Home production of textile products essential to cut imports

Quality thread production should meet local demand instead of exporting cotton wool to international markets.

ENIOR General Min Aung Hlaing gave guidance that continuous efforts must be made to produce high-quality textiles with the use of domestic cotton wool.

China top importer of Myanmar's rice in April-May

CHINA is the top importing country of Myanmar's rice, with over 52,500 tonnes in the past two months (April-May) of the current financial year 2024-2025, followed by Belgium with over 26,700 tonnes and Indonesia with over 26,600 tonnes, Myanmar Rice Federation's statistics showed.

Additionally, over 10,600 tonnes to Spain and 10,000 tonnes to Cameroon were also exported.

Myanmar has shipped over 183,141.5 tonnes of rice to external markets in the past two months, bagging \$91.26 million.

The federation aims to achieve over 2.5 million tonnes of rice exports in the 2024-2025 financial year (April-March), bagging one million US dollars.

The Ministry of Commerce is working together with the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry, Myanmar Rice Federation, Myanmar Pulses, Beans, Maize and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association, Myanmar Garment Manufacturers Association, Myanmar Industries Association, Myanmar Rubber Planters and Producers Association, Myanmar Fisheries Products Processors and Exporters Association to meet monthly export targets and facilitate exports.

The federation aims to achieve 2.5 million tonnes of rice export in the FY 2023-2024, generating earnings of one billion dollars. However, rice exports fell short of the target with 1.6 million tonnes worth \$845 million.

MoNREC designates 'Kyun Natha Marine National Park'

THE Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation announced that 781 acres of land and 22,219 acres of water area in Gwa township, Thandwe District, Rakhine State, have been designated as 'Kyun Nantha Marine National Park', as of 12 June 2024, under Notification 50/2024 by exercising the authority conferred under Sub-section (a) of Section 9 of the Conservation of Biodiversity and Protected Areas Law promulgated in May

2018

Kyun Nantha is an island with unusual geological features and a Rakhine coastal region located about 24 nautical miles from Kyeintali town of Gwa township. The marine species under the protection of IUCN, such as green sea turtles, olive ridleys, bigheaded turtles, leatherback sea turtles, loggerhead turtles, whales, whale sharks, dugongs, sharks, rays, Egretta sacra inhabit there, and there are also submarine mud volca-

noes and coral reefs. Therefore, the ministry recognizes the marine national park to conserve the aquatic species and unusual geological features.

Additionally, it will conserve the submarine mud volcanoes, coral reefs, endangered marine species, and coastal ecosystems. It will also ensure the systematic administrative system for locals' traditional fishing areas from 10 villages and protect those areas under the law. — MoNREC/KTZH

Myanmar delegation attends 15th Meeting of High-Level Task Force on ASEAN Community's Post-2025 Vision (HLTF-ACV) held in Jakarta, Indonesia

THE Myanmar delegation led by Dr Wah Wah Maung, Eminent Person (EP) of Myanmar and Deputy Minister of the Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations of the Republic of the Union Myanmar attended the 15th Meeting of High-Level Task Force on ASEAN Community's Post-2025 Vision (HLTF-ACV) which was held in Jakarta, Indonesia, on 13-15 June 2024, accompanied by an official from the Department of ASEAN Affairs, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. High-Level Representative drafting session of the 15th Meeting of the High-Level Task Force on ASEAN Community's Post-2025 Vision (HLTF-ACV) was held prior to the 15th Meeting of HLTF-ACV.

The meeting was co-chaired by Mr Chatoulong Bouasisavath, Eminent Person (EP) of Lao PDR as the ASEAN Chair and Mr Dato' Zainuddin Yahya, Eminent Person (EP) of Malaysia and Former Malaysian Ambassador, as the permanent shepherd Member State and it was attended by Eminent Persons, High-Level Representatives and officials from ASEAN Member States and Timor-Leste as an Observer, as well as officials from the ASEAN Secretariat.

At the meeting, Dr Wah Wah

Maung noted with satisfaction the progress achieved in the second reading of the ASEAN Political-Security Community (APSC) Strategic Plan of the **ASEAN Community Vision 2045** and highlighted the need to set the timeline towards the final submission of the Strategic Plans and inform other pillars to ensure that all Community Pillars and Connectivity are accelerating their works in crafting the Strategic Plans of the ASEAN Community Vision 2045. She suggested having another interface with the Chairs of the HLTF-EI, SOCA, and ACCC at the end of the year and further refining the draft of the strategic plans as the number of issues that cut across pillars and sectors appear in several action lines. She underscored the importance of strengthening ASEAN Centrality by enhancing the effectiveness of ASEAN-led mechanisms and the implementation of the ASEAN Outlook for Indo-Pacific (AOIP) in evolving regional architecture amidst geopolitical tensions and rivalries. The deputy minister also highlighted the need to sustain a good legacy of ASEAN that internationally recognized "ASEAN Way of Consensus" and "ASEAN Solidarity" while considering reforming some of the existing mechanisms. She encouraged ASEAN Member States to adhere to the ASEAN shared principles of equality, mutual respect, non-interference, the ASEAN Way of Consensus in the decision-making process, ASEAN's spirit of "sharing and caring", and unity and solidarity of ASEAN that has steadfastly stood as the main driving force behind the success of ASEAN today. She also stressed the need to maintain ASEAN norms and culture values while integrating the principles of human rights in some areas of cooperation in our region.

The meeting noted the progress made in the second reading of the APSC Strategic Plan of the **ASEAN Community Vision 2045** and tasked the ASEAN Secretariat to develop the progress report on the development of ASEAN Community Vision 2045 and its Strategic Plans. The meeting discussed the ideas to set the timeline for review and update on the implementation of the APSC Strategic Plan and agreed to share the narrative format of the APSC Strategic Plan with the other pillars for reference. The meeting also agreed to decide the placement of the elements of Institutional Strengthening-related Strategic Measures at a later stage. The meeting adopted the Summary Decisions and Summary Reports of the 14th HLTF-ACV.

At the sideline of the Meeting, HLTF-ACV had an Interface meeting with the Secretary-General of the ASEAN Inter-Parliamentary Assembly (AIPA) and the Executive Director of the Centre for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) and the respective stakeholders have updated their works and contributions to the implementation of the APSC Blueprint and shared the priorities and challenges to be addressed in the future ahead and provide their recommendations. The meeting exchanged views on the emerging challenges and recommendations made by the respective stakeholders on the development of the APSC Strategic Plan in a friendly, cordial and candid manner.

HLTF-ACV was established in 2022 to develop the ASEAN Community Vision 2045 and attendant document(s) in close consultation with the three ASE-AN Community Pillars and ASE-AN Connectivity Coordinating Committee in accordance with the Ha Noi Declaration on the ASEAN Community's Post-2025 Vision and the Roadmap for an ASEAN Community's Post-2025 Vision. — MNA

The Myanmar Rice Federation President affirmed that the Central Bank of Myanmar's monetary policy to control export earnings impeded rice exports, hurting exporters financially, and the El Nino weather conditions also hampered rice exports.

Myanmar exported 2,261,203 tonnes of rice and broken rice to foreign trade partners in the past 2022-2023 FY (April-March), with an estimated value of \$853.472 million. — NN/EM

Aemahta rice now available at fair prices in Yangon

MYANMAR Rice Federation (MRF) has been offering a rice subsidy scheme together with affiliated associations, depots and rice companies since 31 May. The consumers can buy Aemahta rice at an affordable rate.

The rice subsidy scheme will continue until October. It currently covers 58 retail shops in 18 townships: Hlinethaya, Shwepyitha, South Dagon, North Okkalapa, North Dagon, Dagon Seikkan, East Dagon, Hmawby, Thingangyun, Thakayta, Pazundaung, Dawbon, Dala, Kyimyindine, Ahlon, Seikkyi Khanaungto, Mingaladon and Insein in Yangon Region.

Under the guidance of the MRF, Myanmar Rice and Pad-

dy Traders Association, export companies and depots worked together to stabilize the price and initiated the rice subsidy scheme in order for the low-income people and civil servants to buy the rice at fairer prices at 58 retail shops in 18 townships, Yangon Region. The consumers can purchase reasonably well-milled (15 per cent broken) white rice. An individual is entitled to buy two pyi at a time.

YGN palm oil wholesale rate set at K5,370 per viss for week ending 23 June

THE wholesale reference rate of palm oil for the Yangon market rose slightly to K5,370 per viss this week ending 23 June from K5,365 recorded last week ending 16 June, according to the Supervisory Committee on edible oil import and distribution.

The Supervisory Committee on Edible Oil Import and Distribution under the Ministry of Commerce has been closely observing the FOB prices in Malaysia and Indonesia, adding transport costs, tariffs and banking services to decide the wholesale market reference rate for edible oil on a weekly basis.

Despite the reference price, the market price is way

too high.

To control overcharging, the Consumer Affairs Department under the Ministry of Commerce informed the consumers of lodging the complaints for overcharging through the call centre's hotline in late August. The department urged consumers not to buy palm oil at high prices. The Committee notified that any person who is involved in price gouging and oil storage to attempt market manipulation will face legal action under the **Essential Goods and Services** Law.

The department is working together with the Myanmar Oil Dealers' Association and the

cooking oil importing companies to offer affordable rates of imported palm oil for consumers.

The complaints for overcharging can be lodged over Hot Line: 1535 of the Call Centre of the Consumers Affairs Department or sent to the Facebook Page of the Department and the region and state departments concerned.

The domestic consumption of palm oil is estimated at one million tonnes per year. The local palm oil production is just about 400,000 tonnes. About 700,000 tonnes of palm oil are yearly imported through Malaysia and Indonesia to meet domestic demands. — NN/EM

Kayin State coffee plantation expansion to boost foreign currency income

DURING his address at the collective planting festival of coffee trees in Byaingtaung Village, Ohntabin Village-tract, Hpa-an Township on 15 June, the Kayin State Chief Minister announced plans to expand coffee plantations by an additional 1,000 acres.

Currently, Kayin State hosts a total of 10,029 acres dedicated to coffee crops, yielding 21,229 tonnes of coffee beans. The report highlighted that Robusta, known as lowland coffee, is predominantly cultivated in Thandaunggyi Township.

The expansion of coffee cultivation is essential due to the significant foreign currency income generated by coffee products. – TWA/TMT

In the 2022-23 financial year, the department completed 1,202 rural water supply projects nationwide, followed by 1,302 projects in 2023-24 FY. These included 561 projects funded by ordinary allocations, 115 by maintenance funds, 255 by state funds, and 371 with contributions from UNICEF.

For the 2024-25 fiscal year, plans are in place to implement 481 water supply projects across 427 villages in various regions, states, and self-administered division and zones. Recognizing the government's efforts and the dedication of relevant staff, it is crucial for residents to cooperate by using water efficiently, minimizing waste, and supporting environmental conservation initiatives.

Resident Neighbour: Retribution

HE announcement by the Foreign Ministry of Thailand at the end of May, if anything, reflected how welcoming the Thais have become towards Myanmar citizens entering their land. The Ministry released a list of 93 nations whose citizens can enter Thailand without a visa or obtain a visa on arrival and can stay for up to 60 days. You would have caught the drift that the list excluded citizens of Myanmar.

In an apparent move to boost tourism and bring tourist dollars into the country, the Thai Cabinet agreed to waive

visa measures for a total of 93 countries. This list includes the 57 nations whose citizens were allowed to stay in Thailand for 30 days without a visa, 13 nations for whom the visa requirement was recently waived, an additional six nations whose citizens will be allowed to stay here without a visa for 60 days and 17 new nations that are now eligible for 60 days VOA (Visa

The 57 nations who were already enjoying a visa waiver and can now get a 60-day stamp (an upgrade from the previous

30 days) on arrival included all first-world countries and some ASEAN counterparts such as Brunei, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore and

The 13 nations whose citizens were already getting a 30day VOA and will now be getting a 60-day stamp included populous countries such as India, as well as smaller nations such as Fiji, Malta and Bhutan.

The six newbies' countries, whose citizens are getting 60day Visas, would be the hardest for Myanmar to take. They in-

cluded nations whose citizens would only get 14 days of VOA, just like Myanmar citizens prior to this announcement. They would now enjoy a visa waiver and a 60-day stay. The gang of six comprises China, Laos, Macau, Mongolia, Russia and Cambodia. The two ASEAN neighbours are, in fact, poorer than Myanmar until 2017, based

To rub salt further into the wound, 17 new nations are added to the list that are eligible for 60 days of VOA. These nations included those countries

on GDP per capita.

whose citizens do not usually visit Southeast Asia: Guatemala, Kosovo, Panama, Cuba, Colombia, Dominica, Ecuador, etc., to name a few.

A Glimpse of the International Law

Please let me be honest. I am not an international law expert. International law is so wide, delicate, and demanding a subject that I believe only the highly qualified jurists and eminent scholars shall have all the credentials and the capabilities to write it comprehensively, competently and convincingly. It is quite a task. Nevertheless, I hope you'll be good enough to let me present just a glimpse of international law from a law student's point of view. In saying "a law student's point of view", believe me, I really mean it in the literal sense of the phrase. And on this point, I think you may wish to ask me: why do you, an oldie, a retired civil servant, consider yourself a law student? My answer is simply because I am still spending my time studying a few subjects I am interested in. And of course, international law is a subject that I like to study for my own academic interest. Still, I think you might wish to shoot me another question. Why, despite your age, do you keep on learning? Again, my answer is that I believe that there is no end to the learning process; in other words, I think "no educative process is ever the end; it is always the beginning of more education, more learning, more living". Well, on the question of the process

of learning, may I ask you, my dear reader, to have your opinion? What do you say? I wonder. Now, let's say something about

What is the international law? International law is the "law of nations" or a body of rules that govern inter-state relations. International law treats all states the same, no matter what they are - big or small, rich or poor, strong or weak. Hence, the principle of equality before the law. States are subjects of the international law. States are subjects of the international law. States are to follow and abide by international law, and international law is not for the states to take into their own hands and abuse to their advantage. As subjects of international law, states have international personalities. By virtue of this, states have rights to enjoy and duties to fulfil under international law. On the other hand, there is also a growing concept that under international law, individuals and corporations have rights and responsibilities in certain situations. Yet, there is another widely accepted view that states have to represent individuals and corporations in their relations with their

sense, the international law may be classified into two kinds: the customary international law and the conventional international law. Customary international law is that type of law which is based upon the well-established age-old customs, traditions and certain rules of conduct, which the modern states have accepted to be binding on them and which they have also agreed as to their enforce-ability by appropriate means in case of their violations. Conventional international law is that branch of law that takes as its source the agreements, decisions, and resolutions reached upon and adopted by the international conventions and/or the multilateral treaties: For example, the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea and the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, etc.

Well, now, the sovereign equality of states: I firmly believe it is the cardinal principle of international law. With a view to reinvigorating the principles of international law concerning friendly relations and cooperation among states in accordance with the UN charter, the 25th session of the United Nations General Assembly solemnly proclaimed them under its resolutions, GA 2625 (XXV).

adoption of the generally accepted Assembly Declaration. The principles thus proclaimed include among other things, the following:

The principle concerning the duty not to intervene in matters which fall within the domestic jurisdiction of any state.

- The duty of states to cooperate with one another.

- The principle of equal rights and self-determination of the peo-

- The principle of sovereign equality of states.

On the principle of sovereign equality, they have equal rights

and duties, and they are equal members of the international community, notwithstanding differences of an economic, political or other nature. In particular, sovereign equality includes the following elements.

(1) All states are juridically

(2) Each state enjoys the rights inherent in full sovereignty.

(3) Each state has the duty to respect the personality of other

(4) The territorial integrity and political independence of the state are inviolable.

(5) Each state has the right to freely choose and develop its political, social, economic and cultural systems.

(6) Each state has the duty to comply fully and in good faith with its international obligations and to live in peace with other

The General Assembly Declaration also proclaimed that the principles of the UN Charter should constitute the basic principles of international law. It further appealed to all states to be guided by these principles in their international conduct and to develop their mutual relations on the basis of their strict observance.

Well, the aforementioned are just a gist of the principles of international law proclaimed by the General Assembly Declaration GA2625(XXV). However, all these principles, if I may have to express my own opinion, should not remain mere solemn proclamations in the UN resolution nor mere splendid words recorded in UN documents. Each and every principle should be strictly and unreservedly followed and observed by all states in good faith. Moreover, I would also like to say if a law or a principle is to be followed, it must be followed "not only to the letter of the law but also to the spirit as well". Then states shall treat each other with mutual respect, and the rule of law will prevail in interstate relations. And then and only then, I think, the undesirable tendencies of "some countries to sit in judgement over others, and the big to bully the small, the rich to oppress the poor, and the strong to lord it over the weak" shall disappear from this earth once. For all, hope you'll agree with me. What do you say, my dear reader?

Traffic accidents on Yangon-Mandalay expressway claim 46 lives in first six months of 2024



ACCORDING to Police Captain Myo Lin Than of the Highway Police Force, a total of 87 traffic accidents occurred on the Yangon-Mandalay Expressway between 1 January and 14 June, resulting in 161 injuries and 46 deaths.

"During the six months, there were 18 traffic accidents in January, 12 in February, 14 in March, 15 in April, 21 in May, and 7 in

the first two weeks of June along the Yangon-Mandalay Expressway. Drivers should be particularly cautious as it is currently raining daily along the expressway. Water does not immediately recede when it rains, leaving standing water on the main road," said Police Captain Myo Lin Than.

To ensure the safety of drivers using the highway, the Expressway Police Commander's office is conducting inspections and educating drivers, especially as the rainy season has already begun. — ASH/MKKS

Illegal goods seized in various states/regions

SUPERVISED by the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, action is being taken under the law against illicit trading across the nation.

The combined on-duty team managed by the Kachin State Illegal Trade Eradication Special Task Force seized an unregistered Toyota crown (worth approximately K8 million) at the Rampu-Kyetpoungchan junction in Myitkyina township on 14 June. The action was taken under the Export and Import Law.

On the same day, the combined team supervised by the Yangon Region Illegal Trade Eradication Special Task Force captured two Mitsubishi Fuso trucks (worth approximately K65 million), heading to Yangon from Mandalay and to Yangon from Mongla, carrying six kinds of goods valued at K37.14 million, including 1,500 kilogrammes of

single-use bed sheet without official documents, at the Ywathagyi Dry Port. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

During inspections on 16 and 17 June, the combined teams impounded illegal teak weighing 1.617 tonnes and illegal hardwood weighing 1.809 tonnes worth K2.653 million in Bago and Toungoo districts, an unregistered Toyota Caldina (estimated value of K3 million) in Indakaw town and illegal teak weighing 3.393 tonnes, illegal hardwood weighing 3.225 tonnes and other illegal timbers weighing 0.479 tonne worth K1.658 million in Toungoo district. The action was taken under the Forest Law and the Export and Import Law.

Therefore, nine arrests (estimated value of K117.452 million) were made on 14, 16 and 17 June, according to the committee. — MNA/MKKS

Counter-argument to false information

False claims by Tachilek News Agency regarding Mandalay Obo Prison dismissed

THE subversive media outlet Tachilek News Agency's Facebook page deliberately circulated false news on 7 June, claiming that prisoners in Mandalay Central Prison were facing hardships due to overcrowding beyond designated capacity. This misinformation aimed to mislead the public.

Mandalay Central Prison consists of two buildings – a main building and a new building. Each inmate is housed in an 18-square-foot room, and there have been no reports of overcrowding beyond the designated capacity.

The prison ensures an adequate supply of clothing for both

male and female inmates. Clothing racks are available in the shared cells, making it easy for prisoners to dry their clothes.

Moreover, inmates receive proper medical care from prison doctors and health workers at the Obo Prison. Upon arrival, new prisoners undergo thorough inspections for skin infections and diseases, with daily ointment applications if needed. Each inmate is provided with sufficient water for morning and evening showers, with an allowance of about 48 gallons of drinking and utility water per day. There have been no reports of inmates suffering from rashes, hives, or other issues due to inadequate clothing.

There are no political prisoners at the facility, nor incidents of inmate-on-inmate violence. Pregnant women, female prisoners, and mothers with children are housed separately. They receive supplemental food and undergo daily medical checks. Vulnerable prisoners receive monthly provisions of food and clothing, while children are vaccinated with assistance from the township health department.

Therefore, the Tachilek News Agency is intentionally spreading misinformation to deceive the public. — Min Thu/ TMT

Misinformation spread by subversive media regarding raid on gambling venue in Thanetpin Township, Bago Region

SUBVERSIVE media are circulating news that PDF terrorists raided a gambling venue in Thanatan Village, Thanetpin Township, Bago Region. They alleged a clash ensued with security forces providing security at the gambling place, resulting in a civilian being shot in the leg.

In reality, on the morning of 16 June, six terrorists armed with small weapons robbed local fishermen at Thanatan Village of K1 million, gold ornaments valued at about K6.8 million, and three motorcycles. A man attempting to flee was shot and wounded in the left thigh, according to a resident's account.

Security forces are currently investigating the incident to apprehend terrorists and will pursue legal action. The subversive media are spreading fake news to obscure terrorists' actions and mislead the public about the role of security forces.

THE new design of battery tricycles imported from China has been marketable in Ayeyawady Region's Pathein Township, and people buy them for private rides.

The new battery tricycle is light and small, and it is perfect for family use.

"The sale has been good. We can drive it to Myaungmya from

Pathein if it is fully charged. The battery lasts all day long when driving in town. Both generator and solar power can recharge it. It takes about seven to eight hours to recharge if you use the battery flat. It is also battery saving if it drives subtly, meaning the driver needs to adjust the accelerator," said the owner of Ko Win Naung of Three-wheeled Motorcycle Trading.

It can carry three people, including the driver, and can withstand a few loads.

"It is China-made tricycles, and the price is from minimum up to K2 million to over K4 million to the maximum," he said. — Thit

Japanese university admission exam training to begin in Myanmar in July

A special training course for students who want to take the Examination for Japanese University (EJU Exam) to study engineering, IT and science subjects in higher education will open on 8 July, according to the Myanmar Association of Japan Alumni (MAJA).

For the second batch, an additional ten students will be accepted, and eligibility criteria include completion of grade 12 or the first year of university after passing the matriculation, distinctions in mathematics, physics and chemistry, preparation for further study in Japanese universities, or completion of

GCE, IGCSE A Level and GED, it said

The course will cover Japanese (A), Japanese (B), Japan and the World, Maths-2, Physics and Chemistry. Those who have no basic knowledge of Japanese need to join the class starting from N5, and those who have passed N4 will have to study in the class starting from N3 (Japanese B).

The course fee is K 1 million per subject (for one year) plus material fees, which can be paid in two instalments for each semester. Those wishing to attend the "Japanese University Entrance 1 Year Course"

can register at https://forms.gle/ DN9AjnngNK1fN39a8Link from 16 to 25 June.

Only ten students will be admitted to this second batch, while a selection system will be used for the students exceeding the limited number. Successful candidates will be notified by 28 June at the latest.

Free course on flood prevention, rescue, and evacuation offered

A free training course on how to prevent, rescue and evacuate in the event of a flood will be provided, trainer U Maung (rescue) told The Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM).

Protection, prevention, and rescue in the event of a flood or sudden flooding, as well as postflood safety guidelines, will be featured in the training course, which is intended for volunteers from philanthropic groups.

"Volunteers from Parahita groups go to help people when a flood happens. Some know dos and don'ts for flood hazards, but some don't have such knowledge. So, I want to share these tips as far as I know," said U Maung.

This is free, and training organizers will incur all costs, including fees for pool and meals, he said.

The training programme, which was launched in 2017 in Kayin State, Magway Region, and Yangon Region, has gained attention, and he said that offers have been received to conduct it. — Thit Taw/ZS

Local entrepreneur invents weather-compatible carbon cement panels for home walls, ceilings

WEATHER-COMPATIBLE carbon cement prefabricated sheets that can be used as walls, floors, and roofs in homes were invented by a local entrepreneur, U Ko Oo.

The concrete can be used in summer, rainy, and cold seasons, and it regulates a balanced indoor temperature without the need for air conditioners or heaters. A model house with these panels is under construction, said inventor

U Ko Oo

"Existing buildings are hotter in summer and cooler in the cold season. The building with the panels I made will be as cool as a mud house without air conditioning in summer. It will be hot outside but cool inside. When it is cold outside, it is warm inside. I make concrete slabs for walls and roofs. A model house is being constructed for observation. My invention aims to produce slabs to build

a prefabricated house. It is not a normal cement, but a readymade sheet for construction," he said.

He came up with the idea during last summer's extreme heat and will continue to produce various thicknesses and designs suitable for both houses and warehouses, he added.

"I got the idea to invent this when it was very hot in summer. Extreme heat made us unable to sit, walk, work or think. Then, I decided to invent such a material. There was not much thinking like that. People readily think about air conditioners, fans and heaters to regulate the temperature. This method doesn't need power. It can absorb moisture in the rainy season, reduce heat in summer, and provide warmth in the cold season. Thinking of a weather-compatible building for people, I got this idea. I make various sheets in different sizes, designs and thickness grades for houses and warehouses," he said. — MT/ZN

Tokyo stocks plunge on fears over European political turmoil

TOKYO stocks plunged Monday morning, with the Nikkei index briefly losing over two per cent, weighed down by concern over European political turmoil and a sell-off of Toyota Motor as the impact of a vehicle test scandal lingers.

The 225-issue Nikkei Stock Average dropped 708.15 points, or 1.82 per cent, from Friday to 38,106.41. The broader Topix index was down 40.90 points, or 1.49 per cent, at 2,705.71.

The US dollar was largely flat in the mid-157 yen range in Tokyo amid few fresh trading cues.

At noon, the dollar

fetched 157.44-45 yen compared with 157.40-50 yen in New York and 157.66-68 yen in Tokyo at 5 pm Friday.

The euro was quoted at \$1.0704-0705 and 168.52-55 yen against \$1.0701-0711 and 168.52-62 yen in New York and \$1.0707-0708 and 168.81-85 yen in Tokyo late Friday afternoon.

Stocks fell across the board, as sentiment was hit by declines in US and European markets on fears of political turmoil in Europe, as French President Emmanuel Macron's position could be threatened by the far right in upcoming parliamentary elections, brokers said. — Kyodo

Pakistan earns over US\$15 bln from textile exports in first 11 months of FY 2023-24

PAKISTAN has earned 15.241 billion US dollars through textile products exports in the first 11 months of the ongoing fiscal year starting from July 2023 to June 2024, officials from the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) said on Sunday.

The exports of textile products increased by 1.41 per cent during July-May of the current fiscal year as against the exports of 15.029 billion dollars during the same period of the last fiscal year 2022-23, the PBS officials told Xinhua.

On a year-on-year basis, textile exports increased by 18 per cent, going up from 1,320.548 million dollars in May 2023 to 1,558.230 million dollars in May 2024.

On a month-on-month basis, the textile exports also rose 25.94 per cent when compared to the exports of 1,237.313 million dollars in April 2024. — Xinhua

Stock markets diverge tracking US, Europe outlooks

STOCK markets diverged Monday with traders assessing the Federal Reserve's plans for interest-rate cuts and Europe's political landscape before looming general elections.

As US inflation takes longer to cool than expected, the Fed has signalled one rate cut this year, while analyst opinion varies from zero to three.

Traders are this week awaiting a US retail sales report, inflation figures and central bank rate decisions.

The Bank of England is expected to sit tight on Thursday, as is customary ahead of UK elections. Britons vote for a new government on 4 July. Across the English Channel, there are concerns about the upcoming polls in France, which President Emmanuel Ma-

cron called after his party lost out to the far-right National Rally (RN) in EUwide elections a week ago.

The move has fanned fears about instability in Europe's second-biggest economy, and observers said France could be on course for a standoff with the EU if extremists win.

Human error leads to trains collision in India: Official

PRELIMINARY inquiry into Monday's trains collision has suggested that it occurred due to a "human error", as the driver of the goods train failed to follow the signal and rammed into the passenger train from behind, said Chairperson of the country's Railway Board Jaya

According to her, rescue work had almost completed, and every effort was being done to ensure the best medical treatment for the injured.

As many as eight persons died and around 50 were injured in the trains' collision. The injured were admitted to a local hospital, she added.

According to the chairperson, three Indian Railways' personnel, including the driver of the goods train and two security guards onboard the passengers train, died in Monday's accident,

The accident occurred near in Phansidewa area of West

around 9 am local time when the goods train crashed into the "Kanchanjunga Express" passenger train.

Minister of Railways Ashwini Vaishnaw announced a monetary compensation of 1 million Indian Rupees (around US\$11,969) for each of the deceased, 250,000 Indian Rupees (\$2,992) for those who received grievous injuries, and 50,000 Indian Rupees (\$598) for the injured.

West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee and the minister of railways were on their way to the spot of the accident to take stock of the situation.

Expressing condolences at the loss of human lives, Prime Minister Narendra Modi posted on X (erstwhile Twitter) his sadness about the railway accident in West Bengal and ordered officials to follow up the situation. — Xinhua

Samsung Electronics to launch joint AI research centre with university

SOUTH Korean tech company Samsung Electronics said Monday that it will launch a joint artificial intelligence (AI) research centre with Seoul National University (SNU).

The research centre will carry out joint projects on advanced AI technologies, such as on-device AI and multi-modal AI, for the next three years, the company

Samsung integrated AI technologies, including real-time interpretation, into its flagship Galaxy S24 smartphone that was rolled out earlier this year, while expanding AI integration into other products.

Samsung said it will foster and secure young AI talents through joint projects, which the company expected to help secure core AI technologies and strengthen competitiveness in the rapidly changing AI world. - Xinhua

Pentagon runs secret anti-vax campaign to undermine China during COVID-19 pandemic — Reuters investigation

AT the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, the US military launched a secret misinformation campaign to discredit Chinese vaccines in the Philippines, a nation severely impacted by the deadly virus, drawing widespread condemnation from public health experts, a Reuters investigation has found.

This is the first time a media outlet has exposed this clandestine operation. "It aimed to sow doubt about the safety and efficacy of vaccines and other life-saving aid that was being supplied by China," said Reuters in the investigation released Friday.

Through phony internet accounts meant to imperson-

ate Filipinos, the military's propaganda efforts morphed into an anti-vax campaign, it said, adding that social media posts decried the quality of face masks, test kits and the first vaccine that would become available in the Philippines — China's Sinovac inoculation.

Reuters identified at least

300 accounts on X, formerly Twitter, that matched descriptions shared by former US military officials familiar with the Philippines operation. Almost all were created in the summer of 2020 and centred on the slogan Chinaangvirus, meaning China is the virus in Tagalog, a major language of the Philippines. — Xinhua

Wildfire forces 1,200 people to evacuate in US Southern California

A fast-moving wildfire has burned over 12,200 acres (about 49.4 square kilometres) overnight in Southern California, forcing at least 1,200 people to evacuate from a popular recreation area, authorities said Sunday.

The wind-driven wildfire, dubbed the Post Fire, started Saturday afternoon in Gorman, about 100 km north of Los Angeles, according to the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (Cal Fire).

The blaze was two per cent contained as of Sunday afternoon and has damaged two structures.

Cal Fire warned in a Sunday update that "slightly higher temperatures and lower humidity are expected to continue through the weekend, residents are reminded to remain vigilant and be prepared to evacuate if fire activity changes." — Xinhua

Portugal's record collector Ronaldo 'thinking big' at Euro 2024

SUPERSTAR Portugal striker Cristiano Ronaldo is determined to make more European Championship history this summer.

The veteran forward, 39, says his team "deserve" to win another major international trophy to add to their singular triumph, at Euro 2016.

Portugal kick off their tournament against Czech Republic in Leipzig on Tuesday with Ronaldo set to start and appear at a record-extending sixth Euros.

Roberto Martinez's side qualified with a 100 per cent record and should progress with ease from Group F, which also contains Türkiye and Georgia.

"I believe this generation deserves to win a competition of this magnitude," Ronaldo told reporters upon arrival in Germany, setting his sights on the Henri Delaunay trophy.

The former Real Madrid hitman triumphed with Portugal in 2016 but limped off injured against France in the final, with Eder firing the team to glory in extra-time.

Now plying his trade for immense wealth in Saudi Arabia with Al-Nassr, Ronaldo netted twice against the Republic of Ireland in a tune-up friendly last week to extend his international goals record to 130.

Thus far 14 of those have come at European Championships, making him the competition's all-time top scorer ahead of France great Michel Platini on nine.

Ronaldo first appeared at the tournament in 2004 on home soil, scoring against eventual winners Greece on his Euros debut, and he has also struck in every edition since. — AFP


Nuclear arms spending soars as global tensions swell: studies

NUCLEAR-ARMED countries hiked spending on atomic weapons arsenals by a third in the past five years as they modernized their stockpiles amid growing geopolitical tensions, two reports showed on Monday.

The world's nine nuclear-armed states jointly spent \$91 billion on their arsenals last year, according to a new report from the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN). That report, and a separate one from the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI), indicated that nuclear weapons states are dramatically scaling up spending as they modernize and even deploy new nuclear-armed weapons.

"I think it is fair to say there is a nuclear arms race under way," ICAN chief Melissa Parke told AFP.

Wilfred Wan, head of SIPRI's weapons of mass destruction programme, meanwhile warned in a statement that "we

have not seen nuclear weapons playing such a prominent role in international relations since the Cold War". SIPRI's report showed that the total estimated number of nuclear warheads in the world actually declined somewhat to 12,121 at the start of this year, from 12,512 a year earlier.

But while some of that included older warheads scheduled to be dismantled, it said 9,585 were in stockpiles for potential use — nine more than a year earlier. And 2,100 were kept in a state of "high operational alert" on ballistic missiles.

Nearly all of those were held by the United States and Russia, but China was for the first time believed to also have some warheads on high operational alert, SIPRI said. — AFP

MILLIONS of people dependent on Himalayan snowmelt for water face a "very serious" risk of shortages this year after one of the lowest rates of snowfall, scientists warned Monday.

Snowmelt is the source of about a quarter of the total water flow of 12 major river basins that originate high in the region, the report said.

"This is a wake-up call for researchers, policymakers, and downstream communities," said report author Sher

Muhammad, from the Nepal-based International Centre for Integrated Mountain Development (ICIMOD).

"Lower accumulation of snow and fluctuating levels of snow pose a very serious increased risk of water shortages, particularly this year."

Snow and ice on the Himalayas are a crucial water source for around 240 million people in the mountainous regions, as well as for another 1.65 billion people in the river valleys below, according to ICIMOD.

While snow levels fluctuate each

year, scientists say climate change is driving erratic rainfall and shifting weather patterns. The report measured "snow persistence" — the time snow remains on the ground — with levels dropping almost a fifth below normal this year across the wider Hindu Kush and Himalaya region.

"This year's snow persistence (18.5 per cent below normal) is the second-lowest in the past 22 years, narrowly trailing the record low of 19 per cent set in 2018," Muhammad told AFP. — AFP

Putin to visit DPRK, Vietnam: Kremlin

RUSSIAN President Vladimir Putin will pay a friendly state visit to the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) from Tuesday to Wednesday, the Kremlin press service said Monday.

After the DPRK, Putin will visit Vi-

etnam from Wednesday to Thursday, it said. The DPRK's top leader Kim Jong Un paid an official visit to Russia at the invitation of Putin in September 2023 and then invited Putin to pay a return visit.

Russia was the first country visited

by Kim since the COVID-19 pandemic, during which the borders of the DPRK were closed.

Putin's only previous visit to Pyongyang was in July 2000, two months after his presidential inauguration. — Xinhua

Over 1,000 S Korean doctors to face probe over kickbacks from drugmaker

MORE than 1,000 doctors in South Korea will face probe over kickbacks from a drugmaker, Yonhap news agency said Monday citing the Seoul metropolitan police agency.

The doctors were sus-

pected of receiving kickbacks in cash and other valuables, which ranged from millions of won to tens of millions of won per individual, from Korean Drug Co.

allegedly investigated the drugmaker for giving bribes to doctors, who prescribed its medicine in return for the kickbacks.

Eight officials of the The Seoul police had drugmaker and 14 doctors had been booked after the investigation.

The police opened a possibility to expand the investigation to other drugmakers. (1 US dollar equals 1,380.50 won). - Xinhua
