy items in the headline inflation, rose to 7.8

per cent in February 2023 from 7.4 per cent in January 2023. In February 2022, core inflation was lower at 1.9 per cent.

National Economic and Development Authority Secretary Arsenio Balisacan said energy and food inflation remained the top contributors to inflation in February, accounting for 1 and 0.9 percentage points (ppt), respectively, followed by restaurant services contributing 0.8 ppt and house rentals with 0.7 ppt. Meanwhile, he added public transport contributed 0.6 ppt. — Xinhua

US wants hike in global crude output, including from OPEC: official

THE United States wants to see a hike in oil production, including from OPEC countries, said a senior State Department official Monday.

"As world economies recover, we'll see more consumption. And therefore we'd like to see supply meet demand," said Jose Fernandez, the US Undersecretary of State for Economic Affairs, Energy and the Environment, on the sidelines of the CERAWeek energy conference, in Houston, Texas.

"We would like to see more supply" of crude globally, including from OPEC+—the 13 members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries and 11 non-OPEC allied countries — Fernandez said.

OPEC+ decided in early October to cut production by two million barrels per day and has not changed its output level since. The price of a barrel of West Texas Intermediate (WTI), the benchmark US variety, is now worth about a third less than a year ago, in the early days of the Russian invasion of Ukraine.

But it is still more than 40 per cent higher than during the same period in 2019, and up almost 30 per cent compared to 2018

Between the beginning of September 2021 and the beginning of January 2023, the administration of President Joe Biden drew nearly 250 million barrels from the US strategic reserves, which was then sold on the US market to relieve skyrocketing gas prices.

The US president has regularly called in the last year for an increase in the OPEC+ output, but the cartel has not raised its quotas for six months. — AFP

Japan commits \$1.6 bln to controversial Australia hydrogen project

JAPAN will spend 220 billion yen (\$1.6 billion) on an ambitious but controversial venture in Australia to produce liquid hydrogen from a type of coal, the project announced on Tuesday.

The Hydrogen Energy Supply Chain (HESC) project is a joint Japanese-Australian undertaking intended to produce plentiful and affordable fuel for Tokyo.

Its backers argue it will help reduce global emissions by producing "clean hydrogen", but researchers say that claim is premised on carbon capture technology that does not exist.

In a statement, HESC said the project has entered its commercial demonstration phase with money from

US factory orders drop 1.6% in January

NEW orders for US manufactured products slid by 1.6 per cent, or 8.9 billion US dollars, in January, to 542.8 billion dollars.

That came after December's rise of 1.7 per cent, according to data released by the US Census Bureau on Monday.

The numbers were a tad better than analysts' expecta-

tions of a 1.8-per-cent decrease.

January's figures came amid mixed messages for the US economy.

While jobs are plentiful, inflation is surging and the US Federal Reserve continues to implement the most aggressive rate hike cycle in decades.

Thai shippers' council expects 8% fall in Q1 exports

THAILAND'S export value is expected to shrink eight per cent in the first quarter of 2023 from a year earlier, weighed down by slowing global demand, the country's shippers' council said on Tuesday.

The forecast, downgraded from a projected 3.7-per-cent decline the Thai National Shippers' Council (TNSC) made a month ago, came after a more-than-expected drop in

Thailand's exports in January.

The Southeast Asian country's exports, a key driver of growth, fell for a fourth straight month in January, down 4.5 per cent year on year to 20.24 billion US dollars, as global demand slowed. The reading was worse than a market expectation of a one-per-cent fall.

The global economy remained highly uncertain, leading to a potential slowdown in

the country's manufacturing sector, while the service and tourism sectors are expected to help drive the economic recovery, TNSC said in a written statement on Tuesday.

It urged the government to regulate electricity tariffs in the next revision, as it is one of the main production costs that impact Thai businesses' competitiveness.

Chinese foreign trade starts new year in a slump

CHINA'S exports and imports fell during the first two months of 2023, according to official data Tuesday, hit by sluggish overseas demand, a massive Covid wave and market concerns over rising US tensions.

The country's exports in January and February tumbled 6.8 per cent onyear, though that was an improvement on the 9.9 per cent drop in December, customs records showed.

Imports fell 10.2 per cent during the same period — worse than the 7.5 per cent drop recorded in December.

The latest figures come as the threat of recession looms over the US and European economies, where galloping inflation is contributing to a sag in demand for Chinese products.

Turbulence in China-US relations continued to weigh on trade between the world's two leading economies, with Chinese exports to the United States down 21.8 per cent in January-February.

S African economy sinks below pre-pandemic levels

SOUTH Africa's economy tumbled below pre-pandemic levels in the last three months of 2022 as record power shortages hit activity, official data showed Tuesday.

The gross domestic product of Africa's most industrialized country

contracted by 1.3 per cent in the fourth quarter, worse than expected by analysts.

"After rallying in the third quarter of 2022 ... GDP fell below pre-pandemic levels," said the national statistics agency StatsSA. The economy had expanded by 1.6 per cent in the July-to-September period.

Growth in Africa's most industrialized country was weighed down in the final quarter by unprecedented levels of power outages.

Only two days were spared by the staggered blackouts during the last three months of last year.

Outages cost more that \$50-million in lost output each day, according to estimates by the energy minister.

The blackouts are

blamed on the 100-yearold state energy firm Eskom which produces about 90 per cent of the country's energy needs.

Eskom is saddled with constantly breaking down generating plants and is failing to meet demand.

The trade and finance sectors were the biggest drags to the economy's growth between October and December, with exports decreasing by 4.8 per cent. Mining agriculture and manufacturing also slumped.

German industrial orders rise again in January

GERMAN industrial orders climbed for a second straight month in January, official data showed Tuesday, as Europe's top economy weathers the fallout from Russia's war in Ukraine better than expected.

New orders, which provide a foretaste of industrial output, rose 1.0 per cent compared to the previous month, federal statistics agency Destatis said.

The figure surprised analysts, who had predicted a decline in factory orders for January.

Destatis said the increase was driven by large orders in aircraft and spacecraft construction from outside the eurozone.

The manufacturing data added to signs "that the current phase of economic weakness will be mild", the economy ministry said in a statement, noting the "improved business climate in recent months".

Germany's economy has proved unexpectedly resilient to the shocks from the Ukraine war, partly thanks to government measures to cushion the impact of higher energy costs and efforts to diversify gas supplies.— AFP

Imperative for China-Russia ties to advance steadily in unstable world: FM

THE more unstable the world becomes, the more imperative it is for China and Russia to steadily advance their relations, Chinese Foreign Minister Qin Gang said Tuesday.

China and Russia have found a path of major-country relations featuring strategic mutual trust and good neighbourliness, setting a good example for a new type of international relations, Qin said at a press conference held on the sidelines of the ongoing annual session of the 14th National People's Congress.

The China-Russia relationship is not a threat to any country, nor is it subject to any interference or discord sown by any third party, Qin said.

With China and Russia working together, the world will have the driving force toward multipo-

larity and greater democracy in international relations, and global strategic balance and stability will be better ensured, he said.

Qin expressed confidence that under the strategic guidance of the presidents of the two countries, the China-Russia comprehensive strategic partnership of coordination for a new era will forge ahead at a higher level. — Xinhua

Iranian, Russian presidents discuss economic cooperation via phone

IRANIAN President Ebrahim Raisi and his Russian counterpart Vladimir Putin on Monday held a phone conversation on the latest developments in bilateral economic cooperation.

The two sides exchanged views on economic cooperation and ways to expand it, particularly in the field of international transportation, according to the website of the Iranian president's office.

The two leaders also reviewed initiatives involving regional transportation devel-

opment, according to Mohammad Jamshidi, deputy chief of staff for political affairs to the Iranian president.

Jamshidi explained in a tweet that the Eurasian integration is the second phase of Raisi's neighbourhood policy which includes the China-proposed Belt and Road Initiative and the International North-South Transport Corridor with Russia

The goal is to strengthen Iran's geoeconomic role, he added.—Xinhua

Gender equality still '300 years away,' UN chief warns

GLOBAL progress on women's rights is "vanishing before our eyes", UN boss Antonio Guterres warned Monday, saying the increasingly distant goal of gender equality will take another three centuries to achieve.

"Gender equality is growing more distant. On the current track, UN Women puts it 300 years away," the United Nations secretary-general said in a General Assembly speech ahead of International Women's Day on 8 March, as he launched two weeks of discussions led by the Commission on the Status of Women. "Women's rights are being abused, threatened, and violated around the world," he added, as he ticked off a litany of crises: maternal mortality, girls

ousted from school, caregivers denied work and children forced into early marriage.

"Progress won over decades is vanishing before our eyes," Guterres said.— AFP

Türkiye quake damage estimated to exceed \$100 bln: UN

DAMAGE from the catastrophic earthquake that struck Türkiye and Syria last month has been estimated at over \$100 billion for Türkiye alone, the United Nations said Tuesday.

"Already it is clear that just the damages alone will amount to more than \$100 billion," Louisa Vinton of the UN Development Programme (UNDP) told reporters via video link from Gaziantep in Türkiye, adding that the recovery costs "will be on top of that".

The 7.8-magnitude quake that struck on 6 February and its aftershocks have claimed more than 45,000 lives in Türkiye and 5,000 in neighbouring Syria.

The World Bank estimated last week that the devastating quake, which flattened entire cities, had caused damage worth more than \$34 billion in Türkiye, with recovery likely to double that sum.

But Vinton said the Turkish government, with support from UNDP, the World Bank and the European Union, had calculated far higher damage.

While preliminary, "it is clear from the calculations being done to date that the damage figure presented by the government and supported by the three international partners will be in excess of \$100 billion,"

Once completed, this estimate will be the basis for a recovery and reconstruction donor conference in Brussels next week, she said.

Recovery costs, including efforts to build improved and more environmentally sustainable infrastructure, "will obviously exceed that amount", she said.

So far, she said, UNDP was "very disappointed and saddened" by the low level of response to funding appeals to

A \$1 billion flash appeal made on 16 February is currently funded at just 9.6 per cent of the total, she said. — AFP

Japan's new flagship H3 rocket launch fails, ordered to self-destruct

JAPAN'S new flagship H3 rocket lifted off Tuesday for the first time but was ordered to self-destruct minutes later after its second-stage engine failed to ignite, the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency said.

The launch failure came after a string of delays including one last month in which a launch attempt was aborted moments before blastoff at the Tanegashima Space Centre on Tanegashima Island in the southwestern prefecture of Kagoshima.

The successor to the country's reliable H2A rocket was launched from the centre at

around 10:37 am as scheduled. However, JAXA sent a self-destruct command to the newly developed rocket at 10:51 am after the launch vehicle was deemed unable to complete its intended mission.

Tuesday's development marks another blow to JAXA, whose smaller Epsilon-6 rocket was ordered to self-destruct just minutes after liftoff in October last year as it deviated from its intended trajectory.

The latest setback may also lead to calls for an overhaul of Japan's space strategy under which the H3, the first revamp of its main launch vehicle in

around 20 years, was expected to give the country a foothold in the increasingly competitive satellite launching business.

Science minister Keiko Nagaoka said Tuesday's outcome

was "extremely regrettable" and apologized for "failing to meet the expectations of the public and related parties".

She said a task force established at the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology will work with JAXA to determine what caused the failure "as promptly and thoroughly as possible".

The failed mission, dubbed Test Flight No 1, was supposed to put into orbit the Advanced Land Observing Satellite-3, which was expected to become a key tool for the government when managing disasters.

Rescuers search for dozens missing after deadly Indonesia landslide

RESCUERS on a remote Indonesian island were searching Tuesday for dozens still missing after a landslide that killed 15 people, a disaster official said.

Poor weather and downed communication lines have complicated rescue efforts on the far-flung island of Serasan, in the Natuna region between Borneo and peninsular Malaysia, home to about 8,000 people.

Pictures provided by Natuna's communication and information agency showed houses reduced to rubble, with fallen trees and torn roofs visible.

Body bags were lined up on top of a blue tarpaulin as officials gathered to pray for the victims.

Abdul Muhari, spokesman for the national disaster mitigation agency (BNPB), told local broadcaster Metro TV that rescuers had recovered 10 bodies at the scene, while villagers put the death toll at 15.

"Six (bodies) have been identified, while four are still being identified," he said.

Muhari said 42 people were missing. Eight previously missing people had been found alive, though four remained in critical condition.

Rescuers were focusing their efforts along a stretch of road near a cliff where dozens of houses were reportedly buried by the landslide, Muhari said.

"Along this road, there are around 30 houses that were buried. This is our focal point of the search," he said.

Muhari added that the agency was sending food and tents, as well as satellite communication equipment and two helicopters in a bid to establish communication lines and speed up aid.

Indonesia is prone to landslides during the rainy season, aggravated in some places by deforestation, and prolonged torrential rain has caused flooding in different areas of the archipelago nation.

Experts say the country's weather-related disasters are likely being made worse by climate change.

Floods further south in Banjar district, in the Indonesian part of Borneo, have inundated more than 17,000 houses and disrupted lives for a month.

Neighbouring Malaysia has also been hit with torrential rains and vast floods. At least four people have died and nearly 41,000 were evacuated last week in several states of the country.

In 2020, the Indonesian capital Jakarta and nearby cities saw some of their deadliest floods in years after downpours triggered landslides.

At least 67 people died in that disaster. — AFP

China-Europe relations not targeted at, dependent on, subjected to third party: FM

CHINA-EUROPE relations are not targeted at, dependent on, or subjected to a third party, Chinese Foreign Minister Qin Gang said Tuesday.

No matter how the situation develops, China always regards Europe as a comprehensive strategic partner and supports European integration, Qin said at a press conference.

China hopes Europe truly achieve strategic autonomy and lasting security and stability, Qin said.—Xinhua

Sri Lanka president says China agrees to restructure loans

SRI Lanka's president said Tuesday that China had agreed to restructure its loans to the bankrupt island nation, clearing the final obstacle to an International Monetary Fund bailout.

China's state-owned Exim Bank "sent a letter to the IMF" on Monday night expressing Beijing's willingness to "restructure" credit to Sri Lanka, Ranil Wickremesinghe told parliament.

Wickremesinghe added that he expected the first tranche of the IMF package to now be released within the month.—AFP

Stampede in New York's Rochester leaves 2 dead, 8 injured

A stampede that took place after a concert in Rochester, New York, on Sunday night caused two deaths and eight injuries, media reports said on Monday.

Local police found three women badly injured in the stampede, two of whom have been announced dead as of late Monday, with the third remaining in critical condition, according to local police.

Besides the three women, seven others went to hospitals with non-life-threatening injuries from the event.

Fear of gunshots caused panic as concertgoers headed to the exits, but local police didn't find "any evidence of gunshots being fired or anyone being shot or stabbed", according to a release by the Rochester Police Department on Monday.—Xinhua

JAPANESE boxing brothers Yudai and Ginjiro Shigeoka will feature in a world minimumweight title doubleheader in Tokyo on 16 April, their promoter said Tuesday.

Younger sibling Ginjiro, ranked fourth by the International Boxing Federation, was unable to claim the division title on his debut attempt on 6 January after his fight against

champion Daniel Valladares was declared a no-contest due to an accidental head butt suffered by the Mexican.

The 23-year-old will square off against third-ranked Rene Mark Cuarto of the Philippines for the interim title on the seventh anniversary of the main shock of a series of earthquakes that ravaged his native Kumamoto Prefecture that month.

"It's a chance for me to energize everyone," said Ginjiro, whose family home was damaged during the series of quakes that month. "I'll win it overwhelmingly."

Yudai, ranked fourth by the World Boxing Council, will take on champion Panya Pradabsri of Thailand, also at Yoyogi National 2nd Gymnasium, as he makes his world title debut. — Kyodo
