


Myanmar's Pathein parasol business needs preservation as artisans dwindle

Over 100,000 tourists visit Myanmar by air from January to May 2024

ACCORDING to the Directorate of Hotels and Tourism, over 100,000 tourists entered

Myanmar by air during the five months from January to May 2024, with the majority origi-

nating from China and Thailand.

Compared to the number of tourists during the same period in 2023, this year's figure has increased by over a thousand.

"They visited Myanmar with business or tourist visas to explore destinations in Yangon, Bago, and Bagan," an official from the Directorate of Hotels and Tourism said.

Overseas tourists visited beach areas less frequently during the first five months of this year, with many Thai tourists opting to visit the Bago area instead. In 2023, more than one million overseas tourists visited Myanmar, according to the Directorate of Hotels and Tourism. — ASH/TKO

Thayet Taunggyi protected public mangrove forest designated for biodiversity preservation

THE Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation (MoNREC), protected public forests and exercising authority under forest reserves to maintain Section 6 (e) of the Forest Law enacted in 2018, declared 601.6 acres of land in Thayetchaung Township of Dawei District in Taninthayi Region as the "Thayet Taunggyi protected public mangrove forest" through Notification 47/2024 (7

The ministry designates the ecosystem of mangrove forests, enriching the diverse biological species, protect against natural disasters by serving as natural barriers, provide seafood for local communities, and improve the administration of mangrove forest ecosystems.

The benefits of protecting the Thayet Taunggyi mangrove forest include conserving mangrove woodlands, preserving habitats for bird species, improving the ecosystem for fish, and enhancing protection against disasters, as they are crucial for the stability of marine ecosystems. - MNA/TRKM

2,000 more shade trees to be planted at Mt Popa

AT Mount Popa, which is called the oasis of Anya (central Myanmar), 2,000 shade trees will be planted, according to the Yenatha Dinger Brothers social welfare group.

As of 2019, the local philanthropic group initiated this project with about 10,000 trees at Mount Popa. Some of those trees are getting taller than humans, and now, they plan to grow more trees.

"We went to observe the location for growing trees at Mount Popa last week. We will need to choose the types of trees. Yellow Champa (Sagawa) and mango trees, which are able to survive, will be included. We started growing trees at Mount Popa in around 2019 and 2020 and planted about 10,000 trees. This year, we will

plant more than 2,000 trees because we have initiated similar projects in Yenangyoung and Chauk townships. In particular, we will grow trees for humans, monkeys, and birds to help them take shelter and eat fruits. Mango can be eaten by both visitors and monkeys," said Ko Yenatha Dinger from the parahita group.

Furthermore, 10,000 perennials have been slated to grow inside and outside of a Parahita park located by Yenangyoung and Magway Road during this monsoon season.

Yenatha Dinger Brothers is a Parahita group that builds lakes, Zayats (resting halls), and roadside drinking water pots (Yaychanzins) in Yenangyoung Township and surrounding areas. — Thit Taw/ZS

The ceremony took place at the M Gallery Hotel, Nay Pyi Taw, on the morning of 14 June 2024.

Deputy Prime Minister and Union Minister for Foreign Affairs U Than Swe, Ambassador of the People's Republic of China to Myanmar Mr Chen Hai, Union Minister for Religious Affairs and Culture U Tin Oo Lwin, Union Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Min Naung, Union Minister for Cooperatives and Rural Development U Hla Moe, Union Minister for Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation U Khin Maung Yi, Union Minister for Industry Dr Charlie Than, Union Minister for Science and Technology Dr Myo Thein Kyaw, Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs U Lwin Oo and senior officials from concerned ministries were also present at the ceremony.

At the ceremony, Deputy Prime Minister and Union

Minister for Foreign Affairs U
Than Swe delivered the opening speech in which he praised the long-standing Pauk-Phaw friendship as well as the establishment of diplomatic relations between Myanmar and China on 8 June 1950, which reached the "Comprehensive Strategic Cooperation Partnership" in 2011 and further elevated to the Myanmar-China Community for Shared Future in 2020 based on the peaceful coexistence policy. He also highlighted the success

of the Mekong-Lancang Cooperation due to the MLC Special Fund Projects started in 2017 with the sole contribution of China and expressed his appreciation to China for granting MLC Special Fund Projects to be implemented in seven cooperation areas under the MLC framework. He reiterated the commitment of Myanmar to work together with China and MLC countries to promote Peace, Prosperity and Stability of the MLC region with the

spirit of "Shared River, Shared Future".

Mr Chen Hai, Ambassador of the People's Republic of China to Myanmar, also delivered the opening remarks. In his speech, the Ambassador recalled the friendly Pauk-Phaw relations, mutual understanding, mutual respect and support between China and Myanmar. In accordance with the Agreement, China will transfer over US\$3.6 million to Myanmar for 12 Mekong-Lancang Cooperation Special Fund Projects for the year 2024. The projects will be implemented in Myanmar by six line Ministries in the fields of agriculture and livestock, forest resources preservation, eco-innovation and green practices of MSMEs, village-level poverty reduction, ICT and innovation and cultural promotion. Myanmar has received a total of 118 projects in various areas with a total value of around US\$35 million from 2017 to 2024 through the MLC Special Fund supported by China. — MNA

Specialists offer medical treatments to residents in Hpa-an on field trip

THE medical specialist teams including professors and physicians from Yangon, Mandalay and Nay Pyi Taw are offering the medical treatments in the States and Regions. Medical specialist teams from Yangon General Hospital, Yangon Specialist Hospital (500-bed) travelled to Hpa-an in Kayin State on 8 and 9 June and gave the medical treatment to local people.

Over the course of these medical trips, a total of 1,496 patients, including individuals from seven townships of Kayin State, two townships of Mon State and surrounding areas, received treatment for a range of medical conditions. These conditions encompassed cardiac diseases, gastrointestinal issues, neurological ailments, neurosurgery, among others.

The medical check-ups included various procedures such as Echocardiography, Oesophago-Gastro-Duodenoscopy (OGD) Scope, Colonoscopy, CT scans, glycated haemoglobin (HbA1c) tests, X-ray examinations, ultrasound scans, and

electrocardiograms (ECG). The medical team provided treatment to two patients requiring neurosurgery.

These medical specialist teams conducted field trips in 2024. These medical teams have travelled to Taunggyi, Pyay, Thandwe, Pathein, Mawlamyine, Magway, Myeik, NyaungU, Myitkyina, Hinthada, Dawei and Kengtung. The medical team will travel to Kawthoung. — MNA/KZL

MNHRC inspects Twantay Myoma Police Lock-up, Mibagon Home for the Aged

THE inspection team led by U Kyaw Soe and U Tin Aung, Members of the Myanmar National Human Rights Commission (MNHRC), inspected Twantay Myoma Police Lock-up and Mibagon Home for the Aged in Twantay Township, Yangon Region, yesterday in accordance with Sections 43 and 44 of the Commission Law.

While inspecting the Twantay Myoma Police Lockup, the MNHRC team inspected the conditions of detainees during the remand period, including whether any torture occurred during investigation and there were opportunities to meet family members as well as the provision of food and drinking water, the handling of sewage, and the overall cleanliness of the facilities.

The inspection team inspected the Mibagon Home for the Aged under the MNHRC Law and procedures to find

out whether the residents were enjoying fundamental rights including health services, appropriate food, purified drinking water, right to freedom of religion, adequate dormitories and arrangements for leisure.

The MNHRC inspection team will inform the relevant department under the MNHRC Law its findings and recommendations for the necessary actions. — MNHRC

Illegal goods seized in various states/regions

SUPERVISED by the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, action is being taken under the law against illicit trading across the nation.

The on-duty team managed by the Kayin State Illegal Trade Eradication Special Task Force nabbed a Higer bus (estimated value of K35 million), travelling from Hpa-an to Nay Pyi Taw, carrying four kinds of goods worth K11.335 million, including 600 bottles of Two Shrimps-brand palm oil (two litres each) from Thailand and 18 sacks of detergent each containing 25 kilogrammes without official documents at the Thanlwin Bridge (Tayokhla side) combined checkpoint on 12 June. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

On the same day, the combined team in Shan State captured 15 sets of all-in-one PC monitors worth K6 million that were smuggled and piled up by the side of the road over the Sinphyu checkpoint in Muse township and a Toyota Ipsum (estimated value of K20 million) carrying illegal teak weighing 0.895 tonne worth K787,600 near Milepost 45 on

the Yangon-Pyay Road in Taikkyi township. The action was taken under Customs procedures and the Forest Law.

During inspections on 12 and 13 June, the combined teams impounded three kinds of goods worth K22,377,423, including 5,409 kilogrammes of fishing net from Thailand in Kawthoung township, a Mitsubishi Fuso truck (approximately K30 million) carrying ten kinds of goods valued at K21,438,050 including 517 kilogrammes of mirror with frame from China without official documents in the Pyigyidagun township, 350 gallons of smuggled fuel oil valued at K3.36 million at the Kantalu combined checkpoint and illegal teak weighing 4.877 tonnes and illegal hardwood weighing 0.846 tonne valued at K2,591,069 in Pyay and Thayawady districts. The action was taken under Customs procedures, the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law and the Forest Law.

Therefore, 13 arrests (estimated value of K152 million) were made on 12 and 13 June, according to the committee. — MNA/MKKS

"Umbrella trade is fine now. We deliver to all regions and states, including Yangon. Both adult and children's umbrellas have been sold well, though. The sale of children's umbrellas is better because this is school season,"

said an official from the Shwe Khit Thit umbrella retail and wholesale trading at Zaycho Market.

The sale of medium-sized and oversized adult umbrellas with attractive designs has been good. However, the sale of children's umbrellas has noticeably risen, and appealing designs have caught children's attention, he

It is anticipated that the sale of different kinds of umbrellas will increase during the period from May to October. However, umbrella trading was slow in the 2022 monsoon season. — Thit Taw/ZS

Authorities receive 38 Myanmar nationals repatriated from India

A total of 38 Myanmar nationals who had completed their sentences at Imphal prison in Manipur state, India, were transferred via the Myanmar-India border checkpoint in Tamu township, Sagaing Region, on 11 June.

Indian officials transferred them back to Myanmar, and Myanmar officials from the Tamu district administration accepted them in accordance with the repatriation laws and policies of both countries. According to the Tamu district administration, Myanmar nationals were temporarily accommodated at the Miekwin monastery in Tamu township, where they underwent health tests and were provided with food and other necessary assistance. — TWA/MKKS

Growing interest among women in traditionally male seafaring professions

RECENTLY, many women have shown interest in seafaring jobs that were once reserved for men, according to Captain Soe Min Aung, president of the Myanmar Seafarers Federation

Most of these women work in catering, kitchen and room services on board.

the ordinary class cannot afford to go abroad or attend school in a foreign country. So, they go abroad as common workers. Then, many women turn to seafaring. They work on passenger ships. As this opportunity opens up, many of them rush to it. They become interested in such jobs," he said.

There are now about 700 women sailors who have attended seafarer training courses and obtained passports.

"Since after 1988, when almost everyone could apply for a passport, they have been working on passenger ocean liners. But, they went abroad to work as hotel staff. According to a 2006 Maritime Labour Convention's provision, all people working on ships must be seafarers. Those who work on a cruise ship under "Most of the people from a hotel must also be seafarers. When they went as hotel staff,

such as waitresses, homemakers, cleaners and receptionists, there were no problems. But, to become a sailor, there are some requirements. So, these women will have to go through all training courses related to seafarers and obtain a seafarer ID. Thereby, they can apply for passports. So far, there are about 700 women sailors," he said. — MT/ZN

7,000 companies fail to file AR in Jan-May 2024

SEVEN thousand companies were struck off the Register in the past five months this year (January-May) as they failed to submit annual returns (AR) on the online registry system, MyCO, according to the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA).

DICA's statistics showed that 750 companies in January 2024, 600 in February, 1,650 in March and 2,000 each in April and May did not file the AR.

DICA notified any registered company that fails to file its AR on the MyCO that it is to be struck off the Register from the date of the directive, under 430 (F) of the Myanmar Companies Law, according to the DICA's notification.

A total of 6,400 companies also failed to submit the AR in 2023. The registration and re-registration of companies on the MyCO website commenced on 1 August 2018, in keeping

with the Myanmar Companies Law 2017.

All registered companies need to submit AR on the MyCO registry system within two months of incorporation and at least once every year (not later than one month after the anniversary of the incorporation), according to Section 97 of the law.

Under Section 266 (A) of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017, public companies must submit annual returns and financial statements (G-5) simultaneously. All overseas corporations must submit ARs in the prescribed format on MyCO within 28 days of the financial year ending under Section 53 (A-1) of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017.

As per DICA's report, thou-

sands of companies were suspended for failing to submit AR forms before the due date. Newly established companies are required to submit ARs within two months of incorporation or face a fine of K100,000 for filing late returns.

DICA has notified that any company which fails to submit its AR within 13 months will be notified of its suspension (I-9A). If it fails to submit the AR within 28 days of receiving the notice, the system will show the company's status as suspended. Companies can restore their status only after shelling out a fine of K50,000 for the AR fee, K100,000 for restoration of the company on the Register, and K100,000 for late filing of documents, totalling K250,000. If a company fails to restore its status within six months of suspension, the registrar will strike its name off the Register, according to the DICA notice. — NN/EM

Myanmar-Thailand border trade nears US\$500M in April-May

MYANMAR'S border trade with the neighbouring country Thailand was estimated at US\$495 million as of 10 May of the current financial year 2024-2025.

The figures plunged from \$829.6 million recorded in the year-ago period, indicating a sharp drop of \$334.6 million.

Myanmar conducts cross-border trade with Thailand via the Tachilek, Myawady,

Kawthoung, Myeik, Hteekhee and Mawtaung border. Of them, the Hteekhee border performed the most extensive trade worth over \$316.54 million in the past two months.

Moreover, the trade values stood at \$50.95 million at Myawady border post, \$44.64 million at Tachilek, over \$35.45 million at Myeik, \$39.38 million at Kawthoung and over \$8 million at Mawtaung.

Myanmar carries out border trade with neighbouring countries such as China, Thailand, Bangladesh, and India. It exports agricultural products, livestock products, fisheries, minerals, forest products, finished industrial goods, and other goods, while it brings in capital goods, intermediate goods, consumer goods, and raw materials from the CMP enterprises. — NN/KK

Myanmar exports over 47,700MT of fisheries in April-May

OF fisheries products placed in the external market in the past two months (April-May) 2024, various fish accounts for 47,719.523 metric tonnes worth US\$51.6 million, comprising 23,687.149 tonnes in maritime trade and 24,032.374 tonnes at the border, the Fisheries Department's statistics showed.

Undeniable Facts of Narcotics Smuggling by AA Group

■ HE AA group, which is being monitored and taken action by international organizations, including the UN, for the recent killing of Bengali people and arson attacks against Bengali villages, is an insurgent terrorist group which is largely undertaking narcotics smuggling.

The AA group, which has emerged in the KIA area since 2009, has primarily earned income to stand on its own from narcotics smuggling like its godfathers KIA, UWSA, MNDAA and TNLA. Actually, the AA group has neither firm businesses nor money from extortion from the Rakhine people since its establishment. It has mainly relied on the income earned from drug smuggling to purchase food, arms and ammunition.

Like the course of insurgents of terrorists in the northeastern part of Shan State, the AA group has made manufacture, distribution and sale of illicit drugs as its major business. It is undertaking narcotics smuggling both at home and abroad. Accordingly, it is witnessed that the involvement of AA members in frequent seizures of drug-trafficking.

According to the records of seizures of narcotics by the Myanmar Police Force, there had been MMK294.82 billion (over USD1,400 million) worth of nine seizures of AA-related drug smugglings between 2016 and March 2024. For evident example, authorities had seized MMK51.87 billion (over

USD24 million) worth of 2.07 tonnes of ICE (Crystal Meth) and 800 kilogrammes of prohibited chemical caffeine between 3 and 9 December 2023. In that case, a drug-related gang which comprises of four officers of AA, three other ranks of AA and eight civilians were arrested. The gang is manipulated by Kyaw Myat Oo (aka) Mg Naing (aka) Thar Thar (aka) Wai Thar Tun, a trusted person as well as a person in charge of earners for AA who is at the rank of Colonel in AA, as per the instruction of AA Leader Twan

According to the confession of AA members under interrogation, the AA group transports ICE (Crystal Meth) stimulant tablets manufactured by ethnic armed organizations (EAOs) in Shan State to Rakhine State by road and sea through Mandalay and Yangon. Again, the AA group distributes those drugs in Rakhine State and Bangladesh's border areas. Next, it smuggles drugs to Malaysia and Indonesia by Rakhine waters. Finally, it mainly smuggles drugs to other foreign markets through Malaysia

Among those tasked with AA's illegal drug trade, the majority of people are AA Leader Twan Mrat Naing's confidants, who are working at AA Headquarters in Laiza, KIA's area. The arrestees did not carry out drug trafficking for personal interests, but they did it for the AA group as a duty. They

receive higher salaries and opportunities than other AA members. Their tasks are sectioned into transporting, carrying and selling. The benefits earned from drug trafficking are used under the management of AA Leader Twan Mrat Naing. He contacts with arms trafficking gangs and exchanges weapons with stimulant tablets. Some 70 per cent of income earned from drug trafficking is used for purchasing arms and

The AA group's drug market is connected with international drug gangs in European countries, including the US and Middle Eastern countries through Malaysia and Bangladesh. As the main route, the stimulant tablets and ICE (Crystal Meth) that are produced in EAOs' controlled areas of northern and northeastern parts of Myanmar is transported through Mandalay. Again, Yangon ports are used to transport those drugs to foreign countries. The drug trafficking is then made to Malaysia and Indonesia by sea. As an overland route, the AA group is making drug smuggling to Bangladesh through Mandalay, Meiktila, Pyawbwe, Magway, Padan, Kyauktaw and


According to the records of the Department of Narcotics Control (DNC) in Bangladesh, the number of people who abuse stimulant tablets is around eight million. Over the past three years, it has been


included in the list of the top five countries on the yearly seizure of stimulant tablets (Yaba). The DNC team seized more than 50 million stimulant tablets every year. The 2021 report by the DNC team stated that the seized stimulant tablets have been transported into Bangladesh from AA's controlled areas, and the AA members are involved in the drug-related cases behind the seizures.

Following the emergence of the AA group, stimulant tablets (Yaba) become plentiful in Rakhine State. As a result, Rakhine youths, as well as those from Bengali refugee camps at the border area with Bangladesh, have become increased. Particularly, the stimulant tablet abuses were much in evidence among the AA members who died in some battles. The AA group reportedly forced its members to use narcotics for armed combat

Even though the AA armed terrorist group is formed with the majority of Rakhine people, all innocent Rakhine people do not accept it, and it does not represent Rakhine State and its people. It is led by a group of extreme racists of Rakhine people who are treading down Rakhine State and people for their personal interests. The AA group is just an armed narco-terrorist group which disturbs the peace and stability of Rakhine State and carries out illegal drug trade largely.

With extreme racism and illegal drug





In the past, security personnel made utmost efforts to stabilize the areas in Rakhine State, making balance in accordance with the laws in communal conflicts between Rakhine and Bengali people. After security personnel were absent from the areas, the lawless atrocities by the AA group against locals have obviously emerged. As become fully aware of the atrocities.

In fact, global countries have come to pay attention to the AA terrorist group because it has killed Bengali people and torched Bengali villages in Buthidaung and Maungtaw areas, Rakhine State. It earns money from drug trafficking and is going on the course of armed terrorist attacks. Myanmar's Pathein parasol business needs preservation as artisans dwindle

SINCE the number of artisans in Myanmar's traditional Pathein parasol business dwindles, people want it to be preserved to prevent it from disappearing, according to the parasol business circle.

Due to high prices and scarcity of raw materials, some professionals have quit the parasol business and moved to other better jobs, so it may die out if it is not supported, they said.

"Ours is a small-scale parasol business at home. Now, some professionals have stopped their business. Some have switched

to seasonal part-time work. That is because raw materials such as wood and bamboo are expensive and difficult to find. When they sell after making parasols, they cannot fetch a good price. The main point is more expensive raw materials. Cutting wood and bamboo can only be done in season. It isn't easy. The profit margin is small, and the price cannot be raised suddenly. So, they have to think a lot. Some have given up this umbrella business and moved on to other available casual work. The number of professionals is

gradually decreasing. This business is dying out," said an official from the Ananta Myitta Pathein Parasol Business in Pathein.

Sales were good in May, but the market is slow during the rainy season, while the peak season is between October and April.

"Sales are good in summer. Demand and supply for Pathein parasols used to be good. Their season is between October and April. It is still good in May. It always sells well in its season every year," he said. — Thit Taw/

ME in Cairo warns nationals in Egypt to renew stay permits on time

MYANMAR nationals in Egypt will need to make sure the validity of their stay permit is met in time, as penalties will follow if it is late, the Myanmar Embassy to the Arab Republic of Egypt urged.

The embassy said in a statement that the General Authority of Passport, Immigration and Nationality already announced in January 2024 that foreigners living in Egypt would have to validate their stay permit during their stay there.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Arab Republic of Egypt has warned that all foreigners in Egypt shall make the application for a resident card, not later than 30 June 2024 at the General Authority of Passport, Immigration and Nationality, the statement said.

Therefore, of Myanmar nationals who have been living in Egypt for various reasons, those who haven't received resident cards or, if they expired, will need to make sure it by 30 June 2024, said the statement.

The statement said the Egyptian Ministry of Foreign Affairs has notified that the Egyptian government would commence actions from 30 September 2024 onwards against foreigners who didn't make resident card applications. Those studying in Egypt will need to willingly accept having examined their resident card as well as student ID card issued by respective schools or universities. — MT/ZS

7,000+ properties listed for cultural heritage preservation

Those cultural heritage buildings are preserved under three effective heritage conservation practices.

The Protection and Preservation of Cultural Heritage Zones Law was enacted in 1998. Myanmar keeps preserving ancient buildings that hold immense value in terms of history, culture, and architecture but are not located within the cultural heritage sites under the Protection

and Preservation of Ancient Monuments Law 2015. Prior to the enactment of those laws, more than 6,800 ancient buildings were preserved in 1972. After that, over 240 more buildings were added to the heritage conservation list. The law covers over 100-year-old properties. The old buildings should be preserved depending on their cultural symbolism, historical significance, and architectural value. Over 200 more buildings

were found for preservation in late 2022 in different regions and states. This year, 39 more buildings were added to the heritage conservation list," U Aung Aung Kyaw elaborated.

Those 39 newly listed heritage buildings recognized in March 2024 are located in Nay Pyi Taw Council area (one building), Mandalay Region (eight), Yangon Region (eight), Ayeyawady Region (12) and Rakhine State (10).

Japan enacts law ensuring access to third-party apps

JAPAN on Wednesday enacted legislation to ensure tech giants like Google and Apple give access to third-party smartphone apps and payment systems on their platforms or risk major fines.

Similar to the European Union's new Digital Markets Act, the law mandates that they act fairly and make operating systems, browsers and search engines available for all.

Behaviour deemed anti-competitive will see operators fined 20 per cent of their revenue in Japan for each offending service, rising to 30 per cent if they do not stop.

"The EU has already taken early steps and implemented new regulations," a Japan Fair Trade Commission statement said.

"For the digital markets of Japan, the United States and Europe to align their efforts and demand fair competition from digital platform operators, a new legal framework is needed in the Japanese market." - AFP

US inflation data unlikely to alter Fed plans to hold rates steady

FRESH US consumer inflation data published Wednesday is unlikely to sway the Federal Reserve, which is widely expected to leave its key lending rate unchanged and lower the number of cuts it has penciled in for this year.

The May headline consumer inflation rate is expected to be little changed from a month earlier, according to the median forecast of economists surveyed by Dow Jones Newswires and The Wall Street Journal. If the analysts are correct, inflation will remain stuck firmly above the Fed's long-term target of two per cent, giving the US central bank an additional incentive to hold rates at a 23-year high of between 5.25 and 5.50 per cent, and wait for the economic winds to change. — AFP

96.4% of Chinese business entities from private sector: official data

Notably, private enterprises dominate the manufacturing sector, representing 96.1% of total companies, up from 95.9% in 2019.

THE number of private business entities in China had reached 180.45 million by the end of May 2024, accounting for 96.4 per cent of the country's total business entities, according to the State Administration for Market Regulation.

This proportion is up from the 95.5 per cent registered in

2019, the administration said, adding that China is now home to nearly 55.18 million private companies and over 125.27 million self-employed businesses.

China's private sector has played a key role in boosting the country's high-tech and emerging industries. In the manufacturing sector, for example, private businesses currently account for 96.1 per cent of the total manufacturing companies in China, up from 95.9 per cent in 2019. The share of private businesses in the scientific research and technical services sector has risen from 91.9 per cent in 2019 to the current 94.4 per cent. — Xinhua

Ford says to cut 1,600 more jobs at Valencia factory

US carmaker Ford on Friday said it would seek to cut another 1,600 jobs at its factory near Valencia in eastern Spain, where it already axed 1,100 positions last year.

"At the factory, there is currently a surplus of around 1,600 employees," a spokesman for Ford Spain told AFP after management met unions to outline their plan.

Of that figure, the car giant said 626 would be "permanent redundancies" while the other 966 would be dismissals with the possibility of being rehired in 2027" when production of a new vehicle begins. The UGT union said the redundancy would affect a total of 1,622 staff at the Almussafes plant which lies about 20 kilometres (12 miles) south of Valencia. — AFP

Wholesale inflation in India rises to 2.62%

THE rate of wholesale inflation in India rose to 2.62 per cent in May from 1.26 per cent in April, according to data released by the federal Ministry of Commerce and Industry on Friday.

"Positive rate of inflation in May 2024 is primarily due to increase in prices of food articles, manufacture of food products, crude petroleum and natural gas, mineral oils, other manufacturing etc.," the ministry said. — Xinhua

Algeria's Sonatrach signs hydrocarbon exploitation deal with Chevron

ALGERIAN energy giant Sonatrach and the US Chevron FEA International Ventures Ltd, on Thursday signed an agreement on developing hydrocarbon resources in the Algerian oil and gas basins of Ahnet and Berkine.

The agreement was signed in the presence of Sonatrach CEO Rachid Hachichi and Chevron's Vice-President of Global Exploration Liz Schwarze, Sonatrach said in a statement. — Xinhua

8th China-Eurasia Expo set for 26-30 June in Xinjiang

The G7 Summit in Italy is being held on 13 and 14 June.

S African parliament meets to re-elect weakened ANC president

In South Africa, the newly-elected parliament is convening to reelect President Cyril Ramaphosa, as the ruling African National Congress (ANC) forms an unprecedented coalition government.

SOUTH Africa's newly-elected parliament meets Friday and is expected to re-elect President Cyril Ramaphosa to form an unprecedented coalition government after his ruling ANC cobbled together a coalition deal. The African National Congress leader had

called for a government of national unity after his party lost its absolute majority in last month's general election, but two major leftist parties shunned the deal.

Instead, according to ANC secretary-general Fikile Mbalula, the government would "grav-

itate to the centre"—backed by the centre-right Democratic Alliance (DA), the Zulu nationalist Inkatha Freedom Party (IFP) and several smaller parties.

"We have reached a breakthrough on the common agreement that we need to work together," Mbalula told a news conference in Cape Town, confirming that the radical leftist **Economic Freedom Fighters** (EFF) had refused to join what he still called a unity government. Graft-tainted former president Jacob Zuma's new electoral vehicle, the uMkhonto weSizwe (MK), has disputed the 29 May election results and warned it would boycott Friday's sitting of the 400-member assembly. Mbalula said the ANC was talking to MK, but had not reached agreement. — AFP

California university moves classes online after demonstrations over conflict in Gaza

CALIFORNIA State University, Los Angeles (Cal State LA), in the western US state of California, announced on Thursday that all classes and operations on the university's main campus will be held remotely until further notice after a night of demonstrations over the ongoing Israel-Hamas conflict in Gaza.

"Please do not come to main campus," the Los Angeles school noted in a protest action alert on its website.

A group of pro-Palestinian protesters took over the university's student services building, which includes the office of the university's president, on Wednesday afternoon. Some school administrators were reportedly trapped inside the building after the university urged employees to shelter in place.

Social media posts showed protesters fortifying their barricades outside the building at night as they waited for President of Cal State LA Berenecea Johnson Eanes to negotiate with them. — Xinhua

Huthi missile attack severely injures sailor on cargo ship: US military

TWO cruise missiles launched by Yemen's Huthi rebels struck a bulk cargo carrier in the Gulf of Aden on Thursday, severely injuring a sailor who was evacuated by American forces, the US military said.

The Huthis have been targeting vessels in the Red Sea and Gulf of Aden since November 2023 in attacks they say are in solidarity with Palestinians during the ongoing Israel-Hamas war in the Gaza Strip.

Although this has caused major disruption to international shipping, casualties have been rare. – AFP

The Barcelona striker suffered a thigh injury in Monday's 2-1 friendly win over Türkiye and will miss Poland's opening Group D game against the Netherlands in Hamburg on Sunday.

But Probierz is hopeful Lewandowski, Poland's all-time record goalscorer, will be back to face Austria on 21 June, contrary to some media reports claiming he could struggle to play any part in the group phase.

"Robert will probably join the team for the match against Austria," said Probierz.

Million-plus begin hajj pilgrimage under shadow of Gaza war

MORE than a million Muslim pilgrims were in Mecca Friday for the start of a hajj pilgrimage held against the grim backdrop of the Gaza war and in exhausting summer heat.

Crowds of robed worshippers will circle the Kaaba, the black cubic structure at Mecca's Grand Mosque, with many expressing sadness eight months into the Israel-Hamas war.

"Our brothers are dying, and we can see it with our own eyes," a tearful 75-year-old Zahra Benizahra from Morocco told AFP.

Belinda Elham of Indonesia, which has the world's largest Muslim population, said she would "pray every day so that what's happening in Palestine ends".

Saudi King Salman issued a decree on Monday to host 1,000 pilgrims "from the families of martyrs and the wounded from the Gaza Strip", bringing to 2,000 the number of Palestinian pilgrims to be given the special honour at this year's hajj, the official Saudi Press Agency reported.

G7 summit opens amid protests

HE three-day 2024 Group of Seven (G7) summit kicked off Thursday in Borgo Egnazia, a resort near the town of Fasano in southern Italy's Apulia region, amid protests.

The crises in Ukraine and the Middle East and the relations with the Global South top the agenda of the summit. The management of artificial intelligence (AI), issues facing Africa and climate change are also included in the key sessions.

Italy is holding the G7 rotating presidency this year. In addition to the G7 leaders, heads of state from over ten other countries and international organizations were invited to attend the conference.

On the first day, the group discussed a draft deal for a 50-billion-US dollar loan to Ukraine, using frozen Russian assets as guarantees.

In her latest response Thursday, Russian Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Maria

The summit's focus includes crises in Ukraine and the Middle East, relations with the Global South, and managing artificial intelligence (AI), alongside discussions on Africa's challenges and climate change.

Zakharova said that G7's plans will not benefit the West and may result in new economic crisis.

The United States and Japan each

signed security agreements with Ukraine, making them the last two G7 members to sign such pacts.

Protests against the G7 summit are taking place in many places near the venue. On the opening day, in Brindisi, a city 60 kilometres away from the venue, protesters held Palestinian flags and displayed banners with slogans such as "Boycott the G7", "Stop Destroying the Planet", and "No More War". They criticized the G7 for failing to play a positive role in environmental protection, social justice, and maintaining peace.

Lukas Hufert, an art student from Germany, travelled to participate in the protest. He told Xinhua that the G7's handling of international affairs is "full of hypocrisy", likening it to a Trojan horse that appears grand but is filled with selfish schemes inside, "offering no help to the world's vulnerable groups". — Xinhua

Iran expands nuclear capacities further: IAEA

IRAN is further expanding its nuclear capacities, the International Atomic Energy Agency said Thursday, one week after the agency's board of governors passed a resolution criticizing Tehran's lack of cooperation with the UN nuclear watchdog.

The IAEA informed its members that Tehran told the agency it was installing more cascades at the enrichment facilities in Natanz and Fordow, according to a statement sent to AFP.

A cascade is a series of centrifuges, machines used in the process of enriching

uranium. A diplomatic source deemed this development as "moderate".

The motion brought by Britain, France and Germany — but opposed by China and Russia — at the IAEA's 35-nation board last week was the first of its kind since November 2022.

The resolution — which Tehran slammed as "hasty and unwise" — came amid an impasse over Iran's escalating nuclear activities and as Western powers fear Tehran may be seeking to develop a nuclear weapon, a claim Iran denies.
