In addition, the ancient city walls, moats, and buildings of Toungoo Ketumati, constructed by King Maha Thiri Zeyathura Mingyi Nyo (AD 1486-1531), Ketumati, including the moats and city will be preserved as cultural heritage.

Myanmar's agricultural exports surpass US\$1.1 bln by 14 June

MYANMAR'S agricultural exports have jumped to US\$1.19 billion as of 14 June in the current financial year 2024-2025, beginning 1 April, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

The figures reflected a significant increase of over \$460 million compared with that (\$731.9 million) recorded in the corresponding period last FY2023-2024. Myanmar exports agricultural products, animal products, minerals, forest products, and finished industrial goods through maritime and border trade channels. At the same time, it imports capital goods, intermediate goods, raw materials imported by the CMP enterprises



and consumer goods. Myanmar has been implementing the National Export Strategy (NES) 2020-2025 in order to boost exports. The priority sectors of the NES include agricultural production, garment and apparel, industrial and electronic device, fishery business, forest product, digital manufacturing and service, logistic service, quality management, trade information service, innovation and entrepreneurship sectors. — NN/KK

DAW Htay Htay Win, a clerk at the Myanmar Embassy in Paris, France, was absent from work starting on 20 June

She received an order from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to serve her duties in Myanmar after completing her services in the foreign country.

She submitted her family list and proposed to allow her son to keep studying in France, and she served her duties until 18 June as usual.

On the same day, she sought permission to grant a leave day on 19 June as she had to make enquires regarding the university for further study of her son and to take the passports of her family. Therefore, the ambassador granted permission.

She did not make any report to the embassy until 10 am on 20 June, and embassy officials scrutinized her house. It was found that there were no more of her belongings, and they seemed to leave for good.

Daw Htay Htay Win carried out her duties actively during her service at the Myanmar Embassy in Paris, and she is one of the staff mem-

bers who will return to Myanmar upon the completion of their overseas services.

She was absent from her duties without permission, together with her husband, son, and daughter, as she did not want to return to Myanmar because of family matters, such as further study of her son and medical treatment of her daughter in France.




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Traditional spirit propitiation ceremony declines despite new blood

MANY of the new generation have joined the spirit propitiation ceremonies, one of Myanmar's traditions, but the quality is on a downward trend, and some rituals are disappearing, a famous spirit medium in Yangon told The Global News Light of Myanmar.

The spirit propitiation ceremony attracts public interest in Myanmar, and its ancient traditional agenda includes dancing for spirits and appeasing the spirits.

"Nats (spirits) are not meant to be worshipped. People pay respects to Nats for their good fortune and health. There are many ceremonies. Throughout Myanmar, many people from different classes, whether rich or poor, traders or brokers, love Nats and want to make offerings to the spirits," he said. Despite the involvement of many young people from the new generation in the trade to uphold the tradition, quality is a compromise, he added.

"Many young people are interested in becoming spirit mediums. But their qualifications have faded compared to the old days. With the successive changes of masters over the ages, the protocol of seniority and the traditional rites have slightly disappeared. Still, more and more people are becoming interested, and it is good from the aspect of preserving the culture," he said.

With changing social patterns, the U Shingyi festival, an offering to the lord of the salty sea, is gradually disappearing, he added.

"Spirit mediums are used to organize and supervise the U Shingyi offering festival. There were specially trained mediums for this festival because it was a kind of hereditary profession. Nowadays, people live in seven- or eight-storey buildings, so they no longer hold U Shingyi festivals due to the space. You can say that this tradition is slightly fading out," he said. — Thit Taw/ZN

Subsequently, he inspected the power generation status, machine and boiler installations, and the construction progress of the refrigeration plant.

Additionally, the Union minister attended a coordinating meeting for industrial development and industrial zones. This meeting took place at the Department of Industrial Supervision and Inspection Office in Mayangon Township, Yangon Region, on 21 June.

MoEP Union Minister inspects HED installation at Paunglaung Dam

UNION Minister for Electric Power U Nyan Tun, along with Deputy Minister U Aye Kyaw and officials from the ministry, visited the Paunglaung dam yesterday morning to inspect the installation of the hydraulic elevator dam (HED) at the spillway of the hydroelectric power plant in Zeyathiri Township.

Upon arrival at the Paunglaung Hydroelectric Power Plant, the Union minister and officials were briefed by officials from the Department of Irrigation and Water Utilization Management. They explained that the installation of the hydraulic elevator dam (HED) at the spillway of the Paunglaung Dam is 80 per cent complete, with ongoing efforts to ensure timely completion within the specified period.

According to the presentations, the Union minister emphasized the need for comprehensive efforts to complete the installation of the hydraulic elevator dam (HED) within the specified time-frame while also stressing the importance of workplace safety during working hours and meeting the project's quality standards. Additionally, he inspected the condition of the dam.

The installation of a hydraulic elevator dam (HED), measuring 140.5 metres in length and 1.5 metres in height, at the spillway of the Paunglaung Dam has increased the water storage capacity from the original 549,000 acre-feet to 570,000 acre-feet, allowing for an additional storage of approximately 21,000 acrefeet of water. The annual electricity production capacity will increase from 911 million units to 919 million units, enabling a further eight million units of electricity to be generated. Efforts are underway to complete the entire project by the end of July. - MNA/TKO

Illegal goods seized in various states/regions

SUPERVISED by the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, action is being taken under the law against illicit trading across the nation.

"On June 20, during inspections, the Customs Department's on-duty teams impounded 24,750 kilogrammes of LLDPE plastic resin valued at K36.382 million. These were submitted by the owner for abandonment from a container at the Myanmar Industrial Port. Additionally, 350 bottles of Powerflor from India, valued at K3.5 million, were seized from luggage at Yangon International Airport due to lack of official document. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

On 21 June, the combined teams captured 212 rolls of Tape and 8,028 sticks of hollow pipe worth K170.1 million from China without official documents in Sagaing township and a Mitsubishi Fuso truck (approximately K25 million) carrying four kinds of goods valued at K7.4 million including 90 sets of keyboards (used) without official documents at the Thanlwin Bridge (Hpa-an) combined checkpoint (Tayothla side). The action was taken under the Export and Import Law and Customs procedures.

On the same day, the combined team seized illegal teak

weighing 8.569 tonnes worth K4,115,400 in Bago and Pyay districts. The action was taken under the Forest Law.

Therefore, 10 arrests (es-

timated value of K246 million) were made on 20 and 21 June, according to the committee. -MNA/MKKS

Research continues for preservation of ancient complexes

IKE the Hsin Phyu Shin monastic complex, research will be continued to discover the rest of the complexes for preservation in the Bagan Ancient Cultural Heritage Zone, said the Department of Archaeology and National Museum's director for the Bagan Branch, U Kyaw Myo Win.

The restoration of pagodas and temples and the repair of ancient lakes are now underway, he said.

"With this year's budget, repair of pagodas and renovation of exhibition halls at Htidawmindaw and Culamani temples have been carried out. Restoration of lakes made of ancient tombs used in the Bagan Period has been carried out at the same time. At present, our department is carrying out regular work. And we have planned to discover the remaining ancient complexes, like the Hsin Phyu Shin monastic complex, through research," he said.

In Bagan, there are a lot of cactuses; because of this, cleaning works have been carried out by diving into 11 areas and clearing banyan trees, naturally grown around pagodas and inside and on top of cave temples, has been carried out.

Currently, Bagan is not seeing a massive influx of visitors from around the country like Thadingyut and

Thingyan. However, there are still visitors to some extent, such as family vacations and student excursions, as the rain level is low in the ancient cultural region, he said.

"This is school season, so visitor arrival has still been low. But there are family vacations and excursion groups," he said.

In the last Thadingyut period, visitor arrival to Bagan was enormously significant. Even hotels were full. Therefore, it is expected that the visitor arrival will be prominent in the coming Thadingyut. — MT/ZS

Mandalay releases over 217M gallons of wastewater daily

THE nine pumping stations in Mandalay Region pump out nearly 217.92 million gallons of wastewater per day in order to prevent flooding in Mandalay, according to the Mandalay City Development Committee (MCDC).

Pumping stations are constructed in downtown areas, adjacent regions, and at confluences and drains throughout the city to prevent flooding in residential areas of Mandalay during the rainy season.

The system operates by lowering the water level in the main sewer, allowing rainwater from the roads to flow into it before being discharged into the river by the pumping stations.

The nine pumping stations include Station No 1

near Shwetachaung Kakkyaw Pagoda, Station No 2 at Shwekenamkatinn, Station No 3 near Sangha Hospital, Station No 4 and 7 at Zaungkalay, Station No 5 at Thingaza Canal on 26th Street, Station No 6 at Nagani, Station No 9 at 64th Street Detention Pond, and the New Pumping Station near Shweke Village. — TWA/ TKO

THOSE who want to run mobile lottery ticket selling in municipal area under the management of the Mandalay City Development Committee must apply for a permit, according to MCDC's Revenue Department.

MCDC will allow mobile lottery ticket selling in six downtown townships such as Aungmyaythazan, Chanayethazan, Mahaaungmyay, Pyigyidagun, Chanmyathazi and Amarapura, but prohibit it in areas which tend to traffic congestion and those who would be granted permit have to work in compliance with rules.

If there is any violation of rules, fines will be imposed, it said. — TWA/ZS

Myanmar exports 218,000+ tonnes of black gram worth US\$213M in

2 months

MYANMAR'S black gram export reached over 218,000 tonnes over the past two months of the current financial year 2024-2025, beginning 1 April, generating earnings of over US\$213 million, the Ministry of Commerce's statistics showed.

Myanmar's black gram export by sea hit over 218,833 tonnes of pulses worth \$213.25 million. In contrast, over 66 tonnes of pulses worth \$0.062 million were shipped to the neighbouring countries between 1 April and 14 June this FY.

Myanmar mainly exports black grams, green grams and pigeon peas to foreign markets. Of them, black grams and pigeon peas are primarily shipped to India, while green grams are exported to China and Europe.

India has growing demand and consumption requirements for black grams and pigeon peas. According to a Memorandum of Understanding between Myanmar and India signed on 18 June 2021, India will import 250,000 tonnes of black grams and 100,000 tonnes of pigeon peas (tur) from Myanmar for five consecutive years from 2021-2022 financial year to 2025-2026 FY. This G-to-G pact will not affect the pulses' annual quota set by India. Myanmar's exporters are also entitled to deliver the pulses to India under that yearly quota.


Myanmar's black gram out-

put is estimated at 400,000 tonnes per year, whereas pigeon pea production crosses 50,000 tonnes.

The Myanmar Pulses, Beans, Maize and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association stated that black grams, which India primarily purchases, are commonly found only in Myanmar, whereas pigeon peas, green gram and chickpeas are grown in African countries and Australia. — NN/

THE statistics of Mandalay's Department of Marine Administration showed that 27 cargo vessels sailed to Yangon, Bhamo and other cities between 10 and 19 June, with loads of over 7,170 tonnes of cement, over 12,590 tonnes of maize, 350 cubic feet of peb-

ble bags of lime.

Last month, 93 freighters were reported to depart Mandalay Port to transport the goods, the department's statistics indicated.

The Department of Marine Administration warned the vessel operators of over-

loading as the eddies have been formed in first Ayeyawady defile from the second week of June. They urged them to tailor marine safety management based on size and cargo and navigate with extreme caution. — TWA/KK

HE number of orphans is increasing annually as conflicts and wars continue to displace people worldwide. Various factors, including military, political, and territorial disputes, bullying, abuse, and narcotics drive these conflicts.

Records indicate that 27 conflicts and wars are ongoing globally, predominantly in Africa and Asia. These regions are plagued by internal armed conflicts and territorial disputes, which invariably result in negative societal impacts, leaving behind orphans and individuals with disabilities.







Ecuador starts building prison for narco bosses

ECUADOR on Friday began building an 800-person maximum security prison that will house the most dangerous drug lords in the country which has declared war against organized crime.

Once-peaceful Ecuador has been brought to its knees by transnational cartels that use its ports to ship cocaine to the United States and Europe, and have spread shocking levels of violence in the country.

The country's prisons have become the nerve centre for the gangs, with more than 460 inmates killed in three years in bloody narco wars. The January jailbreak of a major drug lord, who is still on the run, led to a spasm of violence that prompted President Daniel Noboa to declare a state of "internal armed conflict". — AFP

Moscow pledges 'adequate' response if US closes Russian visa centre

MOSCOW will undertake relevant responsive measures if the United States implements a decision on closing the Russian visa centre in the US, Russian Foreign Ministry spokesperson Maria Zakharova told Sputnik on Saturday.

"In case such measures are implemented, the Russian side will give an adequate response," Zakharova said, commenting on the US decision to close the Russian visa centre. Earlier in the day, Russian Ambassador to the United States Anatoly Antonov told reporters that the US had notified Russian diplomats that both offices of the Russian visa center in the US – in Washington and New York – were closing. – SPUTNIK

Australian authorities arrest 15 over alleged illegal fishing on Indonesian vessels

AUSTRALIAN authorities have arrested 15 foreign fishers and seized two Indonesian vessels over alleged illegal fishing activity off the country's north coast.

The Australian Border Force (ABF) and Australian Fisheries Management Authority (AFMA) on Saturday said it detected and apprehended the Indonesian vessels allegedly fishing illegally on Tuesday in the vicinity of Deliverance Island in the Torres Strait between Australia and Papua New Guinea (PNG). The crews were transported to Darwin, capital of Australia's Northern Territory (NT), and placed in detention while the matter is being investigated and prosecution considered. — Xinhua

IAEA will be informed about new Ukrainian attack on Energodar

Yevgenia Yashina, spokesperson for the Zaporozhye Nuclear Power Plant (ZNPP), informed that Ukrainian troops have launched a new attack on key energy infrastructure in Energodar, a satellite city of Zaporozhye.

THE International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) will be informed about a new attack by Ukrainian troops on the key energy infrastructure of Energodar, a satellite city of the Zaporozhye Nuclear Power Plant, ZNPP spokeswoman Yevgenia Yashina told Sputnik.

"We will bring information about the new attack on the substation and the city to the IAEA inspectors. We will also invite them to assess the scale and extent of destruction themselves, as soon as it is safe," Yashina said.

She further noticed there are chances to restore the transformer at the Raduga substation in Energodar, which was attacked by the Armed Forces of Ukraine.

"Specialists went to the site to assess the damage. There are chances to restore the damaged transformer at the substation, but it will take time," Yashina said.

Earlier reports said that on Friday evening the Armed Forces of Ukraine carried out a drone strike on the Raduga

substation, the only one supplying Energodar; a transformer was damaged. Most of the city was left without electricity and water. Prior to this, the Ukranian army used drones to completely destroy the Luch substation.

The Zaporozhye Nuclear Power

Plant is located on the left bank of the Dneper near the city of Energodar. This is the largest nuclear power plant in Europe in terms of the number of units and installed capacity-the station has six power units with a capacity of 1 gigawatt each. — SPUTNIK

NASA faces \$80,000 claim after space debris hit family home

The incident underscores the growing issue of space debris alongside increasing space traffic, with implications for future claims.

AN American family is claiming more than \$80,000 from NASA after a small piece of debris fell from space and smashed through the roof of their Florida home, a law firm said Friday.

The problem of space trash has risen in tandem with

increased spatial traffic, and NASA's response could set a precedent for how future claims are handled, law firm Cranfill Sumner said in a statement.

On 8 March, the object weighing just 700 grammes hit Alejandro Otero's home in Naples, Florida, making a hole in the roof.

NASA later confirmed it was part of a cargo pallet of used batteries that was released from the International Space Station as waste in 2021.

Instead of fully disintegrating before falling to Earth, a section remained intact when it reentered the atmosphere, the US space agency said.

Otero's son was at the house at the moment of impact, according to the law firm, which said that NASA has six months to respond to its claim.

"My clients are seeking adequate compensation to account for the stress and impact that this event had on their lives," said lawyer Mica Nguyen Worthy.

"They are grateful that no one sustained physical injuries from this incident, but a 'near miss' situation such as this could have been catastrophic. — AFP

Japan PM says new inflation-relief steps to be drawn up around fall

As part of the relief plan, the government intends to reinstate support to help households manage electricity and gas expenses from August to October, a period typically marked by increased summer energy demand.

PRIME Minister Fumio Kishida said Friday that the government will compile fresh inflation relief steps around this fall, providing cash handouts to low-income households struggling to weather the cost-of-living crisis.

The aid will come on top of government subsidies that Kishida also vowed to retain to cut household utility bills. Rising prices have weighed heavily on consumers despite his emphasis on wealth redistribution via pay hikes.

The announcement came as Kishida has been scrambling to shore up public support for his Cabinet amid growing voter frustration over his handling of a political funds scandal and the inflation-hit economy.

The premier, who also heads the ruling Liberal Democratic Party, has so far dismissed speculation that he will soon dissolve the lower house for a snap election.

Under the plan unveiled by Kishida, the government will reinstate support to curb electricity and gas bills for households between August and October, when summer-related energy demand tends to increase.

Government subsidies provided to oil wholesalers to limit the rise in retail gasoline prices will remain until the end of the year.

Kishida stressed the need for government support to reach the vulnerable, such as households living on pensions and small firms.

He did not specify how the envisaged cash handouts and other measures will be funded, but a government source said it will consider compiling a supplementary budget for the current business year ending next March. — Kyodo

Germany's coalition in impasse over 2025 budget

THE three parties in the German government are locked in a bitter dispute over the 2025 budget, with experts warning the stalemate could be the final straw for the uneasy coalition.

Chancellor Olaf Scholz's Social Democrats (SPD), the Greens and the liberal FDP, who came to power in 2021, have until 3 July, the end of the current parliamentary term, to reach a compromise.

FDP Finance Minister Christian Lindner, a fiscal hawk, is demanding close to 30 billion euros (\$32 billion) in savings — which the Greens and SPD have baulked at.

The coalition has faced many rows in the past but some pundits believe this could be the one that finally blows the government apart.

"These talks will decide the coalition's continued presence in office," said the Sueddeutsche Zeitung daily this week.

While budget discussions have been difficult before, they have never lasted this long.

"It's much more difficult than usual," Jacques-Pierre Gougeon, an expert on German politics at the French Institute for International and Strategic Affairs, told AFP. — AFP

Peru nearly doubles top port's capacity with Emirati investment

PERU'S president on Thursday hailed a \$400 million investment by Emirati logistics firm DP World that will see the country's main port, El Callao near the capital Lima, nearly double its capacity.

"This work demonstrates that Peru is a reliable country for foreign investment," President Dina Boluarte said at a ceremony inaugurating the upgraded port.

Callao, which will be able to simultaneously receive two ships up to 400 metres (1,300 feet) long, will have the largest capacity on the western coast of the South Pacific, DP World's Peru and Ecuador chief executive Carlos merino told AFP at the ceremony. "This investment will create opportunities for new trade routes. We want to connect all markets in the world in faster and smarter ways," company CEO Ahmed Bin Sulayem said at Thursday's event. — AFP

Russia's Kazan hosts BRICS+ Cities Forum

Scheduled over three days, the forum aims to address various mutual interests, primarily focusing on the establishment of the Association of Cities and Municipalities of the BRICS+ countries.

PARTICIPANTS will deal with a raft of issues of mutual interest, including work of the Association of Cities and Municipalities of the BRICS+ members, a new organization established within the forum's framework.

At least 200 mayors from 21 countries will take part in the International Forum of Cities of the BRICS+ countries, which opens on Friday in Kazan, the capital of the Russian Republic of Tatarstan.

The opening ceremony will see Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov address participants via a video link.

The three-day forum will be

attended by the heads of city governments from such countries as China, India, South Africa, Brazil, Iran, the United Arab Emirates, Saudi Arabia, Ethiopia, Egypt, Türkiye, Belarus, Kazakhstan, Azerbaijan, Uzbekistan, Argentina, Chile, Morocco, Indonesia, and Mexico.

The agenda includes a discussion on the creation of a new international organization, the Association of Cities and Municipalities of the BRICS+ countries. Participants will hold its Founding Assembly, elect a leader, determine the location of the headquarters, and outline a work plan. — SPUTNIK

200 mln tonnes of rare metal rocks found in seabed off Japan island

A Japanese survey team, including the Nippon Foundation and the University of Tokyo, announced the discovery of over 200 million tonnes of manganese nodules in the deep sea near Japan's easternmost island within its exclusive economic zone.

OVER 200 million tonnes of manganese nodules, seabed mineral concretions rich in rare metals, have been found densely packed in the deep sea off the coast of Japan's easternmost island within its exclusive economic zone, a Japanese survey team said Friday.

The team involving the Nippon Foundation and the University of Tokyo plans to begin trial mining of the nodules found off Minamitori Island, which also contain significant quantities of cobalt and nickel, from 2025 with the aim of commercialization.

"These resources are crucial for economic security. We aim to lift three million tonnes annually, proceeding with development while minimizing the impact on the marine environment," Yasuhiro Kato, a professor specializing in resource geology at the university, said at a press conference.

A survey of over 100 seabed sites by the team conducted between April and June this year, using a remotely operated vehicle at a depth of 5,200 to 5,700 metres, confirmed the highly dense field of around 230 million tonnes of manganese nodules over an area of approximately 10,000 square kilometres.

typically range from five to several tens of centimetres in diameter and are believed to have formed over millions of years as metals transported in the ocean attach themselves to nuclei such as fish bones on the seabed.

Based on an analysis of samples collected, the team estimates the deposit contains around 610,000 tonnes of cobalt, enough to support Japan's consumption for approximately 75 years, and around 740,000 tonnes of nickel, equivalent to around 11 years of domestic consumption.

India's gold demand cools post-festival as prices surge and RBI hits record reserves

The World Gold Council has recently reported on India's gold market, noting a decline in demand after a period of increased buying during festivals.

THE World Gold Council has released its latest update on India's gold market, highlighting a period of subdued demand following the festival-driven surge in purchases.

According to WGC press release, despite this pause, the gold market remains robust with significant movements in prices, imports, and investor activity.

Global and domestic gold prices have shown remarkable resilience, extending their gains and posting a 12 per cent increase year-to-date.

After reaching an all-time high in mid-May, international gold prices saw a minor correction but still closed the month with a 1 per cent increase, settling at USD 2,343 per ounce.

This upward trend continued into early

June, with prices adjusting slightly to US\$ 2,317 per ounce due to a stronger-than-expected jobs report in the US and a pause in gold purchases by the People's Bank of China (PBoC).

In India, the demand

for gold experienced a surge during the Akshaya Tritiya festival on 10 May, traditionally an auspicious day for purchasing gold.

However, this momentum was short-lived as the market experi-

enced a significant drop in demand post-festival.

The rise in gold prices to record levels in mid-May further dampened interest, especially during the usual low-demand period from mid-May to July. — ANI

Boeing may avoid criminal charges over violations: report

THE US Department of Justice is considering a deal with Boeing that would avoid criminal prosecution of the aerospace giant but may appoint a federal supervisor to oversee company progress on safety improvements, The New York Times reported Friday.

People familiar with the discussions told the daily that the terms of the possible alternative settlement, known as a deferred prosecution agreement, or DPA, are still subject to change.

A DOJ official involved in the case. Glenn Leon, chief of the fraud section criminal division, said in an email to a civil party lawyer seen by AFP that the department "has not made a decision" on the path it will take with respect to Boeing. - AFP

Additionally, a new Indian consulate will be established in Rangpur, Bangladesh, to serve the region's residents.

PM Modi and PM Sheikh Hasina of Bangladesh addressed the media after their meeting at Hyderabad House,

highlighting the importance of their frequent engagements over the past year.

Modi emphasized Bangladesh's significance in India's neighbourhood and Act East policies, as well as collaborative developmental efforts.

He also extended best wishes to both countries' cricket teams ahead of their T20 World Cup Super 8 match. – ANI

Bridge the gap

QATAR is working to mediate between Israel and Hamas to establish a ceasefire in Gaza and secure the release of Israeli hostages.

Qatar said Friday it was pursuing efforts to "bridge the gap" between Israel and Palestinian militant group Hamas to reach a ceasefire in Gaza and release Israeli hostages held there.

The Gulf emirate, the United States and Egypt, have been engaged in months of negotiations for a ceasefire in the Isra-

el-Hamas war that erupted on 7 October.

There has been one seven-day pause in November which led to the release of more than 100 hostages. Efforts since have been deadlocked.

"We have continued our efforts without interruption over the last few days," Qatar's Prime Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al-Thani told a news conference in Madrid with Spanish Foreign Minister Jose Manuel Albares. — AFP

Enhanced strategic partnership

VIETNAM and Russia signed multiple cooperation documents and agreed to further deepen their comprehensive strategic partnership on Thursday during Russian President Vladimir Putin's state visit to Vietnam, Vietnam News Agency reported.

During the visit, Putin talked with his Vietnamese counterpart To Lam and both witnessed the signing of the multiple bilateral cooperation documents in the fields including education and judiciary. At a press briefing, Lam said both sides had agreed to further enhance high-level exchanges and promote bilateral trade and investment, according to the Vietnam News Agency.

On Thursday, Putin also met and talked with General Secretary of the Communist Party of Vietnam Central Committee Nguyen Phu Trong, Vietnamese Prime Minister Pham Minh Chinh, and Chairman of the National Assembly of Vietnam Tran Thanh Man, respectively. — Xinhua

Upholding physician training

SOUTH Korea's highest court rejected on Wednesday a request by medical students and doctors to halt a government plan to train more physicians, while senior medics have joined a months-long strike.

Thousands of trainee doctors stopped working on 20 February, protesting against government plans to increase medical school quotas.

The ongoing strike has caused disruptions in hospitals and forced delays or cancellations of key treatments, including chemotherapy.

Last month, the government finalized an admission quota hike of around 1,500 for medical schools for 2025, which it says will tackle shortages

of doctors and a rapidly ageing population.

Senior doctors at the country's key medical institution, the Seoul National University Hospital, as well as its branches, began an indefinite walkout on Monday in response to the plan.

A lower court ruled in favour of the government in May, and the Supreme Court upheld that decision and dismissed the doctors' and students' request on Wednesday.

If the reform is "halted in a situation where there is a forecast of a shortage of doctors in the future", it may cause "significant disruption to the increase in medical school quotas, which plays a crucial role in public health", the Supreme Court said. — AFP

Politically motivated crimes

A record number of politically motivated crimes occurred in Germany last year, fuelled partly by global events including the conflicts in Ukraine and Gaza, according to a report published on Tuesday.

Authorities registered 60,028 politically motivated offences in 2023, up from 58,916 the previous year, the report from Germany's domestic intelligence agency said. Around 25,660 of the crimes were committed by right-wing extremists, an increase of 22.4 per cent from 2022. Crimes committed by left-wing extremists rose by 10.4 per cent, though their number was much smaller at 4,248.

There was also a surge in anti-Semitic crimes, which jumped to 492 from just 33 the previous year.

The vast majority were committed after 7 October 2023, when an unprecedented Hamas attack on Israel triggered a relentless Israeli military offensive on Gaza. – AFP

Decreasing military footprint

FRANCE is planning to reduce its military presence in West and Central Africa to around 600 troops in line with President Emmanuel Macron's plans to limit the French military footprint in the region, three sources told AFP.

In February 2023, President Macron announced a significant reduction of French troops in Africa amidst rising anti-French sentiment in former colonies and increased competition from countries like Russia.

The plan, developed in consultation with African partners, aims to scale back French "pre-positioned" forces across several nations. For instance, troop numbers will drop to approximately 100 in Gabon and Senegal from current levels of 350 each, and to around 100 in Ivory Coast from 600, and 300 in Chad from 1,000. The decision reflects a shift in strategy following political changes in African nations previously hosting substantial French military presence. — AFP

Nuclear arms spending surge

NUCLEAR-ARMED countries hiked spending on atomic weapons arsenals by a third in the past five years as they modernized their stockpiles amid growing geopolitical tensions, two reports showed on Monday.

The world's nine nuclear-armed states jointly spent \$91 billion on their arsenals last year, according to a new report from the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN).

That report, and a separate one from the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI), indicated that nuclear weapons states are dramatically scaling up spending as they modernise and even deploy new nuclear-armed weapons.

"I think it is fair to say there is a nuclear arms race under way," ICAN chief Melissa Parke told AFP. – AFP

N the remote Greenlandic village of Ittoqqortoormiit, nestled along the expansive Scoresby Sound, traditional Inuit hunting practices are both a way of life and a fading art.

Hjelmer Hammeken, a legendary figure among Greenland's hunters, epitomizes this ancient way of survival in a changing world.

Hammeken's skill and prowess as a polar bear hunter, honed over five decades, once symbolized the prosperity of Ittoqqortoormiit's hunters during the

"golden age" when polar bear skins fetched high prices abroad.

However, since the imposition of hunting quotas in 2005 due to declining polar bear populations, life has become increasingly uncertain for the community.

Mother of Brazil's football giant Pele dies at 101

CELESTE ARANTES, the mother of Brazilian football legend Pele, has died aged 101, outliving her famous son by 18 months, the family announced Friday.

Arantes was 17 when she gave birth to her first child on 23 October 1940, a baby who would grow up to be the man $widely\,considered\,the\,greatest\,footballer$ of all time.

"Rest in peace, grandma," Pele's eldest son Edinho wrote on Instagram, a message illustrated with a photo of him hugging his grandmother.

New Zealanders seek stronger connections with Asia: survey

The survey, conducted annually by the Asia New Zealand Foundation, highlights increasing interest in Asia among New Zealanders, particularly the younger demographic.

ew Zealanders see Asia a high-priority region for engagement, according to a survey released on Friday.

Asia remains the second most important region to New Zealand's future after Australia, said the Asia New Zealand Foundation's Perceptions of Asia and Asian Peoples survey, now in its 27th year.

New Zealanders' interests in Asia are growing year on year, particularly among young New Zealanders, it said, adding that New Zealanders' knowledge of the region is also at an alltime high.

About 59 per √ cent of New Zealanders say they feel reasonably knowledgeable about Asia, up from about 33 per cent a decade ago, said Suzannah Jessep, chief executive of the Asia New Zealand Foundation.

About 75 per cent of New Zealanders above 15 believe that having a strong relationship with Asia is important to New Zealand's future, according to the survey. — Xinhua
